

Legal forms, serially numbered, are being mailed to every individual in the district who made a return last year, based upon an income of \$5000 or less. Payers in this class are advised to await receipt of the form. If the form is not received by the end of this week, send for it.

Carmel Boy Home From Overseas

Corporal Donaid L. Hale, son of Mrs. F. R. Bechdolt, is home from Europe, after an absence of over a year with the American Expeditionary Force.

But a very short time after the United States declared war on Germany Hale enlisted in San Francisco. joining the 30th Engineers (Gas and Flame), which later became the First Gas Regiment, and which, after a period of Training at For Meyer, Virginia, sailed for France in January, 1918. Corporal Hale has seen much real

Corporal Hale has seen much real service. From the start the First Gas Regiment was in the heaviest of the fighting. Because of their peculia duties the gas fighters had to be is front, to pave the way for the infantry and draw the enemy artilley fire.

Toward the end of April last yes the First Gas Regiment was used in all sectors in which there wet American forces, and took an active part in the engagements at Toulthe Vosges, Chateau Thierry, St Mihiel and the Argonne. At one time the gas fighters fought forty out of forty-nine consecutive days and through it all Donald Hale came through w thout a scratch.

The officers and men of the regiment were awarded eighty Croin de Guerre, twenty-six Distinguished Service Crosses and twelve officer have been cited for our Army's Dis tinguished Service Medal—a remarkable showing for a single regrment.







Old Jupiter Pluvius held off just long enough last Saturday afternoon to permit the Carmel baseball players to complete a fiveinning game.


