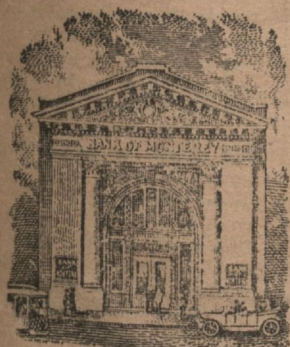

Send your discharge certificate, or for same, or both if you have them, together with indorsement for final payment and a statement of all military service since April 6, 1917, naming the place and date where you first reported, to the Zone Finance Officer, Lemon building, Washington, D. C. Your papers will be returned to you when final settlement is made. Be sure to notify the department if you change your address.

Naval officers and enlisted men are also entitled to the allotment, and instructions regarding the payment may be obtained from Rear Admiral Jayne, San Francisco.

How Will It Affect Carmel?

With plans to develop the Del Monte holdings to their fullest extent, the recently organized Del Monte Properties Company has acquired all the properties in this county owned or controlled by the Pacific Improvement Company.

Samuel F. B. Morse, manager of the old concern, is the president and general manager of the new company. The directors are Hugh Goodfellow, Henry T. Scott, John Barneson, Charles W. Clark, K. R. Kingsbury, Wellington Gregg, Herbert Fleishacker, S. F. B. Morse, Maurice Hecksher, of New York

The deal involves properties said to be valued at more than five million dollars. They aggregate 18,000 acres, including the Del Monte forest, the Pebble Beach section, the unsold portion of the city of Pacific Grove, the Los Laurellas Rancho, the Del Monte hotel and grounds, the new Lodge at Pebble Beach, near Carmel-by-the-Sea, with its golf links and polo field, and the capital stock of the Monterey County Water Works, which supplies the cities of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey and Pacific Grove.

Manager Morse announces that the new concern intends to develop fully the entire area, and make it "The playground of the State." To do this additional lands adjoining the present holdings may be from time to time purchased.

As announced in the Pine Cone some time ago, Captain Barneson and fifty business and professional men have organized a fishing club at Pebble Beach, and are to build a lodge. The fishing in Carmel bay is declared to be superior to that at Wrigley's Catalina.

The company also intends to put up a large number of cottages, so that summer visitors may have a private home instead of going to a hotel.

For the present there will be no change in the management of the various units.

THIS TELLS HOW TO FIGURE INCOME TAX

Squarely Up to Every Individual to Get Busy by March 15 or Suffer Penalty.

"Don't wait until the final due date, March 15th, for paying your Income Tax and making your return. Avoid the last minute rush. Any person can figure out his liability today as well as he can next week, and if there is any point on which he needs advice he can now get in touch with a Revenue man."

This word of advice is from Justus Wardell, Collector of Internal Revenue, San Francisco, Cal., who is collecting the Income Tax in California. Collector Wardell is giving without charge every aid of his office and his enlarged field force to help the people get their payments and their returns in by March 15th.

But the Income Tax men will not pull your door-bell or your coat-tails, according to the Collector's announcement. It is squarely up to every individual to figure out his own case and to get busy if he comes within the scope of the new Revenue law.

Did You Earn This Much?

Every unmarried person who received income averaging \$19.25 a week during 1918 and every married couple who jointly received income averaging \$38.50 a week should secure at once from the nearest Deputy Collector or the nearest bank a blank Form 1040 A. That form contains the information he will need to enable him to figure his correct net income and any tax that he owes the Government.

The law requires that every unmarried person who had a net income of \$1,000 or over and every married person whose net income was \$2,000 or over (including the income of husband or wife, and the earnings of minor children, if any) must make a return on or before March 15th. And this requirement does not hinge on whether the person owes a tax.

Taxable Income.

An individual must include under

gross income all gains, profits and income derived from salaries, wages, or compensation for personal service of whatever kind and in whatever form paid, or from professions, vocations, business, sales or dealings in property of all kinds, interest, rent, dividends, or profits derived from any source whatever. Very few items of income are exempt.

Deductions include ordinary and necessary business expenses, interest paid or accrued on indebtedness, taxes of all kinds except Federal income and excess profits taxes and assessments for local benefits, losses actually sustained, debts ascertained to be worthless, and depreciation on buildings, machinery, fixtures, etc., used in business. A further deduction is allowed for contributions to corporations operated for religious, charitable, scientific or educational purposes or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals to an amount not exceeding 15 per cent of the taxpayer's net income as computed without the benefit of the contribution deduction.

The taxpayer is not allowed to deduct any personal, living or family expense, any amount spent for improving property, or any expense of restoring property or making good its exhaustion for which an allowance is claimed under depreciation.

Figuring the Tax.

Before figuring the normal tax the dividends are deducted as credits from net income, together with the personal exemption. As in previous years, dividends of domestic corporations are exempt from normal tax when received by the stockholder.

The normal tax rates for citizens and residents are as follows: On the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of the credits the rate is 6 per cent; on any further taxable income the rate is 12 per cent.

The surtax rates apply to net income of each individual in excess of \$5,000. The personal exemption and the dividends are not deductible before computing surtax. In the case of returns by husband and wife, the net income of each is considered separately in computing any surtax that may be due. Form 1040 should be used for making returns of net income exceeding \$5,000, and the instructions on that form will show how to figure the surtax.

Concerning Material For Street Work

The City Clerk is in receipt of the following communication concerning materials to be used in the proposed Carmel street improvement work:

To the City Clerk,
Carmel-by-the-Sea, Cal.

Dear Madam: In reply to your communication of February 15 re "Street Improvements," I would say that for the North and South streets, if the work is to be done under the Improvement Act of 1911, giving a period of fourteen years to pay for it, I favor the oil macadam. If the work cannot be done on the long time payment plan, then I favor the sand rock street. I am against the use of clay and will enjoin its use if attempted. The specifications must be so written as to distinctly demand SAND ROCK, similar to that used on the greater part of Lincoln avenue.

The present quarry face on Junipero Junipero avenue is of no value as a road making material, as evidenced by the patches made with that clayey matter on the lower part of the above street. I do not think the sand rock will stand long on the East and West streets on account of the rush or velocity of storm water that has to be carried by them, unless special provision is made to fill the holes washed out after each storm with more rock.

Death Claims an Estimable Woman

News of the death, in San Francisco, of Mrs. Alice V. Cotton, was received by relatives and friends here early last Saturday morning. It cannot be said that the news was unexpected, as those who saw Mrs. Cotton when she was here a short time ago knew then that the end was not far off.

The illness of the deceased really dates from the time that she took up a government land claim in the hills south of Carmel. The work incident to the requirements of proving up were too much for a woman who were too much for a woman who had worked as hard and as successfully as did she to make a home and garden on the sand lots at Eleventh avenue and Mission street.

For years Mil Arboles Gardens was one of the show places of Carmel, and Mrs. Cotton, time after time, freely gave the use of her beautiful place for garden fetes to secure funds for various purposes.

At the time of her death Mrs. Cotton had reached the age of fifty-seven years. She was a native of Louisiana, and was twice married.

Three daughters and a son survive; Mrs. Shelley Harthorne, who is here, Miss Laura A. Cotton, of San Francisco, Mrs. Florence Boggs, and Oscar W. Cotton, of San Diego.

Tax Exemptions For Soldiers and Sailors

Geo. S. Gould Jr., County Assessor, believes that nothing is too good for this country's men of arms. He therefore desires the press to call attention to the following:

Property to the amount of \$1000 of every resident in this state who has served in the Army, Marine Corps, Navy or Revenue Marine Service of the United States in time of war, and who received an honorable discharge, or lacking such amount of property in his own name, so much of the property of the wife or widowed mother as shall be necessary to equal said amount, shall be exempt from taxation. But this exemption shall not apply to any person owning property of the value of \$5000 or over.
