School Superintendent Schultzberg has submitted a proposal to reconstruct the school system on the Monterey Peninsula.

Amongst other things, the plan involves the consolidation of the Pacific Grove and Monterey high schools, the building of a new structure in New Monterey, and the addition to the present four-year high school work of two years of university work.

It will be a Junior College.
The buildings now used for high schools would become grammar schools or manual training and domestic science institutions.

Those in favor of the scheme say that it will save money, that it will reduce taxes, that it will keep grammar school children at school two years longer, that high school pupils intending to take university work will be home two years longer, that it will attract families to the peninsula to live.
