O'Shea, Marine Painter, Says Critic

Artist John O'Shea, who has been established at Carmel Highlands for several months, has an exhibition of his pictures in San Francisco, which will continue until next Wednesday. Willard Huntington Wright says of this young Irishman's work.

"Despite O'Shea's landscapes, many of which are both attractive pictorially and competent technically, I cannot help feeling that he is essentially a marine painter. His reactions to the varying moods of the sea appear to be more spontaneous and profound than his reactions to land vistas. In any event, his strongest work is to be found in those pictures which depict the stretches of ocean and the breaking surfs along the Carmel coast. In these canvases there is a greater sense of intimacy with the subject, and a more compelling impulse toward grandeur than are to be found in his landscapes."

BULLETIN ARTICLES

Did you read those two Ruth Taylor stories which the San Francisco Bulletin sprung on us last week? For fear you missed them, and because many have asked that they be published in the Pine Cone, we present them today. We regret that we are unable to reproduce the illustrations.

ACTION IN CARMEL - ALL THE SHOW NOT ON SCREEN

Here in San Francisco, where there are more movies than a leopard has spots, with continuous performances ceasing only for a short time in the wee sma' hours of the morning. It's hard for us to get used to the Wednesday and Saturday movie show idea as they work it in small towns.

That's the way it is in Carmel. Two performances a week, and unless you've lived in the town for more than two years you go only to refresh your memory. All the films have stood the test of age.

On movie days the movie man, who is also a delicatessen proprietor, goes up and down the main street with a piece of green chalk, advertising his attraction on the board sidewalks (there are at least ten feet intact) and on the store steps.

We went Saturday night. Big night! All the best people go then, you know. Fact; the whole town turns out for the week-end flicker drama.

Since no lanterns were furnished with our shack, we lit up the kerosene lamp and picked our way to the box office where the familiar, not-easily-forgotten face of the movie and delicatessen merchant met us with his usual "What'll it be?"

We were early, so had a good choice of the chairs placed in rows, and an excellent opportunity to see the townfolk arrive.

They came—all of 'em. The druggist, his wife and kids; the groceryman and his folks, some descendants of the early Spanish natives, the town bad boys who left the pool hall long enough for the show, the poetic soul who reads Tennyson and Browning of an evening to such as care to listen, the policeman, the twin newsboys, the lady real estate agents and all the other good town-folk. They held a short "sociable" until the operator had the first reel in his handpropelled machine.

A little girl in short skirts, probably the delicatessen daughter, took her seat at the piano and played one of her "pieces" for an overture, and selections later between each reel, while the operator changed the film and the audience sat on the edge of the chairs wondering if Bill Hart could hold the howling mob at bay until the villain escaped and the heroine was saved.

They had an educational film on the war, too, that showed how some women were doffing their silks for overalls and everything, which the town "toughie," who sat in front of us, said, with embellishments, was "so old it smelled" (the film, not the clothes). And when it was half through a little kid in the back of the room yelled: "Hey! The war is over!"

"LAMPING" FOR TRUTH IS CARMEL OUTDOOR SPORT

Never did hear whether Diogenes found that honest man, or the truth, or whatever it was he was looking for when he perambulated around toting a lantern to light him on his way. I'm under the impression that he didn't.

However, he was alone in his quest back there in the dark ages.

Now along comes a whole town of Diogeneses. There ought to be some hope for them—some hope when a whole village of folks take up their lanterns in the search for light.

At least I guess that's what they are doing down there at Carmel-by-the-Sea. For every person has a lantern, from the smallest child to the very oldest—that is, all but the most affluent inhabitants, and they are possessed of electric searchlights.

For every night when a Carmelite ventures forth he fills his kerosene lamp and lights it before he starts picking his way over the bumpy, rutty roads to truth.

You see Carmel is inhabited mainly by poets and artists and thinkers and dreamers, each one in his own medium trying to find the "light"—or truth, or whatever it is they call it. I don't know much about these things or how they go about finding their object, but I noticed that they do quite a lot of running around, dressed up in breeches and vest coats and flowing ties. Most any time of the day on the main street of the town you can see them in quest of sweet pickles and sardines from the delicatessen store (they call it delicatessen there), or oil paints from the miscellaneous shop.

In most cases the female Diogeneses were more interesting than the male. I say "interesting" because I believe that's the word one uses when one doesn't wish to commit one's self. Many of them wear their hair bobbed and men's clothes and are very picturesque.

You'd run into truth seekers at most every turn—in the fields, painting; on the rocks, dreaming, and up in the trees, writing. But from what I heard, the painters in the fields are really "getting at the roots of things" more than some of the others.

Be that as it may, if beauty is truth, and I, too, were a Diogenes, I'd stop in Carmel forever, for there certainly Nature outdid herself; and her trees and skies and seas and mountains would end my quest forever.

But, alas! I must work for a living, and be only an envier of these Diogeneses, with their kerosene lamps to light them about the town where the only street lights are stars. But I hope they find what they are looking for.

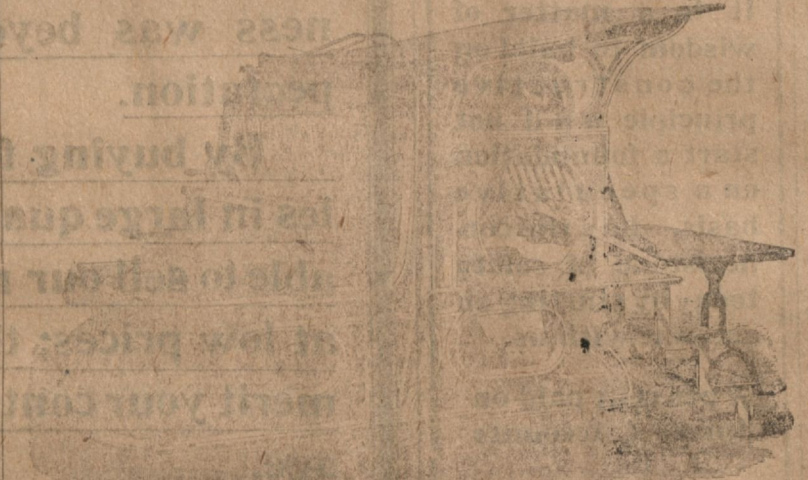

But now she has her own home in Carmel, her own studio overlooking the dunes and the sea. Appropriately enough this house might be called "Home of Loving Hearts," for it was planned and built by her many Carmel friends as a material expression of their affection and regard for her, and also as a slight return for her unselfish labor in the community.

Mrs. Carrington is one of Carmel's most loved and most useful citizens. Music is her art, her life, and she followed it with single-hearted devotion. But she has been more than mere teacher. She has been the friend, guide, counselor and mentor of many pupils.

Her studio has been the children's "social center." Each week they gathered for games, music and dramatic entertainments and it is not much to say that in future years, when the younger generation of Carmel has grown up, their happiest memories will be of the days and nights passed in Mother Carrington's studio. But her work has not been with children of Carmel. Her home has always been open to who love music, and it is these friends whom she has welcomed and helped in their musical work who have had hand in the building of her home.
