## Pine Needles

The Coast Valleys Gas and Electric company which supplies Carmel, has obtained from the Railroad Commission authority to issue \$125,000 of its first mortgage six percent bonds, due March 1, 1952. The bonds are to be sold at not less than 85 percent of their face value, plus accrued interest, and the proceeds are to be devoted to reimbursing the company's treasury for earnings expended.

The Carmel Summer School of Art, under the auspices of the Carmel Club of Arts and Craft, begins its sixth session on Monday, July 7 and continues eight weeks. Miss M DeNeal Morgan is director and instructor. The school specializes on outdoor landscape and figure work, and still life painting in the studio.

# ORDINANCE NO. 25

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA TO FIX AND PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION OF A MUNICIPAL LICENSE TAX ON CERTAIN BUSINESS IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, AND IMPOSING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea do ordain as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm, co-partnership, corporation or association shall pursue, keep, carry on, conduct or engage in the business of keeping any wheeled vehicle, including automobiles, for public use for the transportation or conveyance of passengers for hire, or for receiving, hauling or transporting any goods, wares and merchandise or other goods for hire in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea without first procuring a license therefor as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. The Clerk of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea shall prepare and have printed a suitable form for licenses with blanks for the insertion of the name of the person to whom it is issued, the nature of the business licensed, the time and place for which it is granted, its date, and the amount paid therefor. The license shall be signed by the Clerk and counter-signed by the Tax Collector. Blank licenses shall be kept by the Clerk bound in book form with marginal stubs upon which he shall enter briefly the facts stated in the license at the time of issuance. The Clerk shall take the Tax Collector's receipt for all licenses delivered to him and shall keep a book in which he shall enter a record of all licenses delivered by him to the Tax Collector.

Section 3. All licenses shall be paid for in advance to the Tax Collector at his office, in lawful money of the United States, and no demand for or notice to pay said license tax need be made by said Tax Collector. All licenses shall be issued for and date from the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 4. Application for the issuance of a license may be made to the Tax Collector on any day except Sundays and legal holidays, and upon payment to him of the amount of the license tax he shall, unless otherwise provided herein, deliver to the applicant therefor a license to engage in the business therein specified, signing the same before delivery.

Section 5. No license issued or granted under the provisions of this ordinance shall authorize any other business than is therein named, nor authorize the carrying on or conducting of the business therein named and thereby licensed in more than one place of business and subject to the conditions and limitations herein expressed. Business licenses hereunder issued may be assigned to the holder thereof to his and their successor or successors in business, provided that the Collector shall endorse all assignments and shall immediately record all such assignments or transfers.

Section 6. The Tax Collector shall keep in his office a license book in which he shall enter the names of any person, firm, co-partnership, association or corporation to whom a license is issued, the character of the business licensed, the term for which it is granted, the place where the business is to be conducted, the date of the license, and the amount received therefor in each case, and furnish the Board of Trustees with an abstract of all licenses issued during the previous month at its first regular meeting of any month.

Section 7. For the business of transporting passengers for hire by

any wheeled vehicle, automobile or other road conveyance, or for the business of receiving, hauling or transporting any goods, wares or merchandise or other articles by any wheeled vehicle, automobile or other road conveyance within the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, a license tax is hereby imposed as follows:

1st. For the business of transporting passengers for hire by any wheeled vehicle, automobile or other road conveyance the sum of \$30.00 per year or any part thereof, payable in advance, for the first wheeled vehicle, automobile or other road conveyance used in said business; and the sum of \$15.00 per year, payable in advance, for each wheeled vehicle, automobile, or other road conveyance used by any person, firm, co-partnership, corporation or association in excess of one, provided that the license tax on horse-drawn vehicles shall be as follows:

On each one horse vehicle the sum of \$10.00 per annum, payable in advance;

On each two horse vehicle the sum of \$15.00 per annum, payable in advance;

On each four horse vehicle the sum of \$20.00 per annum, payable in advance.

The provisions of this Section shall apply whether such business is conducted wholly or partially within the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Section 8. Every person who shall, after this ordinance goes into effect, commence, or continue to transact, carry on or engage in any business or occupation in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea liable to pay a license tax and for the transaction, carrying on or engaging in of which a license is required to be procured under the provisions of this ordinance, without first having obtained a license so to do as herein provided, shall for each and every such violation of this ordinance pay to the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea a penalty equal to the amount of the license tax such person was required to pay under the provisions of this ordinance, together with the sum of Fifteen Dollars as liquidated damages added thereto; and it shall be the duty of the Collector and he is hereby authorized to institute and prosecute to final judgment in any court of competent jurisdiction, a civil suit in the name of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea against such person to recover the amount of such license and such liquidated damages.

Section 9. In any suit or action brought as provided in Section 8 of this ordinance, the City Attorney or Collector may make the necessary affidavit for and a writ of attachment may issue without any bond being given on behalf of the plaintiff; said writ may be directed to the Sheriff or any Constable of Monterey County, or the Marshal of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, and may be executed in the same manner as is provided by law for the execution of writs of attachment.

Section 10. No prosecution or judgment in any civil action provided for in this ordinance is a bar to any criminal prosecution or conviction hereinafter, nor is any criminal prosecution or conviction provided for in this ordinance a bar to such civil action.

Section 11. Every person who shall, after this ordinance goes into effect, continue, transact, operate, carry on or engage in any business, for the trans-

## Improvement of Ocean Avenue

The matter of street work on Ocean Avenue was fairly well threshed out at last Thursday's meeting of the Board of Trustees and Ocean Avenue property owners.

Notwithstanding a numerous sign-curbs and gutters were included. way, presented at the meeting of May 6th, a large majority of the lot owners expressed themselves as in favor of the previously adopted plans for concrete roadways.

Chairman A. P. Fraser made a detailed statement of the preliminary work already consummated for a proper roadway on our main thoroughfare, involving, among other things an expenditure of \$600 to \$1000 for surveys and preparation of other data. Not to use this data would be a total loss.

The result of the discussion was the unanimous adoption by the board of a motion to empower Chairman Fraser to consult with City Attorney H. G. Jorgensen in the matter of making the necessary provision for calling a bond election to raise from all Carmel property (about four thousand lots), twenty-five per cent of the cost is to be borne directly by the Ocean Avenue owners.

Payments for the work may be extended over a period of nine years. This will not work a hardship on anyone.

action, operation, carrying on or engaging in of which a license is required to be procured under the provisions of this ordinance, without taking out or procuring such license as prescribed by this ordinance, and every person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not more than Three Hundred Dollars, and in default of the payment of such fine shall be imprisoned in the County Jail of the County of Monterey until such fine be satisfied in the proportion of one day's imprisonment for each Two Dollars of said fine.

Section 12. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force thirty days from and after its final passage and approval.

## French Girl Writes to Carmel Children

St. Simon, Cantal, April 19, 1919.  
My Dear Comrades of California:

Mama read it out loud and I have read and re-read it many times. I was so happy and contented that I could not sleep in my bed. I talked all the time of my comrades in Carmel, and I hugged my sister with joy.

I am eight years old, and big and strong. I am always well and have a mother who is very good, and a big sister who will make her first communion in fifteen days, and I will ask of her a special prayer for you. I have also a little brother six years old. All three of us go to school, and I learn pretty well, and the teacher is satisfied.

The Germans killed my papa in 1916. A shell burst in the trench. Mama cried a great deal, and grandma also. She cries all the time and says she will soon go to join her son. He was a good papa and carried me in his arms. I shall never see him again.

I detest the Germans and wish them harm. I love the Americans and have seen them. They came to buy horses and we children all ran to see them.

They are tall and beautiful and rich. Cantal Province is in the middle of France, and St. Simon is a village among the mountains situated in a valley. It is not so beautiful as Carmel and the houses are small. A river crosses the valley and there are fish in it—trout—but I have never seen them.

When it rains or the snow falls, the river swells and leaves its course. It comes right to the door of my grandmother's house, and we can not go to see her. She does not live with us, and Jeanne, my sister, goes to stay with her when she is ill. She works and when she is not at home my sister does the cooking and we go to school and to see grandma. Mama wishes that we always have someone to look after us. Jeanne knows how to knit socks and to sew a little. I can knit with two needles. We must not wear out our stockings, for wool costs so much and mama mends them every night.

Our house is a little distance away from the others, and we have four hens, two rabbits and a garden. We go out and hunt for green stuff for the rabbits. There will be more of it in the summer.

I have never seen the ocean—it is too far from here—and perhaps I never shall see it. I am afraid I shall never see the great waves, the green water and the great foam. I shall never be able to know you, although I have loved you since yesterday.

California is a beautiful country and the children are happy there. We are far away, but my letter will come to you there.

Jeanne and mama have helped me to write my letter and the teacher has corrected the faults. We are having vacation, and when I go back to school I shall read your letter to my schoolmates. We have a map of America and the teacher has showed us where California is on the map. The Americans have helped us to finish the war.

Will you permit me to send you a thousand kisses—yes, truly, I embrace each one of you.

## Street Work Information

Notices have been posted along the line of street improvements on Eighth Avenue, Monte Verde Avenue and Camino Real. Objectors to the proposed work are required to file written protests with the Board of Trustees on or before Tuesday, June 17.

Error was made in the first announcement of this work to the effect that curbs and gutters were included. There will be a roadway only.

It should be borne in mind also that this improvement is not borne by the municipality, but by the lot owners, who will also assume maintenance costs. And the job is a cash proposition.

### Resolution No. 40

A RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE EIGHTH AVENUE IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA BETWEEN THE WEST LINE OF SAN CARLOS STREET AND THE WEST END OF SAID EIGHTH AVENUE, AND CAMINO REAL BETWEEN THE SOUTH LINE OF OCEAN AVENUE AND THE NORTH LINE OF SANTA LUCIA AVENUE, AND MONTE VERDE STREET BETWEEN THE SOUTH LINE OF OCEAN AVENUE AND THE NORTH LINE OF SANTA LUCIA AVENUE.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea that the said Board deems it to be required by public interest and convenience, and that it is the intention of said Board to order the following work to be done and improvement to be made in said City, to-wit:

That Eighth Avenue between the west line of San Carlos Street and the west end of said Eighth Avenue, and Camino Real between the south line of Ocean Avenue and the north line of Santa Lucia Avenue, and Monte Verde Street between the south line of Ocean Avenue and the north line of Santa Lucia Avenue be graded and graveled to the official grade, the work described in the plans and specifications therefor, adopted by the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea on the 6th day of May, A. D. 1919, and all of said work to be done according to said plans and specifications, which are hereby referred to and made a part hereof.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 17th day of June, A. D. 1919, at 8:00 o'clock P.
