Bonds Fail to Carry

97 Yes 61 No

The opponents of civic improvement achieved a glorious victory Tuesday.

However, the above vote shows the desire of a fair majority of Carmel citizens concerning Ocean Avenue.

Unfortunately a majority of 36 in a total vote of 156 is not sufficient to carry a bond proposition. It lacks eight of the required two-thirds vote.

Still, there is encouragement for friends of progress in the figures. Those opposed to the bonds polled nearly their maximum strength, while it is apparent from the total vote cast that only fifty per cent of those favoring the bonds voted.

To lack of organized effort on the part of the proponents of the bonds may be attributed the result.

An election tomorrow or six months from now would bring a different outcome.

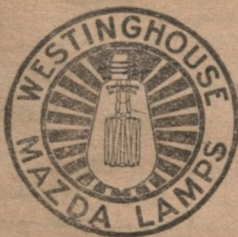
