Mission Restoration

Jules Pages, the distinguished artist, has returned to San Francisco from a visit to the California mission buildings. In view of the efforts now being made to restore the buildings to their original state, Pages observations are of interest.

From the camoufleurs he believes the restorers should learn the value of impressionism, rather than of painstaking detail. He thinks too much accuracy in rebuilding and restoring would be fatal.

"The Indian masons and the padres," said the artist, "who built the old missions worked with genuine religious zeal. It is impossible to replace such work with the more accurate but less inspired work of modern builders."

The roof Carmel Mission is an example of failure to adhere to the original plan, Pages found. The slope of the roof has been altered, so that in place of the long gentle slant built by the padres, there is a sharp "barn" angle.

"The roof of Carmel Mission worried me the moment I saw it," said Pages. "I knew something was wrong, but was not sure just what until I came across an old print showing the original roof."

The California Historical Survey Commission is to meet here a week from tomorrow. All interested in the restoration of Carmel Mission are invited to attend.

To Discuss Theatre Plans

EVERYONE interested in Carmel and its theatre will attend the public meeting, to discuss and adopt plans, to be held at Arts and Crafts Hall tomorrow evening. Bring suggestions and the purpose to accomplish something.

The general sentiment seems much in favor of forming the Community Forest Theatre. With a spirit and will for it, the proposed new organization can readily become a fact. There are doubtless many ways of accomplishing this end. The following plan is offered only as it may recommend itself:

That we incorporate as the Community Forest Theatre of Carmel. The advantages of incorporation are that both the rights and liabilities of stockholders are safeguarded by law; that a proper routine of business is formulated; and that possession of stock carries with it a sense of ownership and interest. The corporation shall acquire a lease and option to purchase all the property of the Forest Theatre. As much stock as may seem wise shall be issued, at two dollars per share, and not to be assessable more than one dollar a year. All profits shall go to the purchase and upkeep of the property. Voting power shall be limited to one vote per stockholder without privilege of proxy.

The constitution shall be brief; the by-laws may be as ample as desired. A general policy shall be prepared: That our drama be essentially home production, actors chosen from Carmel, and native plays and producers given preference. The annual program to consist of a modern drama, a classical drama, and a children's play.

There shall be a board of directors, including the officers of the corporation, probably not exceeding nine. The President shall be chairman of the board and shall appoint from the board the chairmen of working committees—Costumes, Decoration, Casting, Play and Producer selecting, and business committees, and shall be responsible for all finances. Chairman of committees shall select other members from the stockholders. A producer's first duty shall be to submit a budget or estimate of the expenses for the approval of the Treasurer. This will relieve the producer of all financial responsibility and show the corporation just what liabilities are to be expected.

Right Out in Meetin'

The Carmel Civic League died about the time that Carmel became a city, and the Civic Section of Arts and Crafts has been dozing since, in the fond expectation that the City Fathers would carry on the work of the Civic League, viz: Looking after rubbish barrels, repairing and replacing broken and missing street signs, placing and caring for way-side benches, etc.; but after several years of waiting, we rise to ask why all these necessary adjuncts of any self-respecting town have been neglected. The remark has frequently been heard this summer that Carmel never looked dirtier or more uncared for. Why? Because there are no rubbish barrels, therefore the streets and chaparral are used in which to throw rubbish.

Our sidewalks, too, are almost impossible in many places for lack of trimming the young pines which are growing as lustily as the town.

Whose business is it to attend to these things, and are there not some funds belonging to the city which can be used for these purposes?

Beauty is one of Carmel's most valuable assets and can be computed in dollars and cents for those who care nothing for the aesthetic side; but Beauty and Cleanliness must go hand in hand.

The Wonders of America

By T. T. MAXEY

ESTES-ROCKY MOUNTAIN NA-
 TIONAL PARK.

MANY years ago three Englishmen
 hunted big game in the Rocky
 mountains. They had hunted in Asia,
 Africa and South America, but as they
 stood on the continental divide in north-
 central Colorado and looked down into
 Estes park it seemed to them a very
 paradise on earth. One of Colorado's
 most satisfying outing places ever
 since that time Uncle Sam, in 1915,
 proclaimed part of Estes and the terri-
 tory immediately to the west a national
 park.

Only 70 miles from Denver, it is the
 most accessible to the largest number
 of people of any of our great national
 playspots. Here, at an average eleva-
 tion of 7,500 feet above sea level, is a
 pine-scented, snow-capped pleasure-
 land—a perfectly delightful refuge of
 peaceful grandeur, where one may be
 out every day from May to October in
 clear, bracing air, beneath a bright but
 scorchless sun and enjoy every night
 the cool, refreshing sleep that only the
 mountains can induce.

Long's Peak stands sentinel over the
 park, in which are lakes on which float
 ice cakes in August; masses of snow
 (glaciers) a mile long and hundreds of
 feet thick, supposed to be older than
 the pyramids of Egypt, always exposed
 to the sun, far away from their start-
 ing point, yet slower than a snail;
 moraines—great ridges formed by gla-
 ciers which moved through the park
 centuries ago; rock-walled canyons;
 magnificent forests of pine and aspen;
 numerous mountain-trout streams;
 broad valleys, carpeted with luxuriant
 wild flowers of many varieties, includ-
 ing the delicate columbine—the state
 flower of Colorado.

 monly known as Carmel Mission,
 near the town of Carmel-by-the-
 Sea, Monterey County, California,
 and to give notice of said hearing
 and the time and place fixed there-
 for, as required in an Act entitled
 "An act to amend section four of
 an act entitled 'An act to create a
 commission for the purpose of
 making a survey of local historical
 material in the State of California;
 defining the power and duties of

 Archivist of this Commission give

 days prior to the said time, in the
 following newspapers: The "Sacra-
 mento Bee," "San Francisco
 Examiner," "Los Angeles Ex-
 press," and the "Carmel-by-the-
 Sea Pine Cone," the said latter
 paper being the paper published
 in the county in which said Mis-
 sion building was situated and in
 the town nearest the said Mission
 building.

AND IT IS FURTHER OR-
 DERED that this Commission
 then and there hear and consider
 any information appertaining
 thereto which shall be brought be-
 fore it to the end that it may es-
 tablish accurate models of the said
 San Carlos Borromeo Mission with
 its outbuildings, and cause to be
 prepared plans and specifications
 sufficient in detail to enable the
 said Mission buildings and out-
 buildings to be restored as they
 were when the Franciscan Fathers
 were in charge thereof.
