## Restoration to Begin This Month

For the first time in its history cipality
this city has had the distinction of

Last Friday there were held three sessions of the California Historical Survey Commission, two at the City Hall and the third on the Carmelo Misston grounds.
In the absence of John F. Davis, chairman of the commission, the meetings were presided over by Professor Herbert E. Bolton of the history department of the University of California. Dr. Owen E. Coy, Mrs. Frances Rand Smith architect ural investigator, were also in attendance.
Frank H. Powers and Father Joseph M. Gleason were on hand as representatives of the Mission Restoration League. Father R. M. Mestres was the Church representative, and L. S. Slevin and W. L. Overstreet were there for the muni- able for the purpose.

An interesting report was sub milted by Mrs. Smith concerning the architectural features of the Mission Carmelo building as it was built under the direction of the Franciscan Fathers.
Director Owen C. Coy made a report embracing all that is authoritively known of the mission history, The outstanding achievement of he meeting is the first steps taken officially to determine the lines along which Carmelo Mission shall be restored-the first step in like work to be done eventually in all the California missions, twenty-one in number
That our mission is to see restoration work begun on Monday, November 24 , the 206 th anniversary of Padre Junipero Serra's birthday, was announced by Father Mestres, and he stated also that funds aggregating $\$ 35,000$ would be avail-

This is the keynote of a message sent by William Mathe Lewis, director of the savings division of the Treasury Department, ic the Twelfth District savings directors urging them to impress the wisdom of holding government securities.
"Thousands of people in the United States are losing their hard-earne savings every day because they lack knowledge of financial dealing," con-
tinued Mr. Lewis. Untold numbers of tinued Mr. Lewis. Untold numbers of fake scheme promoters and regiments of investment sharks, because of this popular ignorance, are pointing out short roads to big fortunes to those whose Liberty Bonds and War Sav ings Stamps they hope to secure in exchange for beautifully embossed but absolutely worthless stock certificates. These fakers know the value of gov
ern securities. They are anxious get them, for they figure that they will soon be selling at par and above "T'they know that following the Civil War the war issues of government seWar the war issues of government se
curities soon were above par, and that there is no well-informed person today who does not believe that the Liberty Bonds will sell well above par, long before their maturity.
