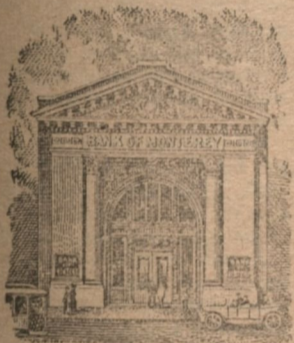

The Wonders of America

MAMMOTH CAVE, KENTUCKY.

MAMMOTH CAVE, the largest of a number of caves in Edmondson county, Kentucky, is said to be the largest cave known. It extends for almost a mile below the surface of the earth and contains about 100 miles of passage ways. Here are displayed perhaps the greatest and grandest examples in the world of the wonderful work of water in underground sculpturing.

Its discovery was another case of the hunter and the bear—date about 1800. The bear, wounded, crawled into the cave and escaped. The hunter followed and discovered the cave.

A visit to this cave is certainly a unique and wonderful experience. Nowhere else can it be duplicated. The interior is a maze of domes, pits, halls, chambers, pillars, temples, cascades, caverns, crevasses, stalactites and stalagmites, carved stone and other characteristic and peculiar phenomena and fairylike forms fashionable in cave architecture. There are lakes and rivers in it—one can boatripe on the Echo river for half a mile. The lofty limestone roof, 60 feet high in places, and the battlemented shores reflect and magnify every sound.

The Giant's Coffin is the largest rock in the cave. It is 18 feet thick, 43 feet long and weighs 2,000 tons. Mammoth Dome, the largest and most impressive of many, is 280 feet high. Many varieties of animal life are found, including eyeless fish and blind crawfish. The air is good and the temperature even—about 54 degrees. There are several routes through the cave, the longest requiring a full day.

Notice of Intention

Resolution No. 57

A RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE CASANOVA AVENUE BETWEEN THE SOUTH LINE OF OCEAN AVENUE AND THE NORTH LINE OF THIRTEENTH AVENUE, AND DOLORES AVENUE BETWEEN THE SOUTH LINE OF OCEAN AVENUE AND THE NORTH LINE OF SANTA LUCIA AVENUE, AND CARMELO AVENUE BETWEEN THE SOUTH LINE OF OCEAN AVENUE AND THE NORTH LINE OF SANTA LUCIA AVENUE, IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea that the said Board deems it to be required by public interest and convenience, and that it is the intention of said Board to order the following work to be done and improvement to be made in said City, to-wit:

That Casanova Avenue between the south line of Ocean Avenue and the north line of Thirteenth Avenue and Dolores Avenue between the south line of Ocean Avenue and the north line of Santa Lucia Avenue, and Carmelo Avenue between the south line of Ocean Avenue and the north line of Santa Lucia Avenue, be graded and graveled to the official grade.

All of said work to be done is all of the work described in the plans and specifications therefor, adopted by the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea on the 2nd day of December, 1919, except that the work on Casanova Avenue between the north line of Thirteenth Avenue and the north line of Santa Lucia Avenue shall not be done at this time or in these proceedings but all of said work is to be done according to said plans and specifications which are hereby referred to and made a part hereof.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 6th day of January A. D., 1920, at 7:30 o'clock P. M., in the City Hall at the corner of Ocean Avenue and Dolores Avenue in said City any and all persons having any objections to the proposed work or improvement may appear before said Board of Trustees and show cause why said proposed improvement should not be carried out in accordance with this resolution.

The City Clerk shall cause this Resolution of Intention to be published twice in the "Carmel Pine Cone," a weekly newspaper of general circulation, printed, published and circulated in said City and the official newspaper of said City, which is hereby designated for that purpose by the Board of Trustees.

The Superintendent of Streets shall cause to be conspicuously posted along the line of said contemplated work and improvement and in front of all the property liable to be assessed, notice of the passage of this Resolution of Intention, in the manner and form required by law.

All of the herein proposed work shall be done in pursuance of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, designated the "Improvement Act of 1911," approved April 7th, 1911, and amendments thereto.

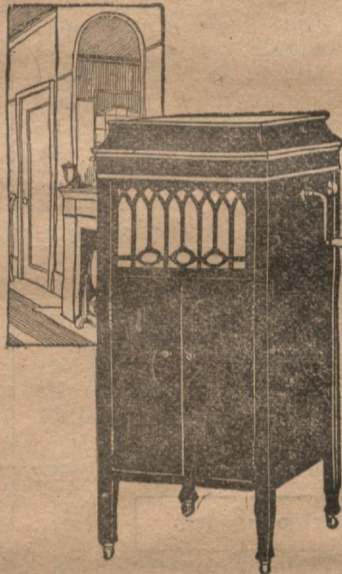

Conference Called By Gompers May Ask Continuation of Thrift Policy.

Portland, Ore.—Heads of the International Unions of America opening a special conference in Washington December 13 at the call of Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, to outline a labor program in lieu of the failure of the recent industrial conference, have been petitioned by the Oregon State Federation of Labor to include in the program unqualified support of the Government's thrift policy, represented in the sale of Thrift, War Savings Stamps and Treasury Savings Certificates. Backing of all other State Federations of Labor and a request that they forward similar petitions to the conference in Washington was asked by the Oregon Federation in a letter to all other State Federations of Labor. The letter was signed by O. R. Hartwig, president of the Oregon Federation, who says: "We feel that this will materially strengthen the position of organized labor and will also give us the sinews of war when most needed."

His letter to the other State Federations of Labor follows:
 "Inasmuch as the United States Government is engaged in advancing the War Savings Stamps campaign in a vigorous manner, and inasmuch as the War Savings Stamps are the best possible forms of investment for working men and women, particularly organized workers, and also because the possession of War Savings Stamps by workers while defending their rights either while out on strike or otherwise, gives them a degree of security that ordinarily they do not possess, therefore, the State Federation of Labor of Oregon makes the following suggestion: That your Federation join with us in urging upon the national conference that has been called in Washington, D. C., by the American Federation of Labor, the advisability of including in any program that they may promulgate, a War Savings Stamps plank or provision.

"We feel that this will materially strengthen the position of organized labor and will also give us the sinews of war when most needed."

THE BIRDS' CHRISTMAS TREE.

To make a birds' Christmas tree, take an evergreen, if possible, but any kind of tree will do if you tie sheaves of wheat, corn-stalks and evergreen branches all over it to make it dense. If it is a large tree, plant it securely in a partially protected place. A smaller tree can be put on the feeding shelf outside your window. Hang on it wire baskets filled with suet, boxes with fronts removed, containing nut meats, millet, sunflower-seeds, wheat, cracked corn, bread-crumbs, rolled oats, etc. Coconut shells cut in half and filled with dainties that the birds love can also be hung from the branches. Have several shelves on which place apples, lettuce, cabbage and vegetables.

In all cold districts, have at least one or two deep boxes almost filled with cotton where the half-frozen birds can find shelter and warmth. Many birds suffer from thirst during the winter. Heat a brick or large stone and place a pan of water on it.

The Real Christmas.

The real Christmas is an invisible presence, a joyful glance of the eye, a wonderful expansion of the heart, a sense of comradeship with all mankind. 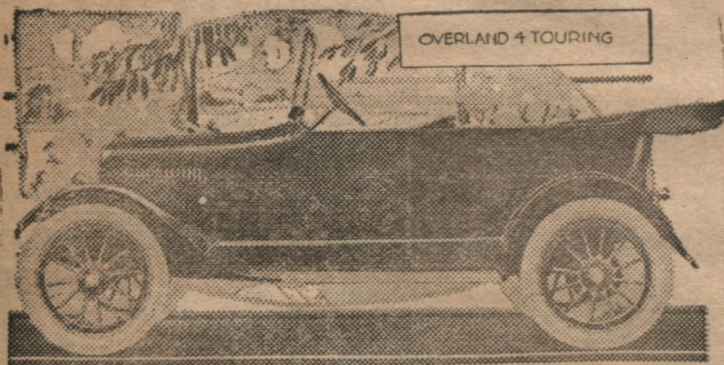

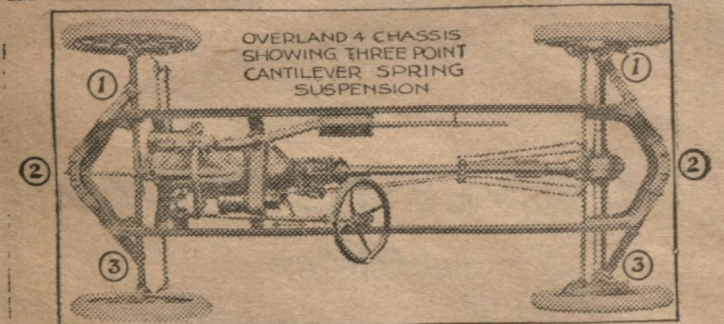

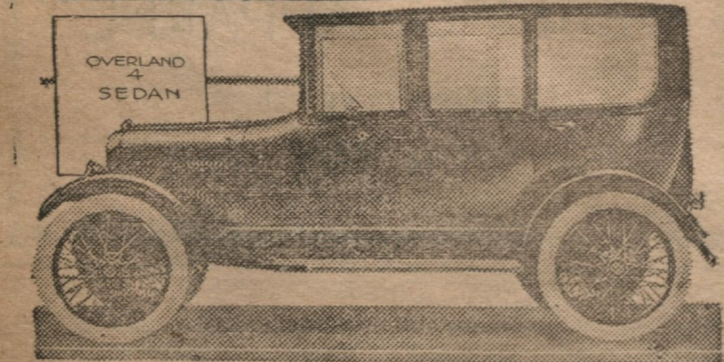

**NATIONAL CREDIT MEN PRESCRIBE
H. C. L. REMEDY**

Secretary Tregoe of National
Association Credit Men Ad-
vises Greater Production

As a portion of its campaign against high prices, the National Association of Credit Men has directed a letter to each member, declaring that the remedy necessary to change present conditions rests in increased production and stimulation of personal savings. The letter was sent through J. H. Tregoe, secretary and treasurer of the organization.

Members of the association throughout the country have been extending hearty cooperation to the Savings Division of the Treasury Department in the effort to popularize thrift through the sale of government savings securities such as Thrift and War Savings Stamps and Treasury Savings Certificates.

Mr. Tregoe in his letter urges the adoption of a national labor policy which will not only recognize but compel good faith and honor in the contractual relations of employed and employer.

"The right to hire and discharge at will," said Mr. Tregoe, "implies the right to leave and strike at will. Both of these rights, at least up to the present, are under control of natural laws and, when misused, carry a moral injury."

"Let us quit strong arm methods, the autocratic procedure, the breaking of contracts, the violation of good faith, the ignoring of public interests, and get down to a basis where men can and must live right in their relations, industrial and social, with one another."

There would be a deal less unrest if every man owned a bank account or government securities.

XMAS THRIFT PLEA ASKED OF GOVERNOR

U. S. Wants Everyone to Give Savings Stamps For Christmas Presents.

The Federal Government has asked the Governor of the State to appeal to the people of the State to give War Savings Stamps and Treasury Savings Certificates as Christmas presents this year. A similar request has been made to all the mayors of the larger cities in the Twelfth Federal Reserve District.

General giving of War Savings Stamps and Treasury Savings Certificates as Christmas presents the Government feels would do much toward bringing prices of necessities back to a normal level by cutting the demand for luxuries, and would help to stabilize the financial situation, besides starting many of the recipients of such presents along the road of saving and thrift. In its Christmas campaign the Government has enlisted banks, clergymen, schools, and fraternal organizations, and has seen to it that the banks and postoffices have a sufficient supply of securities on hand to meet the Christmas demand.

Governor John U. Calkins of the San Francisco Federal Reserve Bank, which has charge of the work of the War Loan Organization in the Twelfth Federal Reserve District, points out the benefits to be derived through the general giving of securities of the Government as Christmas presents in the following excerpt from a letter to the Governors:

"Economists are agreed that the present exorbitant level of prices that constitute not only an economic but a social menace is caused to a great extent by a 'spending spree' being indulged in by the people. Indulgence in luxuries, which, of course, causes increases in the necessities of life, has raised prices generally to such unheard of heights that Christmas buying this year promises a dangerous climax. We, therefore, appeal to you to call upon the people of your state (or city) to forego the giving of the usual Christmas gifts this year and instead give securities of the United States Government, such as Thrift and War Savings Stamps, Treasury Savings Certificates and Liberty Bonds. There could be no more timely effort at stabilization of prices and production than such action upon your part and the part of the people, a majority of whom, I am sure, would answer your call."

F. and A. M. Lodges Back Thrift Work

The full strength of all Masonic lodges in California with a total of 67,890 members will be felt in the government's 1919 Thrift and War Savings Stamps campaign as soon as recommendations of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of California made in convention here can be carried out by the subordinate lodges. The Grand Lodge "endorsed the movement undertaken by the federal government on behalf of thrift and warmly recommends full co-operation by subordinate lodges," requesting appointment of a thrift agent in each local organization to co-operate with the government in the sale of the securities.

PRETTY LEGEND OF CHRIST

Old-Folk Tale Relates That Stars
Danced and Birds Sang on Day
of His Birth.

When the child of Nazareth was born the sun, according to the Bosnian legend, "leaped in the heavens and the stars around it danced. A peace came over mountain and forest. Even the rotten stump stood straight and healthy on the green hillside. The grass was beflowered with open blossoms, incense sweet as myrrh pervaded upland and forest, birds sang on the mountain top and all gave thanks to the great God."

It is naught but an old-folk tale, but it has truth hidden at its heart, for a strange, subtle force, a spirit of general good will, a new-born kindness, seem to animate child and man alike when the world pays its tribute to the "heaven-sent youngling," as the poet, Drummond, calls the infant Christ.

When the three wise men rode from the east into the west on their saddle-bows were three caskets filled with gold and frankincense and myrrh, to be laid at the feet of the manger-cradled babe of Bethlehem. Beginning with this old, old journey the spirit of giving crept into the world's heart. As the magi came bearing gifts, so do we also; gifts that relieve want, gifts that are sweet and fragrant with friendship, gifts that breathe love, gifts that mean service, gifts inspired still by the star that shone over the City of David 2,000 years ago.

Then hang the green coronet of the Christmas tree with glittering baubles and jewels of flames; heap offerings on its emerald branches; bring Yule logs to the firing; deck the house with holly and mistletoe.

LORE OF THE YULE LOG

Should Be Lighted From Portion of
Last Year's Which Should Be
Preserved for Good Luck.

The Yule-log, a probable variant of the bonfire—so characteristic of sun festivals—has some interesting folk-lore of its own.

In medieval England, its duration coincided with the Christmas revels. As long as it burned, the tenant had a right to feed at the lord's expense. The log was often cut from an ash-tree—the sacred tree of our Saxon forefathers. There is a gypsy legend that our Lord was born in a field and brought up by an ash-fire.

The log should, properly, be lighted with a portion of last year's log, a piece of which is always supposed to be preserved for luck. At the same time that the Christmas fire was lit, the Christmas candle had to be lighted. (A portion of last year's taper has also to be kept.) It was unlucky to snuff the Christmas candle, which burned for 12 days—the period of festivity. At St. John's college, Oxford, can still be seen the ancient stone socket with the Agnus Dei stamp, in which the Christmas candle was placed on the high table.

On the Isle of Man, the folk formerly carried long tapers to church on Christmas eve.
