

# TASTING ROOMS OK'D TO RETURN OUTDOORS

Parklets to be discussed next month

T HE CITY council on Tuesday decided to let tasting rooms serve wine outside — as long as they don't use public sidewalks or parking spaces — until Sept. 12, the date restaurants are supposed to remove their parklets.

# Concerts, festivals get share of free money, too

THEATERS, DANCE companies and other performing arts organizations on the Monterey Peninsula, including profit-making businesses as well as nonprofits, received nearly \$19 million in taxpayer funds as part of federal pandemic relief efforts, including \$10 million for the Monterey Bay Aquarium and nearly \$912,000 for Sunset Center.

The Shuttered Venue Operators Grant program was administered by the Small Business Administration as part of the American Rescue Plan Act and funneled \$16 billion in taxpayer dollars to performing arts organizations that couldn't operate due to pandemic shutdowns. They could qualify for gifts "equal to 45 percent of their 2019 gross earned revenue," up to \$10 million per venue.

Council members also decided to put off until next month any discussion about letting restaurants keep their parklets, and how much rent the business owners should pay to operate in the public right of way.

Much of the public comment about the tasting rooms came from winery owners pleading with the city to let them accommodate customers outside again after the city forced them to move inside last month.

"Covid is getting worse," said Kim Stemler, executive director of the Monterey County Vintners & Growers Association. "The more you can allow people outdoors in public spaces, the better." She suggested tasting rooms that have private outdoor areas, like Dawn's Dream, Wrath and several others, be able to use those, while the half-dozen tasting rooms that don't, including Caraccioli Cellars, Lepe Cellars and Windy Oaks, be allowed to set up in parking spaces again.

#### Customers 'walking away'

Seven winery owners spoke at the meeting, while several others sent letters. "We have customers who want to be outdoors," said Mark Manzoni, whose tasting room is located at the southwest corner of San Carlos and Seventh. "They are walking away from our business because we are not allowing them to taste outdoors."

Manzoni said he's heard "we are the only city that's not

# PANDEMIC CREATES INTERNATIONAL VOID DURING CONCOURS

**T**RAVEL BANS and numerous other uncertainties brought about by the coronavirus pandemic have cut into the number of overseas participants coming to Car Week, from Concours judges getting stuck in their home countries, to rare and vintage automobiles making the trip across the pond without their owners, and vice versa.

"It's been a complex year, because we have a lot of overseas judges, and many of them have been unable to travel," said Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance Chief Judge Chris Bock. "And some of them have gone to incredible lengths to be with us."

Some have spent a few weeks in Mexico or the Caribbean just so they could get into the United States, he said, while Canadians must fly in instead of drive. "One of our judges who lives in Canada is American, but his wife is not," he said. "So, he can drive in, but he has to go pick her up at Seattle airport."

International judges' efforts to make it to Pebble Beach this year have "been a tribute to their devotion to this

# Supes require county workers to get vaccinated

Health dep't. has low vax rate

WHILE MONTEREY County has spent vast resources on getting the public at large vaccinated against Covid-19, a surprising 40 percent of its own health department and hospital employees have not been immunized against the disease, according to officials.

Faced with the poor vaccination rates among county employees, and other factors, including the rise of the more contagious delta variant and the possibility of skyhigh costs for mass testing, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors last week mandated that all workers, except those with religious or medical exemptions, get immunized.

The new policy will take effect Aug. 16, at which point workers will have 30 days to provide proof of vaccination or an authorized exemption. Workers will also be required to certify their vaccination status, either by using an app created just for county workers or on paper.

"I don't think we have any alternative" than to approve a vaccine mandate, District 2 Supervisor John Phillips said.

# Scenic property owner takes house to the bank

County health director Elsa Jimenez told the supervisors that an estimated 40 percent of health department workers have not been vaccinated, while Janine Bouyea with Natividad Medical Center said the number of unvaccinated employees at the taxpayer-funded county hospital is 39 percent. The supervisors did not seem surprised by the low vaccination rates.

#### **Expensive tests**

In lieu of the vaccination mandate, the supervisors had the option of requiring unvaccinated workers to submit to weekly Covid-19 tests. But the cost of testing employees at the health department and Natividad would have been about \$800,000 per month, just for those two departments.

The county's staff proposed a 10-week deadline for workers to get vaccinated, but supervisors believed that was too long. They agreed six weeks was enough time.

"I feel 10 weeks is much longer than we need to hold

#### Sunset and Bach Fest

The Carmel Bach Festival, a nonprofit, took in \$515,308 in federal tax dollars — \$164,429 through the shuttered-venue program and \$350,879 in PPP money — while Pacific Repertory Theatre, also a nonprofit, received a total of \$527,771, including \$202,888 in shuttered-venue funds, with the rest coming from payroll grants.

Sunset Center, which also received \$577,500 in taxpayer-funded subsidies from the City of Carmel in 2020-2021 and is getting \$750,000 this year, received \$911,794 By MARY SCHLEY

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Council denies Pastor's bid to TEAR DOWN COMMUNITY ROOM

THE CITY council on Tuesday unanimously denied Monaco businessman Patrice Pastor's bid to tear down the little building behind the former bank building at Seventh and Dolores, forcing him to redo his plans for a residential-commercial complex set to cover three lots south of Seventh.

He could also take the city to court.

The fight is over whether the 600-squarefoot "community room" that was built behind the former savings and loan building designed by architects Walter Burde and Will Shaw in 1972 is historic and should be preserved. A city-hired historical consultant said it's not, and therefore it could be torn down without affecting the larger corner building that's now a steakhouse, but the historic resources board in May said it is, which prompted Pastor to ask the city council to overturn that decision.

Planning director Brandon Swanson recommended Aug. 3 that the council back the HRB, which found that the two buildings represent the work of master architects and function as a pair, so removing one would threaten the integrity of the other.

Swanson also said that the former bank complex could be listed on the state's historic register, even though it's not eligible for inclusion on the city's list or the national register, so it must be treated as historic under California environmental law.

#### 'Why are we here?'

But attorney Anthony Lombardo argued that the city council last year already determined that the property "does not constitute a historic resource," a determination that lasts until October 2022, and therefore, the HRB should never have been asked to discuss whether tearing down the community room would comply with the

Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties in the first place

"If it's determined ineligible, it is not historic, and the ordinance says it only has to conform with the Secretary of the Interior's standards if it's historic," he said. "So, I don't think we should even be here this evening."

Nonetheless, he also reiterated the findings of historical consultant Meg Clovis, who said the little building is not significant. Lombardo hired another consultant, Anthony Kirk, to review her findings. Kirk said he agreed with Clovis' analysis.

"There is no evidence to support the conclusion of the HRB that this building is significant," he said.

"And that's not my conclusion, that's the conclusion of your own expert, Meg Clovis, the peer reviewer, Dr. Anthony Kirk, and in fact every city council from 2001 to 2020 where this subject has been discussed."

#### 'Work of art'

A parade of architects and residents defended the former bank complex because "it is a fantastic architectural work that reflects the skill and creativity of two of the Monterey Peninsula's most important and influential architects," and it "enhances downtown," as resident and former planning commission Ian Martin put it.

Martin called the complex "a work of art."

Speakers said tearing down the former community room would compromise the significance of the former bank and argued that the HRB is well qualified to make the decision it did

Architect Thomas Hood said he's confident Pastor's architectural team can come

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
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
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

# The gavel falls

Verdicts, pleas and sentencings announced by Monterey County District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni

May 21 — A jury found Severiano Negrete Jr., 24, of Prunedale, guilty of assault by means of force likely to cause great bodily injury, battery causing serious bodily injury, and attempting to dissuade a victim from prosecuting a crime. The jury also found true an allegation that Negrete personally inflicted great bodily injury on the victim.

On April 1, 2020, Negrete was arrested by the Monterey County Sheriff's Office for assaulting his 64-year-old father. Negrete punched his father multiple times in the face and body, causing a nasal fracture and other serious injuries. From the jail, Negrete repeatedly called a third party and asked her to contact his father and request that he drop the charges against him. Negrete asked the third party to take his father to the sheriff's office to drop charges before he went to court. The recorded phone calls were discovered during the investigation into the original offenses.

Negrete faces a maximum sentence of nine years in state prison. The Honorable Rafael Vazquez presided over the four-day trial.

May 21 — During the month of May the District Attorney's Office's Bureau of Investigations, in cooperation with the Department

of Fish and Wildlife and other state and local agencies, conducted cannabis enforcement operations targeting unlicensed cannabis cultivators in south Monterey County. In total, these operations resulted in the eradication and destruction of approximately 5 tons of illegal cannabis. Similar enforcement actions will continue throughout the year.

In California, cannabis cultivation for personal and recreational use is legal; however, cultivating more than 6 plants is presumed to be for business purposes and, therefore, requires a state and local cultivation license. Cultivation over this limit without the requisite licenses violates both criminal and civil laws, and may result in a felony conviction, substantial fines and fees, and civil liability.

The illegal cannabis seized during these recent enforcement actions underwent laboratory screening and testing and was found to contain harmful pesticides and dangerous heavy metals.

In contrast, legal cannabis product undergoes significant laboratory testing and screening to ensure product safe-

# **Community Engagement**

ANYONE WHO'S been paying attention knows how much public works crews detest having to clean garbage, dog-poop bags, booze bottles, sand, seaweed, and other burned and unburned unmentionables out of the five city-provided fire pits on the beach. Anyone who's been paying attention also knows that fires are only allowed in those five pits — nowhere else on the beach — and they can only be lit between the hours of 4 and 10 p.m.

If you know all that, and you follow the rules, this warning is not for you.

If you know all that but don't follow the rules, or if you don't know the rules, it is.

After recalling a conversation with an impassioned individual who was very upset about illegal beach fires, Sgt. Jeff Watkins, during a recent video talk with city administrator Chip Rerig, repeated the regulations and warned they are backed by a punch in the wallet. "We don't want to see you burning driftwood — it's very toxic, and it's bad for the environment," he said. "Don't burn your trash. The stuff you bring down to the beach — pack it out."

Tiki torches, barbecues and lanterns are also banned. Mini fires fueled with propane are allowed on Carmel Beach south of 10th Avenue, but you're not allowed to burn anything else in them.

#### **Educate first**

Signs at every access point lay down the law, which is also posted on the city's website, and the police department has hired extra private security to patrol the beach on weekends to "educate" ignorant/scofflaw locals and visitors as needed. They even have pamphlets to hand out, Watkins said.

But when all else fails, anyone who lights a fire on the beach where it's not allowed can be written a citation and fined \$1,000, he pointed out, because the police depart-

ment "is here to uphold, educate and enforce the beach rules," and when asking nicely doesn't work, what's left is punishment.

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
At Monday's special city council meeting, councilwoman Karen Ferlito complained about the 15 illegal beach fires reported in June and said cleaning them up "is an arduous task" for the Carmel Cares volunteers who pitch in to do the work.

"I'd like to see as much as possible improvements in the security patrols and the coordination with the police," she said.

Police Chief Paul Tomasi said the city is working with a new security company and is training the guards, who patrol the beach during the evenings following a briefing at city hall at 5 p.m.

Ferlito said she wants them to start at 4.

"I have no problem asking them to come at 4, if that's what the council wants," Tomasi responded. "But there will be a cost associated with that."









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# Trailer, tools stolen from group that helps kids

A TRAILER that the Kiwanis Club of Pacific Grove uses for children's fundraising events was stolen Wednesday from a parking lot in P.G., a member of the group told The Pine Cone.

Someone on Wednesday at about 5:30 a.m. stole the 10-foot-long white trailer, which had been parked in the lot of First Awakenings restaurant at 300 David Ave.

"The trailer has all the tools and equipment we need to do pancake breakfast fundraisers," member Larry Sands said. "The money generated supports children's charities." The Kiwanis Club of Pacific Grove's mission is "to im-

prove the lives of children and their communities."

There are surveillance cameras nearby, though it's not clear if the theft was caught on video. First Awakenings owner Craig Bell reported the crime to the Pacific Grove Police Department.

"The equipment inside included three portable griddles a burner for syrup, tables, signs, and all the utensils used for cooking and serving pancakes and sausage," Sands said. Sands estimates it will cost \$5,000 to replace the trailer and its contents.

The Kiwanis Club of Pacific Grove has an event Saturday from 9 to 11 a.m. at the city's community center, 515 Junipero, to support the Pacific Grove Youth Center. Monterey Firefighters Local 3707 is loaning the group its griddles, and other equipment so the event can still go on.

"Without them, we would have had to cancel the event," Sands said. "We are very appreciative of their support."

The Kiwanis club is asking for donations on its website, kiwanispg.org, to replace the stolen equipment.



# **Businessman charged** with molesting child

THE MANAGER of a family-owned Pacific Grove dry cleaning business was arrested last week on suspicion of lewd acts with a teenager, according to the Monterey Police Department and a person who knows the family of the alleged victim.

Monterey Police said in a press release last week that officers served a search warrant the Monterey house of Jin Jung, 48, of Monterey, and arrested him on two alleged charges related to inappropriate contact with a child. The

dry cleaning business Jung manages, Cypress Cleaners, is located on Grand Avenue in Pacific Grove.

"Jung was booked at the Monterey City Jail on the following charges: Lewd and lascivious acts with a minor, and annoying or molesting a child," according to Monterey police. "His bail was set at \$100,000."

The police added that Jung was arrested after claims of a "lewd and lascivious act involving an adult male and a minor." Detectives also "believe there may be more victims."

#### Family struggles

The alleged victim is a teenage girl, according to a man who knows her family. Her parents and siblings live in an apartment in Pacific Grove that Jung rented to them for \$1,000 per month. The girl's father worked at Cypress Cleaners for many years before quitting once the allegations surfaced.




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
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# Supervisors select commissioners to redraw their own districts

A CHAMBER of commerce leader, a former elected official and a Cal State Monterey Bay employee are among the 15 people selected last week to help redraw districts for the county's five supervisors — a process that takes

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place every decade using data from the U.S. Census. The commission will hold online hearings and mapping sessions before recommending the updated boundaries to the supervisors.

With no-growth movements having dominated the county coastal regions for the last 40 years, even as thou-



sands of homes were being built in the Salinas Valley, the county's population center has shifted inland, and so has the political power. Meanwhile, Monterey County had a lower percentage of Hispanic people in 1970 than today - which means some of the county's political priorities have shifted, too.

Because of that, redrawing supervisorial districts is no routine matter, and the county received a total of 58 applications to search on the redistricting commission.

"This list is a good mix, in terms of racial and ethnic diversity, and it's almost a 50/50 split on gender, so it's a good mix of folks," 1st District Supervisor Luis Alejo said at the July 27 meeting.

The new advisory redistricting commission will hold several public meetings before recommending the updated boundaries to supervisors late this year.

Three commissioners each are assigned to the county's five districts.

The commissioners for District 5, an area that includes Carmel, Monterey and Pacific Grove, are Monica Lal, interim CEO for the Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce; Amy Sands, a national security consultant, and Shanieka Jones-Firek, a CSUMB employee.

The commissioners for the other four districts are as follows:

District 1: Nathalia Carrillo, Sergio Sánchez and Ernesto González

District 2: Cosme Padilla, Steve Tansy and Vincent Ferrante

District 3: Ron Eastwood, David Kong and Steven McDougall

District 4: Jane Parker, Maria Magana and Annalisa Mitchell

Parker, was the county supervisor for the 4th District until last year.

Besides their names, ages and addresses, applicants were asked other information, including gender, racial or ethnic background, language fluency and political party affiliation. They were also supposed to reveal any possible conflicts of interest. When the U.S. Census data is released in September, the commission will hold public meetings to get comments on proposed redistricting maps. Meeting schedules will be posted on the county's advisory redistricting commission webpage.

The board of supervisors must adopt an ordinance amending the county's supervisorial districts no later than Dec. 15.

# Fully vaccinated C.V. woman infected with coronavirus

WHEN ANA Lykken began coughing and sneezing on a trip to Palm Desert last week, she blamed it on allergies. Days later, the Carmel Valley resident — who is fully vaccinated - found out she had coronavirus.

Lykken, 47, and her husband, Michael, were visiting his parents when her symptoms began on Sunday, July 25.

"We were shopping, and I went down an escalator and all of a sudden I had to cough really badly - like something was caught in my throat," Lykken told The Pine Cone this week. "After I coughed I didn't think about it again. But that night I was sneezing and sneezing. I couldn't stop. I thought I was having an allergy attack.'

The next day was more of the same a lot of sneezing, which isn't considered a Covid symptom and which she attributed to the dusty desert environment. On Tuesday, July 27, she took an antihistamine and felt better.

#### Negative, so far

During their trip home the day after that, though, the couple, both of whom got their second vaccine shots in early May, purchased a Covid test kit at a drug store as a precaution since their 11-year-old daughter is too young to get immunized. Their 13-year-old son is vaccinated.

"I thought, 'Covid is out there, I better get tested before we pick up the kids from my parents' house'" in Carmel Valley, she said. "I tested that night, and it came up positive." (A professional Covid test after that confirmed she was infected.) Her husband tested negative. The manufacturer of the home tests they used offers results in 15 minutes.

Since then, Lykken has stayed away from her kids as much as possible, and so far, nobody else in her household has been infected. Her husband has tested negative several more times since her diagnosis, and her parents, whom the Lykkens stayed with in Palm Desert, are also vaccinated and were negative.

"I was in the car with Ana for 11 hours on the way back home, and we shared drinks the entire time she was symptomatic because we thought it was allergies," Michael said. "You would think I would have gotten it."

#### Delta responsible

Other than being a little tired, having a slightly elevated temperature for one day and some mild lingering nasal congestion, Lykken's appetite never waned and she generally felt fine, just a little off.

'Then I lost my sense of taste and smell" a day after testing positive for the virus, she said. "They were gone." For fun, Lykken's son gave her an Oreo cookie topped with yellow mustard because he didn't believe she couldn't smell and taste.

"I didn't taste it at all," said Lykken, whose senses returned Monday. "He finally believed I couldn't taste anything after that."

Monterey County Health Department officials told Lykken that the highly contagious delta strain, which they said accounts for about 95 percent of new coronavirus cases, was probably responsible for her infection. So-called breakthrough cases are not rare, but vaccinated people who get the virus usually don't have severe symptoms. The health department does not release data on the number of cases and hospitalizations for vaccinated people versus unvaccinated people. However, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said breakthrough cases occur in "only a

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# An officer who's definitely a breed apart

WHEN STATE parks peace officer Briana Kennedy-Feldhaus goes to work every morning, her partner rides with her, as he has for the last few years. A consummate listener, he doesn't chat her up in the car or on the trails, but when he does open his mouth, people — especially bad guys — pay attention.

Tyr is a 4-year-old German shepherd who, like Feldhaus, works for state parks. The K-9 team is assigned to Big Sur, which was the beat of the state's first such duo in 1969. According to Daniel Gant at the California State Park Canine Foundation, as the program evolved, a dog was also used to assist rangers at Hearst Castle.

Since the program's inception, more than 70 rangers have served as K-9 handlers. There are 19 teams statewide, including Feldhaus and Tyr.

Tyr is from the Czech Republic, where Gant and Feldhaus said many successful working dogs have originated in the last few years. He's smart, but not bilingual. Feldhaus had to learn the commands in Czech because, she was told, "It's easier for you to learn a few phrases than it is for him to learn English."

There's no such thing as a typical day for the pair, and

**Meet the Artist – Dr. Michael Smith, Painter** *August 19th, 2 – 4 pm*  that variety is part of the job's appeal for Feldhaus, who clearly relishes her work. Sometimes they go to special events like Big Sur Fire's fundraising muster in July, where they meet friendly children who pet and fuss over Tyr. Other times, they patrol the parks, explaining their features to visitors, helping find lost hikers or protecting the area and its visitors from criminals.

"Tyr is trained in tracking and apprehension," Feldhaus said. He does regular bite training, during which he brings down an "agitator" — a brave person who stands in for a miscreant and tries to distract or otherwise evade the dog.

Tyr can sniff out narcotics and somehow manages to walk through the woods of Big Sur without ever chasing a squirrel, rabbit or deer. "When he's working, he's working. He has a clear on-and-off switch," Feldhaus said, although she noted that he generally has

little interest in other animals — except dogs. She reported her partner also gets bored on his days off, which she knows because Tyr lives with her.

"He just wants to know when we get to go back to work," she said. Training is constant, as she doesn't want to let him pick up any bad habits when they're at home. Sometimes the pair goes to training sessions with other K-9 teams, where they're exposed to novel situations, like helicopter rides or working in the surf line. (Tyr's a good swimmer and loves splashing around in the Big Sur River.)

The idea is to familiarize the teams with as many scenarios as possible, so nothing takes them by surprise. Tyr also likes to climb, and when he's on assignment, he can be so focused, "he'd try to run through a wall," to achieve his goal, Feldhaus said. It's her job to assess the situation and make sure scaling a cliff or performing some other dangerous maneuver is worth the risk.

#### **Retirement plan**

State parks assesses prospective handlers' initiative, physical fitness and motivation. Their records are also reviewed. "They want a well-rounded officer," Feldhaus, who is also an EMT, said.

Tyr's food and veterinary care, along with that of the 18 other dogs that work in teams throughout the state, are supported by taxpayers. The California State Park Canine Foundation (rangerk9.org), an all-volunteer nonprofit group, also contributes. "We support training and equipment that may not be funded by the parks department," according to the foundation's website.

Also, since the dogs don't have Medicare, the foundation helps with their healthcare expenses after they've retired.

For now, however, Tyr has many productive years ahead. And Feldhaus is all in. "I have the coolest job in the world," she said. "That dog is my best friend, and seeing him learn and grow and change is so rewarding."

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




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
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# With salmon on the decline, feds could limit fishing too, so orcas can eat

BECAUSE KILLER whales feast on salmon in local waters throughout the winter and spring — and salmon fisheries have declined locally — the National Marine Fisheries Service has extended what it deems "critical habitat" for the marine mammal to Monterey Bay.

So what does this mean for those who live here? For one thing, it could lead to restrictions on salmon fishing in the bay.

The federal agency is seeking to add an amendment to the Pacific Coast Salmon Fishery Management Plan what would set an annual "salmon abundance threshold" to assure orcas have enough to eat. "The whales may be unable to find sufficient prey to maintain their energy stores, leading to declines in their health, reproduction and survival," a statement from the agency reads.

The proposal would close "areas" of Monterey Bay to recreational and commercial salmon fishing from Oct.1 to March 31.

#### Will it make a difference?

According to part-time Pacific Grove resident Dr. Charles Greene — a scientist who pioneered the field of conservation oceanography, and who has studied the impacts of climate change on marine animals — the local salmon population is doing poorly, and it's not only due to the appetites of orcas.

"As the ocean warms, the salmon population in the southern end of the range is becoming more stressed," Greene told The Pine Cone. "Water use practices in California are also harming salmon. They swim up rivers to reproduce, and a lot of that water is being used by agriculture."

With less water in coastal rivers and streams, temperature becomes too warm for salmon to survive. "The salmon die before they can reproduce," he said.

Greene said the ag industry needs to leave more water in the rivers and streams. "The industry needs to be much more efficient with its use of fresh water," said the scientist. "If not, we have to accept that the things in nature we value will be lost."

As for limiting fishing in Monterey Bay to save more salmon for orcas, Greene suggested it will be "helpful, but not enough."

The local orcas are part of what's called the "southern resident" population, which according to the federal Marine Mammal Commission has a population of 74. Killer whales are found in every ocean, and the global population is estimated to be about 50,000. Researchers divide their Pacific Northwest population into three segments, which they say are genetically distinct: Alaska residents, northern residents and southern residents.

"Two of the three pods of southern resident killer whales spend much of the winter and spring foraging for multiple runs of salmon and other species off the West Coast," the federal Marine Mammal Commission reports. "They are found as far south as Monterey Bay."

#### Striking a balance

The feds hope to boost the local population of orcas while still allowing some fishing.

"The goal of the proposal is to reduce impacts on Chinook salmon fisheries that meet the prey needs of southern resident killer whales when prey abundance is low, while still providing fishing opportunities," NMFS officials say.

Previously, only inland waterways along the coast of Washington state had been considered critical habitat for orcas. Now that critical habitat has been expanded to include some areas off the coasts of Washington, Oregon and California. The protections extend south to Point Sur. The newly protected areas encompass 15,910 square miles.

The NMFS first established critical habitat for orcas in 2006. By declaring a place critical habitat, the federal agency can then require "special management considerations or protection," such as restrictions on fishing.

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
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# Council wants to meet in person

CITY COUNCIL members want to return to in-person meetings next month, even if that means confining unmasked people to a separate part of city hall and concurrently broadcasting the proceedings on Zoom, they told city administrator Chip Rerig Tuesday.

The Carmel Pine Cone

Councilman Jeff Baron said he is in "vehement support of in-person meetings," starting in September. "Public participation has really dropped off," he said.

Rerig last week began requiring his employees to wear masks whenever they're in a city facility or working in proximity to each other, regardless of vaccination status, and members of the public have been required to mask up inside ever since city hall reopened months ago. Those rules would apply to people attending public meetings, too.

Coronavirus cases among the Carmel population have been very low, even with the delta variant. According to the Monterey County health department, three people in town have tested positive for the virus since June 15. But if people can't wear masks, such as for medical reasons, Baron said, after the council starts meeting together again, they should be required to sit outside council chambers and allowed in only to speak at the podium.

The foyer contains a TV, so they could watch the meeting from there without mixing with everyone else and possibly putting them at risk, he suggested.

Rerig said he and his staff are committed to doing whatever is necessary to keep people safe, including figuring out how to offer meetings in person and on Zoom at the same time.

"As the parliamentarian, I would want to ensure the meetings flow well," Mayor Dave Potter said.

Councilwoman Karen Ferlito suggested people who aren't vaccinated or won't wear masks could be barred from city hall and forced to watch and participate via Zoom.

The next regular council meeting is set for Sept. 7.

"I am very much looking forward to sitting in my very comfortable green chair again," Baron said.

Also at the Aug. 3 meeting, planning director Brandon Swanson suggested the council approve a resolution that would reaffirm Rerig's unilateral authority as "emergency services director" due to the local emergency created by the pandemic. But since a similar resolution passed by the council in March 2020 remains in effect, the new one never came up for a vote.

In the weeks and months that followed the council's approval of that resolution, Rerig used his authority to shut down the beach on busy holidays, allow restaurants to serve outside in parking spaces, impose a curfew, suspend parking enforcement, prohibit gathering or doing anything on the beach other than exercise, and change or sidestep other city rules in light of health and safety needs.

Theis asked why the council was being asked to approve another resolution. "Was there confusion?" she asked. "I'm trying to understand, if it's still in place, we're just confirming that it's still in place?"

"There might have been some confusion" when the governor reopened much of the activities in the state June 15, Swanson said, but he confirmed the March 2020 resolution will remain in effect until the council votes to terminate it.

In addition, "having this conversation in public would allow the city council to give direction on other rules, such as mask requirements and allowing certain uses outside that are supposed to be inside things like that," he said.


The council never voted on the second emergency resolution, but had lots of conversation about tasting rooms, parklets, masking rules, vaccinations and public meetings.

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
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# PG&E upgrades cause traffic delays

m HE}$  PG&E work that's been tying up traffic at the mouth of Carmel Valley for weeks is an upgrade of equipment to monitor pressure in the gas mains, not only to improve reliability of natural gas service in the Monterey Peninsula, but also safety of the gas mains, the utility said.

The work got started last month. According to Deanna Contreras of PG&E, the company is replacing what they call a gas regulation station.

The upgrades will utilize SCADA technology, which will enable PG&E to better monitor the safety of its gas lines, and more specifically, "maintain safe operating pressures," by getting information in real time.

Contreras said the utility company is also making upgrades in other parts of the state. "We're enhancing safety throughout our territory," she explained.

# BSLT park in Salinas passes hurdle

A PUSH by the Big Sur Land Trust to turn a 73-acre piece of farmland in downtown Salinas into a park got a boost Tuesday when the Salinas Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend relocating a proposed road and rezoning the land — two requirements for the plan to move forward.

Located at 618 Sherwood Dr., the property is part of Carr Lake, a 480-acre dry lake bed located in the heart of Salinas. The former owner of the 73-acre piece, the Ikeda family, sold it to the land trust five years ago for just under \$4 million.

#### Can't pass up

Plans for the park call for open space, walking paths, playground, picnic tables, benches, play courts, skate spot, restroom, and a dog play area.

Once a reservoir, the lake was drained in the 1920s. But it fills up with water during heavy rains, providing valuable flood control for nearby neighborhoods. The water from three creeks flows into the "lake," and from there it passes through a variety of channels before reaching Elkhorn Slough and eventually, Monterey Bay.

At Tuesday's planning commission hearing in Salinas — the commission's first in-person meeting early last year - lifelong resident Alfred Diaz Infante spoke out in favor of creating a park.

THOSE WHO want to know exactly where the traffic jams are during Car Week and what events are taking place in which locations and when now have a couple of Monterey County tools at their disposal.

"Public safety agencies in Monterey County are coordinating planning, public information and first response efforts throughout Car Week," a county spokesperson said, including the sheriff's office, fire departments, the California Highway Patrol, city police departments and the Monterey County EMS Agency, all of which "have actively been working together for several weeks to adequately prepare for an increase in visitors and motorists."

In addition, the county's office of emergency services is sending alerts as needed to anyone who texts "CARWEEK" to 888777, and the county has an online "daily event tracker" that includes traffic alerts and links to live traffic cameras.

event," he said, speculating that nonetheless, the restrictions and uncertainties are keeping a dozen of them away.

"The people who have not been able to get travel visas are devastated," he said, including entrants, spectators and journalists who would normally be here, some of whom haven't missed a Car Week in years.

"It's become a truly international show," he said. "That's one of the things that's really changed since '70s and '80s — it has become the world's Concours."

Gordon McCall, who runs his own large event at the Monterey Jet Center with wife Molly and also oversees car selection for the Quail Motorsports Gathering, which he helped found, has seen the impacts, as well.

"It's the unpredictability of quarantining for the car owners," he said, because they wonder if they will be confined to hotel rooms for two weeks upon their return from the United States.

"That has been a deal killer for a fair number of Eu-

ropeans I've been dealing with," he said. "And it's been changing regularly." He said the same is true of Asian participants.

Carrie Theis, whose family owns the Hofsas House hotel in Carmel, said many of her international visitors who return year after year will not be here. "I usually have several rooms rented to my European guests for Car Week, and they all had to cancel," she said. "Even the Canadians are having a hard time coming here."

#### They stand out

McCall also speculated the impacts of losing much of the international contingent are visible not so much because it is a large group, but because it stands out.

"They're very noticeable, because when you think about someone making the commitment to travel overseas to show their car, normally they are amazing cars," he said.

For the Concours, Bock said about 20 percent of the vehicles on the show field are owned and exhibited by people from outside the United States, and shipping has been as problematic as traveling.

"We have some cases where the cars have come, but the owners can't," he said. "And in other cases, the owners are

here, but the cars are lost."

Travel bans and other restrictions have also affected sponsors.

"Some of the European manufacturers who have been supportive of the event are having trouble getting here and getting their cars sent to the Concours," Bock said.

But he noted that last year, even when there was no Concours at all, sponsors helped raise more than \$1 million for charity.

McCall said the gap left by international participants is being filled by others who can now take part in Car Week events, whether as spectators or participants.

"It's created opportunity for people who maybe didn't consider it before or maybe thought they didn't have a shot," he said, "and they tried this year."

Theis said she's also seeing domestic travelers filling the void.

"The demand still seems to be high, since I am sold out for the week. I am seeing some new guests who are driving here rather than flying," she said. "Many of my guests have said that they are very much looking forward to coming back to Car Week and love the fact that most events will be outdoors."

off on this," 5th District Supervisor Mary Adams said. "I think unvaccinated employees need to be spurred into action."

#### Will they be fired?

Monterey County has not determined what the punishment will be for employees who refuse to get vaccinated after the deadline. Asked about it Tuesday, county spokeswoman Maia Carroll said, "That is still to be determined."

And county administrative officer Charles McKee told news reporters Wednesday that the county is considering the "enforcement mechanism" of the mandate, but also said it would weigh the "nuances of each individual situation."

The Pine Cone asked county health officer Dr. Ed Moreno why so many employees in his health department have not yet been vaccinated.

"I don't have any information on that, so I'm not really prepared to talk about that today," said Moreno, who deferred the question to McKee. McKee said the county is trying to determine that figure.

Supervisors last week also made a change in masking requirements for government buildings. Everyone, regardless of vaccination status, will now have to cover their noses and mouths in all county offices starting Aug. 16. Moreno gave no indication this week he's considering another indoor mask mandate, like other counties have imposed, but said he still recommends people, regardless of vaccination status, wear masks indoors in public areas.

#### Most docs immunized

With coronavirus cases climbing, mostly among the 26 percent of Monterey County adults who are still unvaccinated, Dr. Steven Packer, president and CEO of Montage Health, Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula's parent company, announced this week that the company will require its employees and doctors, except those who are exempt, to be fully vaccinated no later than Oct. 1.

"Every employee throughout the Montage Health enterprise will need to be fully vaccinated against Covid-19 to remain employed," Packer said in an email message to workers.

Of 2,783 Montage Health staff employees - which

includes nurses and other staff who care directly for patients, as well as others who don't — about 360 of them are unvaccinated. About 99 percent of doctors who work at CHOMP are vaccinated, according to spokeswoman Monica Sciuto.

"We are still confirming with employees if they received vaccinations elsewhere, and are asking for proof of vaccination," Sciuto explained.

#### Increasing cases

Despite the more infectious delta variant, it has not yet caused a big number of county residents to be hospitalized. As of Thursday, the county said 23 people were hospitalized with Covid-19. Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula reported it was treating eight patients who were infected. The case rate for the county is 5.4 per 100,000 people, while the test positivity rate is 3.5 percent. About 74 percent of those over 12 in the county have had at least one vaccine shot, and there was a 3 percent increase in vaccinations for the 12-17 age group. Salinas leads with 80 percent of its citizens having had at least one shot, while that figure is 74 percent for the Peninsula.

The health department this week reported 126 new coronavirus cases in two days.

The delta strain is so prevalent that it now accounts for nearly all of the new coronavirus cases in Monterey County.

"What we are seeing now here locally is that it appears that about 95 percent of the specimens from Monterey County residents with Covid-19 are due to the delta variant," Moreno said.

allowing tasting rooms to serve customers outdoors."

Ken Spilfogel, who runs Flaherty's, and Bashar Sneeh, co-owner of Dametra and several other restaurants, argued for keeping their parklets past the Sept. 14 deadline.

"Our customers are asking for more outside than I've seen in quite some time," Spilfogel said. "Parents with kids definitely do not want to be inside."

Sneeh said the recent requirement that everyone wear masks in city facilities, regardless of vaccination status, shows that the virus is presenting a real threat again, and therefore, restaurants should be allowed to continue serving outside in parklets.

Only Rich Pepe said the city should get rid of them.

"I guess I'm the lone dissenter," he said. "I'm taking the

parklet down at Vesuvio, because no one really wants to sit out there — it's cold and foggy and damp."

He also implied that some restaurant owners are falsely claiming financial distress. "We all got millions of dollars" in stimulus money, Pepe said. "They're all just trying to get free seating."

Pepe said the parklets cause more parking problems than they're worth — a sentiment more or less echoed by upscale clothing store owner Todd Tice, who said he even had a customer drive here, fail to find parking, drive back to Monterey and then take an Uber to his store.

"I just don't see how we can keep continuing to lose these precious downtown parking spaces," Pepe said. "There's nowhere to park," and the congestion is terrible.

Ferlito argued for returning the restaurants and tasting rooms to normal operating rules.

"I don't think we can continue to ignore our general plan, our local coastal program and our local policies any longer," she said.

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Ferlito suggested many residents "are afraid to come downtown" because they don't feel comfortable walking past parklets, and she said tasting rooms are just retail establishments, which means they're not allowed to conduct business outside.

#### Unvaccinated stay away

Councilman Jeff Baron suggested business owners only let vaccinated people inside, which might motivate those who are left out to get the jab. "We are in this situation because people are not vaccinated," he said, referring to rising case numbers. "It's within this community's power to do our own little part of reining this in."

Restaurants, retailers and tasting rooms should only allow customers who have been inoculated to come in, he suggested.

"We are letting the tail wag the dog," he said. "We are letting people who are voluntarily unvaccinated jerk the entire economy around. And I think it's time to stand up and say this is really not acceptable."

Still, councilwoman Carrie Theis said, it's safest for people to be outside, so the city should let them. "People are starting to get cautious about this new delta variant," she said, something that wasn't on council members' minds when they set the deadlines for removing the parklets.

By consensus, with support from Mayor Dave Potter, councilman Bobby Richards and Theis, the council agreed to let tasting rooms start serving outdoors on their own property through Sept. 12. But those without access to private property are out of luck, since the idea of giving them their parklets back only got support from Potter and Theis.


The family, the insider said, is struggling to find another apartment, but they've not found one they can afford.

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

# Big Sur campground sells for \$28 million

A PRIVATE campground down the coast, Big Sur Campgrounds and Cabins recently sold for an astonishing \$28,000,000, according to county records.

The seller of the campground is Big Sur Campgrounds Inc., and its chief executive officer is listed as Jonathan McQueen. The buyer is Big Sur CG Owner LLC.

Shaded by towering redwoods and situated alongside the Big Sur River at 47000 Highway 1, Big Sur Campgrounds and Cabins was founded in 1953 by Don Mc-Queen and the late Walter Trotter, according to the campgrounds' website. McQueen bought out Trotter's interest sometime in the 1970s.

Located 25 miles south of Rio Road on 11.62 acres, the campground offers 70 campsites and 25 cabins — there are several types — along with a camp store, a bath house, a playground, staff quarters, an office, a laundry and even a swimming hole.

Meanwhile, a 69-acre property located just across Highway 1 from the campground known as Ewoldsen Point also sold last week, for \$2 million.

The seller is an LLC headed by Jonathan McQueen, while the buyer is Big Sur CG East Owner LLC.

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was, other realtors involved in the transaction and information about the buyer.

He described the house as "a unique and iconic property for Carmel and along Scenic Road," since it is fairly understated and occupies a large property, providing a lot of outdoor space. It's also on a stretch of Scenic south of Eighth where no parking is allowed across the street, so the views are unobstructed.

"When I look at real estate, it's the things you can't change about a property that make it special," Allen said. "It's not granite counter tops and stainless steel appliances. It's location and view."

He told The Pine Cone the house was on the market for just a few days.

"The key to any real estate deal is finding the right fit — finding the right buyer," he said. "This property was a perfect fit for this buyer."

Allen said all parties are "very happy" with the deal. "I think the folks who are buying this house will enjoy it for years to come," he said. Allen doesn't know whether Morrison will live in it part-time or full-time. to create this oasis in the middle of the city," she suggested.

Another local, meanwhile, noted that more than 100 people sent in letters backing the park, while more than 1,000 signed a petition. The vast majority who spoke out, including some in Spanish, supported creating the park.

But some have concerns about it. A woman who only identified herself as Vicki said she lives nearby, and she fears the park would become a magnet for crime and homelessness.

"For the past 5 to 10 years, I've struggled with homelessness and trespassing on my property," said the woman, who warned the park could attract "trash, graffiti and a gang presence."

Commissioner John Meeks pushed back against fears that crime and homelessness will blight the future park. "The public needs to know that the park will be closed between sunrise and sunset, and there will be police oversight," he said.

Planning commissioner Rosa Gonzalez made a motion to approve the steps needed to let planning for the park continue, and the vote was unanimously in favor.

Next, the proposal moves on the Salinas City Council.



## **Thomas Robert Steiny**


Born November 16, 1928; died July 25, 2021

# Editorial

# What's going on?

WE'VE WRITTEN extensively over the years about the unfortunate tendency of Americans to take their good health and prosperity for granted. None of the stuff that makes our daily lives so good happened by accident, folks. From the shoes on your feet, to the food on your table, to the roof over your head, the car in your driveway, the shops, schools and medical offices in your town, the cop on the beat and the laws he enforces, to the Constitutional rights that protect our lives and liberty, etc., etc. — all of it took centuries of effort and innovation to pull off. If only for your own personal happiness, you must be respectful of this fact.

And yet, with a propitious and very current example of human ingenuity staring us right in the face in the form of the coronavirus vaccines, a large number of people are not only ungrateful for it, they refuse to accept it. Including, it turns out, 40 percent of the people who work at the county health department.

If you give everyone in the public the benefit of the doubt and assume they've intelligently assessed the costs and benefits of the coronavirus vaccines, it's easy to see how some people might have been reluctant to accept the shot two months ago when Covid 1.0 seemed to be on its way out the door. Considering the vaccines' highly publicized side effects, when the disease didn't seem imminently dangerous, it was understandable that some people decided not to be vaccinated. And yet, as of this date, more than 75 percent of Monterey County residents have been vaccinated.

Meanwhile, it's not just the public you find over at the county health department. The employees are (presumably) qualified to work there and they spend each and every day at or near the coronavirus data and information center for Monterey County. In other words, they're above-average in intelligence, education and experience, and much better informed than the ordinary citizen.

Which makes it extremely concerning that health department workers have a lower vaccination rate than the people you sit next to at a restaurant or happen to pass on the street. Is this because they're sure the disease is less dangerous than everyone else is being told ... or that the vaccines are more dangerous? It's got to be one or the other. Yikes.

One very encouraging sign is that at least 98 percent of doctors at CHOMP have been vaccinated, and that's a group of men and women who are not only highly educated and have tons of experience, they know firsthand about the dangers of Covid and the benefits of the vaccines. But the people at the health department are smart and knowledgeable, too ... right?

Throughout the pandemic, the public has for the most part had no option but to follow the mandates of the health experts and government officials in


IN LAST week's column, we began exploring the life of capitalist Alexander MacMillan Allan of Point Lobos. He had begun his career in the Chicago area as an engineer and architect, and initially came to California in 1894 to build a racetrack at Ingleside near San Francisco after having built other successful racetracks in the Midwest. In California, Allan soon added a track at Oakland and later, in 1899, the Tanforan track near San Bruno.

# **History Beat**

He came to Monterey in 1897, in hopes of reviving the troubled Carmelo Land and Coal Company mine in Big Sur. The mining didn't work out, but in 1898 Allan purchased 640 acres at Point Lobos and moved his wife and three young daughters there to accelerate development of a city, Carmelito, which had stalled under the prior ownership.

As an engineer of diverse skills, in 1900 Allan was contracted to create an elaborate water park on 35 acres at Washington and Main in Los Angeles (the superior courthouse is one of several buildings on the site today). Chutes Park opened in February

1901. The centerpiece was a 500,000-gal- Canning Co. added a second cannery at lon man-made lake with 350-foot-long Cayucos. chutes on which visitors could slide in boats from a height of 75 feet into the lake. The park also included a theater, pony rides, a deer park, a miniature train, an electric merry-go-round and a playground.

For the adults, there were bowling alleys and billiard halls.

With the success of the park in Los Angeles, Allan began adding attractions at Point Lobos to turn it into a summer resort. He built cottages on some of the lots of Carmelito that visitors could rent. He also arranged with the Japanese whalers to bury the remains of a 94-foot finback whale to bleach the bones. After a few months in the ground, the bleached skeleton was un-

earthed and mounted as a

display. In the fall of 1901 Allan partnered with his Japanese tenants at Whaler's Cove, a group headed by Gennosuke Kodani, to harvest abalone.

In February 1899, a bill had been introduced in Sacramento to restrict abalone fishing by limiting the season, prohibiting sales, and requiring any harvested to measure a minimum of 16 inches across.

#### **Racetracks and abalone**

That summer, residents of Monterey and Pacific Grove petitioned the county to restrict fishing for abalone. The efforts at legislation died and by 1901, Allan believed the proposed restrictions were unlikely to become reality. He and Kodani partnered in a commercial abalone business. The Japanese had previously dried

the abalone for export. In February 1902, Allan took delivery of machinery to set up an abalone cannery at Point Lobos. They canned the meat and sold the shells to curio shops and jewelers.

While Kodani looked after the abalone business, Allan built another of his racetracks. Ascot Park, just south of the Los Angeles city limits, opened in December 1903. That same month, George Snell became the new manager at Monterey's Hotel Del Monte.

Realizing Allan lived nearby, Snell soon called on him for improvements to the hotel's racetrack. Allan advised about the work that would be needed to make it a first class track useable in the rainy season. The hotel's board would only approve \$3,000, which Allen used for adding drainage and widening and grading the track to regulation.

#### Earthquake

Allan's next big project was in Sacramento, where, in 1905 he designed and supervised construction of the State Agricultural Park, which included a racetrack and several other buildings. That year his Point Lobos



# Hooray for Cal Am Dear Editor,


Given that almost all letters to The Pine Cone involving Cal Am Water are generally of a negative nature, I feel it is also important to mention a very positive recent experience.

A few days ago around 5 p.m., a significant water leak was discovered on our grounds at Hacienda Carmel which was quickly determined to be coming from an underground potable water supply pipe.

The location of the leak necessitated shutting off the water to our entire community of well over 300 residents. In addition to members of our own grounds crew being called into action, we also placed a call to notify Cal Am. As our crew began saw-cutting concrete and digging to find the source of the leak, a Cal Am service truck rolled into the site. The service technician was a very pleasant young man named Ryan, who immediately helped assess the issue, as well as providing valuable advice to our crew along with tools and equipment to help get the leak repaired. Ryan continued to stay onsite with our crew well after 9:30 p.m. to oversee restoration of the water supply, again providing valuable advice on reopening the main shut-off valve incrementally while also bleeding off air in the pipes to avoid any further potential damage.

up with a new design that incorporates the small structure.

"I think it's entirely possible," he said, and would be "an asset to the community."

Lombardo acknowledged the level of "feeling for the architect who designed this building" and the community's "affection for his work," but repeated the fact the council determined a year-and-a-half ago it is not a historic resource and therefore can't be treated like it is.

Swanson disagreed, saying that state law required the historic review. "The action that the council took last year was whether the property was eligible for the Carmel Historic Resources Inventory," he said. "That doesn't take it off the books for the state register. That is why it went to the historic resources board."

Council members sided with Swanson and the architects, and said they also tend to back the decisions for their boards and commissions. "Cutting off this 'ancillary building' would be a great detriment to the remaining building," councilwoman Karen Ferlito said.

Councilwoman Carrie Theis said she couldn't separate the smaller building from the main structure on the corner. She further commented that Pastor and his Esperanza Carmel development company need to "learn and respect our history and our community, and I think that's what the public is trying to tell them right now."

Councilman Bobby Richards said it would be "really difficult for me to overturn one of the lower commissions," especially in light of the strong, one-sided public opinion expressed at the meeting.

"I think it's really important for us as council members to listen to public comments," he said.

Mayor Dave Potter agreed with everyone else.

"I think it's a good opportunity to send a message to the developer that not everything that's conceived of will necessarily fly," he said.

Their vote was unanimous to deny the appeal and back the HRB's decision.

ing Judy out with us again.'

"So she put me in an orphanage for three months, and they went back out on the seas," she said.

Parham showed artistic talent at a young age, and used art as a coping mechanism during a childhood that often was solitary.

"We moved around, always going back and forth between Alaska and Carmel Valley, and I had to be by myself a lot," she said. "So I would draw. I would sing. I would talk to myself. Sometimes a teacher would look at something I drew and say, 'Oh, isn't that nice?,' then hang it on the wall. But I never saw art as something I was going to do forever."

At 18, on Carmel Beach, she met Bill Parham, a big-

wave surfer from Hawaii who was dating her best friend.

"He was so good looking and cute that I couldn't stand it," she said. "We connected and I fell in love."

They were married before she turned 18, and rented a cabin-like house on Carmel's truck route for \$75 a month. Bill found work as an apprentice plumber; Judy waited tables at a restaurant next to the Carmel Post Office.

They bought a Volkswagen bus, pulled out the back seat to make room for a mattress, a Coleman stove, and his scuba-diving equipment, and took off across the United States to visit his parents in Virginia.

#### North, to Alaska

"Then we drove up through Niagara Falls, all the way across Canada, and ended up in Juneau, Alaska, where my dad flew Bill into the mountains in the helicopter to go gold diving in freezing-cold water," she said.

"We stayed there for almost two years. I worked and he went diving. We'd go fishing. We'd go hunting. Bill shot a





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moose once, cut it into pieces, and packed it all the way out by himself," Parham said. "He was an adventurer and so was I. We just loved what we were doing."

In 1964, they returned to Carmel Valley, where Bill found work as a plumber, and his boss, Eric Scarlett, allowed them to live in his plumbing shop.

Bill later served as a board member for Gateway Center in Pacific Grove, and the Los Banos Grassland Water District, was president of the Central Coast Cattle Gun Club, and volunteered for seven years with the Carmel Valley Fire Department, serving as fire chief in 2000 and 2001.

Judy gave birth to the first of their three daughters, Kim Parham, in '64. Her second, Stefanie Carminati, came along two years later. Her youngest, Melissa Parham, was born in 1969.

Unspeakable tragedy struck the family when Judy was pregnant with Melissa.

"My father flew some goat hunters into the Alaska mountains and landed the helicopter on a slope," she said. "As he was walking below the helicopter, it slid down the hill and the blades decapitated him."

#### An artistic awakening

In 1991, the birth of her first grandchild, Jeffrey Domenighini, inspired an artistic awakening in Parham, who began to take art classes at Monterey Peninsula College from various instructors, most notably Robynn Smith, who challenged her to paint a picture based on a childhood experience. Judy painted a fishing boat about to capsize in a ferocious storm.

A few years later, she snapped a photo of a giant spiderweb that fascinated her grandson, created a painting from the photo, and entered it into an art contest at the National Steinbeck Center.

"Bill and I were sitting in the audience when the judge, who was from the Crocker Art Museum (Sacramento), pointed to my painting and said, 'This is one I really want to discuss..." remembered Parham, who won \$1,000 with her second-place award. "I was just shaking when he called my name. It was a breathtaking moment for me."

Parham, a four-time grandmother, favors watercolor, but also paints in oil, specializing in the wild birds, insects and flowers she sees near her home. She also has created a series of greeting cards bearing images of her art. Her work can be seen at the Carmel Valley Art Association, 2 Chambers Road, in Carmel Valley Village.

on April 17, and Allan and his daughters went up to meet the train. They had a lovely evening and spent the night. They were abruptly woken the next morning by the San Francisco earthquake and made their way in their night clothes to the street. Allan recovered their clothing so they could dress. The family walked to Golden Gate Park and stayed with friends for several days until they could finally take a train back to Monterey.

#### **Political defeats**

The toll on Satie was too much. She was ill for most of the following year and died at home in Point Lobos on Feb. 28, 1907. She was 41 and left Allan with three daughters, ages 10 to 14. There were servants to help raise the girls, while Allan went back to work. That summer he built the original Santa Anita racetrack near Arcadia.

The next year, Allan provided plans for major improvements to Tournament Park in Pasadena. Execution of his ideas depended on the passage of a \$50,000 city bond. Another 1908 election took more of his attention. Allan ran for Monterey County Fifth District supervisor with the

hearty endorsement of the Monterey Daily Cypress newspaper. Despite that, he finished a distant third to Dr. J. L. D. Roberts, founder of Seaside in 1888, who had the Salinas Californian's endorsement. The Pasadena bond issue was also defeated.

In February 1909, Allan turned his attention to Sacramento, where Senate Bill No. 673 was another attempt to regulate abalone harvesting. Allan argued before the senate committee on fish and game that passage would force him to close his cannery.

He asked for exclusion of red abalone, which only breeds in deep water. It was the only abalone he canned. The committee agreed. Another bill passed with a slight impact to the business — the cost of a commercial license for non-citizens was raised from \$10 to \$20.

Concurrently, Tom Williams, who was in charge of the three tracks Allan designed in northern California, contracted him for another racetrack, this one in Tijuana, Mexico.

Amid his business commitments, Allan never lost touch with needs on the home front, especially when it came to his daughters and their schooling. According to the Californian of March 3, 1910, Monterey County School Superintendent Duncan Sterling praised the Bay school, as "one of the coziest schoolhouses in the county, and much of the credit is due to the enterprise

ty for the public. Among other things, legal cannabis is screened for THC levels as well as the presence of heavy metals, pesticides, and other dangerous chemicals. Investigation into these illegal operations is active and ongoing.

May 24 -- Monterey County Superior Court Judge Pamela Butler sentenced Victor Dimas, 39, a resident of Salinas, to 50 years in prison for committing three counts of forcible rape of a child under 14 years old and two counts of forcible child molestation. All of the offenses are violent felonies and are considered "strikes" under California's Three Strikes law.

John Doe No. 1 reported that Dimas, a close family friend, had raped and molested him on several occasions. Doe No. 1 was under 14 years old at the time the rapes began. Doe No. 1 also reported that Dimas had molested her multiple times beginning when she was 5 years old. John Doe No. 2 reported that Dimas had molested him on multiple occasions beginning when he was 5.

In addition to the prison sentence, Dimas will be required to register as a sex offender for life. A restraining order was granted prohibiting Dimas from contacting the victims for a period of 10 years, the maximum term under the law.

The Monterey County May 25 Multi-Agency Detail for Commercial Auto Theft concluded an investigation that resulted in the recovery of 35 stolen vehicles valued at approximately \$2.5 million. At the beginning

of April 2021, MADCAT investigators were contacted by a victim in Monterey County concerning two vehicles that the victim acquired through a trade. Both vehicles had an unregistered vehicle identification numbers. MADCAT determined the vehicles were stolen and began an investigation. They executed several search warrants and identified additional vehicles and suspects connected to the vehicle theft ring.

On Thursday, May 20, with the assistance of auto theft task forces from Santa Clara, Alameda, and Sonoma Counties, the California Highway Patrol Warrant Service Teams and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office SWAT team, MADCAT executed additional search warrants at eight locations in Santa Clara and Alameda counties. Those initial search warrants recovered 32 stolen vehicles, a large amount of U.S. currency, as well as evidence of the theft of thousands of gallons of diesel fuel. Thirty-year-old Michel Serrano was arrested Thursday in Oakland for charges related to auto theft and grand theft. Thirtyone-year-old Andres Ramirez-Riveiro from Castro Valley was arrested at his home for theft related charges.

Over the weekend, MADCAT investigators located three additional stolen vehicles connected to this case, for a total of 35 recovered stolen vehicles. They also located the vehicles that belonged to the victim here in Monterey County. This is an ongoing investigation.

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and energy of Trustee A. M. Allan, who threw himself into the work with characteristic enthusiasm, and made it possible for the district to build this model schoolhouse at comparatively little expense."

Following a fiveweek trip to the East, Allan returned and announced plans for developing his Point Lobos holdings as a tourist destination. The

May 22, 1910, Monterey Daily Cypress reported: "Mr. Allan intends to make this a great pleasure park without destroying the handiwork of nature." The plan included paths and picnic areas along with playgrounds "with swings, seesaws, merry-gorounds'

Allan also announced plans for an out-

> door aquarium, enclosing the rock gullies with dams to create large stone pools in which he proposed to house "porpoises, sea lions, tuna, jewfish, sharks ... all the large fish that can be obtained." # Vengeance may belong to the Lord, but the Padres claimed redemption

IN THE fall of 1961, Hadley Hicks' first season as Carmel High's varsity football coach, his Padres lost just once — a 14-13 heartbreaker against King City, the team that went on to win the California Coast Athletic League Division B crown.

The season might have qualified as a stellar debut, but Hicks had been entrusted with a six-year, 30-game unbeaten streak compiled by his legendary predecessor, George Mosolf.

For the Padres, "next year" couldn't come soon enough. Carmel's 31-man varsity roster in 1962 would include 11 returning lettermen, including senior Danny Holman, a kid Hicks believed was about to blossom in a big way.

"There was no doubt in my mind that Danny could play for any Division I university in California, and become a

starter for most, by his sophomore year. I felt he was that good," Hicks wrote in his 2012 autobiography, "So You Wanna Be a Legend – So Did I."

Holman had two obstacles to overcome. First, he carried just 152 pounds on a 6-foot frame, and he had a run-oriented coach who said he had no idea how to convert to a passing offense.

"Danny's passing stats were not very impressive because we didn't throw much," Hicks wrote. "If I had known how to utilize his great skills — if I hadn't been such a one-dimensional coach — I'm confident we would have beaten King City (in 1961) and 'the streak' would have lasted at least until Danny graduated."

Maybe so, but the Padres ran into another problem on opening day in 1962, a road game against St. Francis of

Mountain View, a San Francisco Bay area Catholic School with more than 1,000 students — all boys.

"God bless whatever athletic director set that up," quipped John Lefler, a backup quarterback and punter for the Padres. "We were a school with 600-some kids, freshmen through seniors, half of them girls. We were a little bit out of our league that day."

#### David vs. Goliath

The physical mismatch was epitomized by the one-on-one duel between Carmel slotback Tom Faia, 5-foot-7, 145 pounds, and the St. Francis player who covered him throughout the game, Tim Rossovich, a 6-3, 218-pound high school All-American.

Faia scored Carmel's first touchdown of the year in the early minutes on a 20-yard pass from Holman, giving the Padres the lead, then paid a price. Rossovich didn't like being embarrassed.

"The guy was an animal. He rattled my bones on every play," Faia said of Rossovich,

who became a consensus All-American at Southern Cal, helping the Trojans to an NCAA title, then an All-Pro defensive end for the Philadelphia Eagles. The colorful Rossovich also was notorious for stunts like chewing and

swallowing glass, and deliberately lighting himself on fire.

"He was so big, and after the third or fourth time he clobbered me, I started dropping passes," Faia said. "I lost my first-string status after that game, and only scored two more touchdowns all year."

#### **Battle of attrition**

St. Francis battled to a 9-7 lead at halftime, used its huge roster to wear down the Padres, and went on to win 30-13.

"It was really hot — that's what I remember," said Mike Oakey, a 175-pound backup tackle, who now lives in Fort Lauderdale. "I didn't get into the game because John Whittaker played both ways. He told me he could barely move after that game."

At 6-0, 199 pounds, Whittaker, a two-way tackle, was one of the biggest players on Carmel's squad, outweighed only by offensive and defensive end Jim Kelley (6-4, 207), center Grant Pollock (6-0, 208), and guard Charlie Davis (5-10, 204).

But what the Padres lacked in size, they made up in tenacity and conditioning, which served them well when league play began.

As the offense struggled to find a rhythm, the Padres' defense was impenetrable. In their first three league games, the opponent failed to score.

# He's joyful about singing the blues

THE HIGHS and lows  $\dots$  at 78, Lee Durley realizes he has hit every note during a lifetime of music that began in his father's church, moved onto frigid Denver street corners for a cappel-

la doo-wop performances, evolved onstage in bars and nightclubs in Boulder, Las Vegas, Reno, and along the West Coast, and ultimately put down its roots on the Monterey Peninsula in 1971. What a long,

strange trip it's been. His massive circle of friends has includ-

ed a Who's Who from the blues and jazz world.

Lou Rawls, Brook Benton and Marilyn Maye mentored Durley when he was just out of college.

Etta James came out of her dressing room at the Monterey Blues Festival to watch his daughter, Addie, perform onstage at age 7.

Durley's wife, Pami, had to shoo Gladys Knight out of her kitchen to end a debate over who was going to cook breakfast for the family.

■ He introduced one blues legend, B.B. King, to another, Clarence Carter, for the first time, then listened "like a fly on

the wall" as they clowned and exchanged amazing stories.

"There was a lot of drinking and partying, a lot of all-night jamming after a gig ... that's what the life has been like for me," Durley said.

"I've also seen a lot of drugs — I can't even tell vou how many friends I've lost to heroin and cocaine," he continued. "I worked with a lot of musicians who got into the heavy drug scene and ruined their lives. And I never saw those people have a good time. That was enough of a deterrent for me."

Durley was a minister's son who grew up in a family of singers in Denver, Colo. His voice deepened in his early teens and he wound up singing baritone parts in the

doo-wop songs he and three buddies, "The Thunderbirds," performed on street corners to impress the girls.

When he got to Manual High School, the track coach discovered he had an additional talent.

"One day, in the gym, he challenged a few of us to try to jump up and touch the basketball rim — 10 feet off the floor with our foot," Durley remembered. "Turns out, I was the one who could do it, so I ended up becoming a high jumper on his track team."

### **Rarified air**

Coach Gil Cruter knew a bit about high jumping. In 1936, Cruter set the world record by clearing 6-foot-8. Two years later, he set a new record at 6-10. Before Durley left Manual High, Cruter watched him jump 6-10 3/8, then sent the kid off to the University of Colorado with a full scholarship. At CU, Durley became the eighth person in history — world history — to clear 7 feet. (The world record by then was  $7-3\frac{3}{4}$ ).

"I really enjoyed going to college in Boulder, but I partied, man. If I could do it over again, I'd study more, but I was a party hound and I loved it," he said.

A vocalist and keyboardist, Durley started a band that played at fraternity and sorority parties on campus, and happy hour gigs at now-historic Boulder watering holes like Tulagi's and The Sink.

"I spent five years at CU, then headed to Vegas with a trio called The Contrasts. Our first stop was downtown, at the Fremont Hotel, which had 24-hour entertainment. We auditioned and got the gig," he said.

The gig was from 3 to 6 a.m., and Lou Rawls and Brook Benton were on the same bill at the hotel, where the headliners in the big room were Wayne Newton and Marilyn Mave.

After performing at Las Vegas casinos for two years, Durley began traveling under contract with restaurant chains, including Black Angus and Tia Maria - gigs that often took him to cities for six-month stints.

#### **Meeting Pami**

In 1972, he was performing in a Black Angus lounge when he met Pami, a former University of Nevada cheerleader who was serving cocktails.

"We made an instant connection and got involved right away," he said. "When it was time for me to move on to the next gig, Pami said, 'Well, I'm having a garage sale, because I'm going with you.' And we were together for 49 years."

Pami blessed Durley (who was already a father when they met) with two of his three daughters. She also was a gifted poet and lyricist who collaborated with him on hundreds of songs before passing away in April 2020.

By the time they met, Durley had been living for a year in Monterey, which he discovered while performing at a restaurant on Cannery Row.

### **Finding Monterey**

"I had never known of Monterey, but I fell in love with the place, fell in love with the people," he said. "Plus, the work was good — I found gigs really easily."

Though he's never needed anything but music to pay the bills, he ran his own business, Durley Electronics, for several years, with locations in Seaside and Marina, repairing Hammond organs and amplifiers.

He also hosted a nightly radio show for eight years, first at KRML, then on KIDD Magic 63 when he served as promotions director for Buckley Radio.

Durley's performance and writing styles — a blend of blues, jazz, R&B, rock, pop, and gospel — made him a popular attraction for five decades, and his vocals have been compared to Lou Rawls, Johnny Hartman, Joe Williams and Nat King Cole.

He has made countless appearances at the Monterey Jazz Festival, as well as the Monterey Bay Blues Festival, for which he served 26 years as a board member and talent director.

"Several years ago, we were able to bring Lou Rawls here for the Blues Festival," Durley recalled. "I hadn't seen him since my Las Vegas days, but the minute he saw me and said, 'I remember you! You were with that little trio out of Colorado — The Contrasts!' That blew my mind."

He is a board member for the new Monterey International Blues Festival, which is

#### expected to return in 2022.

Prior to the pandemic, Durley was performing at 10 gigs a week with various musicians, including Ray Paul, the other half of "Brotherly Love," a duo that plays for the residents at several assisted-living facilities on the Peninsula and in Salinas.

"That's the most gratifying thing I've ever done," he said. "We perform at places where people have varying degrees of Alzheimer's and dementia. Some are completely out of touch — unresponsive all week long, and no longer recognize their own relatives — but when they hear the music, we'll often see a response ... a toe tapping, or something like that.

#### A miracle every week

"I can't even tell you how many times Ray and I sat in the car afterwards and cried, either from pure joy, or from sadness, because we got to know these people, and this is the last stop for most of them. We see some sort of miracle every week."

Durley said the past year, without Pami, has been difficult — he says he's struggled at times to get through his songs — but he draws strength from his daughters and five grandchildren.

Durley is thankful to friends who recently contributed to a fundraiser to purchase a bench honoring Pami's memory at Mission Memorial Park in Seaside.

He also is buoyed by the audiences at his shows.

"As a performer, I'm more appreciative now," he said. "I used to do it for my own, selfish reasons, but now it's a reciprocal thing. I see how music impacts other people, and there's gratification there."

Durley performs Tuesdays (7 to 10 p.m. with Scotty Wright) at Cibo in Monterey, Wednesday's happy hour (5 to 8 p.m.) at Deja Blue in Seaside, and Thursday nights (6 to 9 p.m. with longtime partner Joe Indence) at the Cypress Inn. In a 7-0 conquest of Gonzales, Phil Zobel's 85-yard return of the opening kickoff set up the only TD, a 10-yard run by Dennis Hermanson.

In another 7-0 victory the following week, the Padres limited rugged Hollister to just 50 yards. Whittaker, Kelley, Zobel, Ken Friddle, Clayton Hilbert, Bart Whelan, Jim Markowitz, Dave Harris, Dave Preve, Bob Wells, Gary Mumford and Dennis Clark, all defensive standouts, earned effusive praise from Hicks, whose next goal was to get his offense on track.

That happened in week four, when Carmel won 25-0 in the rain and mud at Gilroy, where Faia, Hermanson and Terry Bishop ran for touchdowns, and Holman completed all five of his passes, including an 80-yard scoring strike to Al Tegtmeier.

#### **Holman arrives**

But Holman's "coming of age" came the following Saturday in the much-anticipated rematch with King City, the team that had ended the Padres' six-year unbeaten streak a year earlier. The Mustangs were riding a two-year winning streak of their own.

What was hyped as an epic struggle at Carmel High lived up expectations.

Carmel opened with a six-minute drive, capped by a 10-yard pass from Holman to Kelley, who made a diving catch in the end zone. King City struck back twice in the final minute of the quarter, scoring on a 57-yard run and a 49-yard pass – the first points scored against the Padres by a league opponent.

The Mustangs went up 21-7 in the second quarter on a 79-yard reverse, but Holman found Zobel with a 29-yard TD pass, and Carmel trailed 21-13 at halftime.

King City clung to a 21-19 lead late in the third quarter after Carmel's J.T. Thomas scored on a 2-yard dive, but the real fireworks were still ahead.

#### An unforgettable finish

The Mustangs intercepted a Holman pass with three minutes left in the game, but Carmel's defense held, and King City punted to the Padres' 8.

A Holman-to-Thomas pass advanced the Padres to their 40, but a 15-yard penalty moved the ball back to the 25. There were 90 seconds left.

On fourth down, with 75 yards to go, Hicks sent in a seldom-used play. Holman leaned into the huddle and said, "Roll right, halfback deep, J.T. up the middle for a long one."

Both Carmel tight ends ran 10 yards, then cut toward the sidelines in opposite directions, and wingback Dennis Hermanson also ran a sideline pattern. King City defenders went with them, leaving the middle of the field open for the 5-foot-5, 136-pound Thomas, who snuck out of the backfield, sprinted downfield, caught Holman's throw, and outran his defender to the end zone for an electrifying 75yard touchdown: 25-21 Carmel.

But an offensive lineman had moved before the snap. Five-yard penalty. No touchdown.

#### Eight seconds, 80 yards to go


Eight seconds left. Eighty yards to go. Hicks counterintuitively called the exact same play.

The Padres ran it to perfection. Holman rolled right, hit Thomas in full stride on the 45, and the speedy halfback sprinted the distance — again — to win the game. In the rich history of Carmel High football, Holman-to-Thomas

> (twice in a row) to beat King City might still be the most dramatic play ever.

In their remaining games, the Padres routed San Lorenzo Valley 39-6 (Holman threw four TD passes), clobbered Live Oak 31-0 (Gary Mumford returned an interception 104 yards), and rallied for a 19-13 victory over Pacific Grove to retain The Shoe trophy (highlight: 112 yards rushing by Zobel).

Kelley (tight end and defensive end) and Dave Harris (offensive and defensive tackle) were all-league on both sides of the ball, then played together on scholarship at Northern Arizona University. Mumford, tiny but tough, was the all-league at safe-

ty. Holman was the all-league QB for the second year in a row, earned first-team All-America at Monterey Peninsula College, then became the nation's eighth-leading passer at San Jose State. Whittaker played at Hartnell College, Whelan (nickname: "Dirty Bart") and Davis joined Holman at MPC, and Davis also played at Sacramento State.

#### **Bumped by Bradshaw**

Holman was the Pittsburgh Steelers' eighth-round draft pick in 1968, but never played in a regular-season game. He left the NFL after his team drafted two high-profile quarterbacks, Heisman Trophy winner Terry Hanratty in '69, and future Hall of Famer Terry Bradshaw in '70.

Holman played two seasons of semipro football for \$300 a game, then came home and became a popular local bartender. He died of a heart attack in 1996 at 51.

Hicks coached at Carmel High for four seasons, then taught and coached in Arizona, South Dakota, and Kansas. He died in 2016 at 83. His assistant coach, Dick Lawitzke, retired from Carmel High in 1988, and died in 2010 at 84.

Many members of the 1962 title team are still friends and neighbors today.



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
### Taste of Carmel remastered, Seaside celebrates Oaxaca, paella pop-up

THE CHAMBER of commerce's annual Taste of Carmel will get a whole new look and venue this year — and if it's a success, its long-running presence at the Carmel Mission on the first Thursday in October may be over.

"The event can't be at the Mission

this year because of construction," Kathrvn Morrissev, a member of the chamber board, told the community activities commission Tuesday morning. "And due to the impacts of Covid, the board of directors wanted to redesign the look and feel, and create something special and safe and outdoors in the downtown area."

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Instead of having 800 people gather for tastes of wine and small bites, the new Taste of Carmel will have long tables set up on Ocean Avenue between Junipero and Mission, where 350 guests will enjoy a three-course family-style dinner and wine. It will take place on Oct. 6, a Wednesday.

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#### Easing the burden

"Each restaurant will basically cater two to three tables," she said. One of the reasons for rethinking the event "was to make this easier on the restaurateurs, so they wouldn't have to prepare 700 to 800 bites of something."

"They'll have an opportunity to intimately engage with a small group of people rather than the masses,' Morrissey said. The same will be true for participating wineries.

Guests won't be able to choose which chef serves them, though, due to the logistical challenges that would present, she said.

The Taste of Carmel wouldn't be the same without The Money Band, which will perform on a stage set up at Mission and Ocean, where there will also be room to dance. VIPs will be treated to a reception on the rooftop of Vesuvio before the dinner.

Morrissey said tickets will go on sale Aug. 16 and will run \$125 for general admission and more, though she didn't say how much, for the VIPs.

#### **PR disaster?**

Former Mayor Sue McCloud objected to the whole idea of closing one block of westbound Ocean Avenue for the dinner, saying it would be bad for businesses downtown and would further confuse people who are already discombobulated by the parklets, if they're still around. (They are supposed to be removed Sept. 14.)

"I think you're setting a terrible precedent," by allowing the street to be closed from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m., she said. "I think it's going to be a public relations disaster, to be truthful."

McCloud suggested the chamber hold its dinner in the north lot at Sunset Center instead

But the street closures were not up for discussion, having already been approved under the city's new special events ordinance, community activities director Ashlee Wright said. She also reminded Mc-Cloud Ocean is often shut down for events, including the annual pumpkin roll, Car Week shows and the Christmas tree lighting, and furthermore, the dinner will be on a Wednesday in October, not a weekend or summer day.

Per the city's code, Wright asked the

community activities commission to make a recommendation to the city council regarding the chamber's request to serve alcohol on public property, which commissioners unanimously supported. (John Micek abstained, because he owns a winery that might participate.)

Information will be available at carmelchamber.org, and the organization is in the process of recruiting restaurants and wineries to take part. The Taste of Carmel is a fundraiser for the chamber, and if it's successful, she said, the new dinner format could become an annual event that replaces the former longstanding food-and-wine event at the Mission.

### Another new fest

The City of Seaside is collaborating with La Oaxaqueña and La Tortuga





"Once your order is complete, you can head home with the best Jewish food the Monterey Peninsula has to offer," organizers said.

### Montrio's new face

After being closed for renovation for six months and losing some of its key figures, including chef Justin Robarge and head mixologist Anthony Vitacca (who now works at the bar at the C Restaurant in the Clement Hotel), Montrio is set to reopen this month with a new chef, Adrian Diday, in charge of the kitchen. The restaurant is located in a historic former firehouse on Calle Principal in Monterey.

Diday, who grew up in Virginia riding horses and studied philosophy and religion in college, worked at worldclass restaurants throughout the country and overseas, including stints in one of Daniel Boulud's restaurants in New York City and at The Inn at Little Washington - both Michelin three-star restaurants — and most recently at Mission Point Resort.

His cooking style is described as being "dictated by what's fresh and seasonal, with a fierce adherence to technique," and his goal is "to make the food absolutely as perfect as possible."

Diday has also said he'll be sensitive to longtime fans of the restaurant who hope to find some signs of its former self when they return.

Plans call for reopening Montrio — which has dropped "Bistro" from its name — in late August.

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### P.G. coupon program 'big success'

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The Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce pronounced its latest restaurant coupon program - which was funded by the city's hospitality improvement district — "a big success.'

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The chamber distributed \$10-off coupons to hotel visitors to use in any of three dozen downtown restaurants, and later collected the used coupons and reimbursed the establishments for the discounts. Chamber spokesman Peter Mounteer said restaurants had received more than 3,772 coupons by the time the two-and-a-half-month program ended in June, guaranteeing a total of \$37,772 in reimbursements funded by extra fees on hotel rooms.

Last winter, the chamber ran a similar program encouraging locals to dine out in Pacific Grove restaurants and ended up distributing \$43,570 to participating businesses as a result.



in federal funds, including \$686,794 from the shuttered-venue program, with the rest in PPP.

"We are thrilled to be a recipient," said Sunset Center's managing director, Beth Bowman. "The shuttered venues funding allows us to be fully staffed and prepared for our reopening in September. We can

bring back furloughed employees as we emerge from a 16-month closure."

The Monterey County Symphony Association got \$102,875 from the program, along with just under \$260,000 in paycheck protection funds.

And the Monterey Jazz Festival, which has nonprofit status, tapped the Shuttered Venue Operating Grant program for \$1,099,222 after getting \$357,900 in PPP money.

The small Cowboy Music Festival got a total of \$22,716 from both programs.

More than \$2.1 million went to a privately owned Big Sur production company called FiveCurrents that produces major live events all over the world, including Olympic ceremonies. FiveCurrents' founder and president, Scott Givens, owns a home on the west side of Highway 1 near the top of Hurricane Point and used that address on the SBA applications for \$1,462,664 in shuttered venue funds and \$658,587 in PPP money. According to his bio, Givens "has more than 400 large and mega events to his credit during the last 30 years, including roles in 15 Olympic Games" and was awarded the Olympic Order, the highest honor given by the IOC, while his company has received 14 Emmys.

#### No PPP

Organizations that took in money from the shuttered-venue program but did not receive paycheck protection funds include the nonprofit Monterey Bay Aquarium, which received the maximum allotment of \$10 million, and Sand City-based California Roots, a for-profit company, which got \$2,014,314.

An aquarium spokesperson said the money will be used for \$8 million in payroll and benefits, \$1.5 million for utility bills and \$500,000 for insurance.

The operators of the Golden State Theater on Alvarado Street were given \$726,078, and Pacific Grove Dance received \$203.100.

Our chart compares the second quarter of this year with that of 2020, which is not a good comparison. For much of the second quarter of 2020, the market was totally shut down, so it is best to look at the figures for all of 2020. Santa Lucia, routine asking prices are now often topping \$4 million. It is breathtaking.

It is also thought-provoking. How much of the price increase is supply and demand driven, and how much is inflation? Another factor is interest rates. They are, and have been for a long time, extremely low. If inflation proves to be a real threat, not just a Covid short-term effect, rates will have to go up to cool off the market. There are lots of things to think about.

#### Number of sales

The number of transactions paints an interesting picture. We hit an all-time high with 441 transactions in the third quarter of last year, the same quarter that smashed the record for gross dollar volume. We just researched 10 years of our reports and did not find a single quarter with more than 400 sales. In the second quarter, the number of sales was 347, a bit short of the third and fourth quarters of 2020 but still robust. These are heady times.

# New Ferrari club chapter just for Monterey Peninsula aficionados

N AUGUST, Ferraris are a fairly common sight on the Monterey Peninsula, despite their exclusive place in the automotive world. But even during the quietest months of the year, when most of the tourists are gone and Concours is just a memory, resident Ferraris are frequently spotted on local roads and parked downtown — so it stands to reason the Ferrari Club of America should have a Monterey Peninsula Chapter.

Until recently, locals who wanted to be part of the Ferrari Club of America and participate in its events had to affiliate with its region that includes Northern California and Northern Nevada. As a result, most events were concentrated in the San Francisco area.

"When I first moved to Carmel in 2005, it became immediately apparent to me that those of us car people who live in the Monterey Bay area didn't really have the opportunity to participate in events that the folks in the San Francisco Bay area had," said Gil Lucero, a longtime Ferrari owner.

#### The start of it all

Fast-forward to the annual board of directors election in fall 2018, when Lucero and others started talking about creating a new Monterey area chapter so Ferrari owners here could organize and participate in events together without having to travel.

It took another year to organize the chapter, which was gaining momentum just as the pandemic hit.

"It was very shortly after we started the chapter that Covid happened and everything immediately shut down, so we hadn't really gotten started with activities," Lucero said.

But the new chapter's inaugural president, former

FCA Southwest Region President Tex Otto — who moved to Pebble Beach in 2014 — had plans.

"With the leadership of Tex and the rest of the members who wanted to see activities happen," Lucero said, "the Monterey Bay Chapter probably became most active chapter in all of the Ferrari Club of America in 2020."

And that's saying a lot, since the Ferrari club covers not just the United States, but Canada and Mexico, too.

"We quickly learned that driving events were entirely safe," Lucero said, since keeping distance from each other in cars is pretty easy. During drivers' meetings, everyone wore masks and took care not to put each other at risk.

"Every other club was kind of down and idle," he said.

# Kids, education win big, thanks to Concours d'Elegance

ITH THE coronavirus pandemic having forced the cancellation of the 2020 Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, there's even more reason to attend this year's event, which benefits Monterey County charitable organizations.

While the premier annual car week draws tens of thousands of enthusiasts to the Monterey Peninsula to celebrate some of world's finest automobiles, the event also has a humble purpose - helping more than 90 of the area's best nonprofit educational programs for young people. The funds are distributed through the Pebble Beach Company's philanthropic arm, the Pebble Beach Company Foundation.

While there was no event last year, donors and spon-

sors still gave generously, with more than \$1 million distributed to charities. Even more giving will happen this year, according to event planners.

"Together with these donors and sponsors, it looks like the Concours is once again on track to give about \$2 million to charity this year, as it did in 2018 and 2019," a Concours spokesperson told The Pine Cone.

#### Education

The Pebble Beach Company Foundation was created in 1975 to offer young people "the building blocks of success, starting with literacy and education."

"Education, especially literacy, is a central focus of the Pebble Beach Company Foundation," said Bill Perocchi, former CEO of Pebble Beach Company. "We believe that education is critical for individuals to rise out of poverty. The money raised for and by the foundation, and in turn distributed to our community partners, helps address this need."

Assistance from the Concours d'Elegance is especially relevant considering that a surprising 67 percent of Monterey County third-graders cannot read at grade level, and 25 percent of children under the age of 17 live below the poverty line, according to Concours officials. More than 50,000 of the county's roughly 440,000 residents require monthly food assistance.

"It is these figures, and ultimately these lives, that the Pebble Beach Company Foundation seeks to improve," the Concours says in promotional materials.

#### **Boys & Girls Clubs**

One of the Concours d'Elegance's most prominent beneficiaries is the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County, which has served more than 30,000 young

> people since its inception in 1968 and is one of the few nonprofits in the county that has supported youth consistently for more than five decades.

> The clubs, located in Salinas and Seaside, serve 600 kids per day with homework help, health and fitness programs, visual and performing arts and character and leadership development.

> The vision of the boys and girls clubs is simple but essential. "It is our goal that every child we serve performs at grade level, graduates from high school, completes post-secondary education or training, and earns a livable wage as a productive, healthy member of their community," the organization says.

The clubs have numerous academic



"CASA provides advocates for foster children," explained the organization's executive director, Esther Curtis. "Advocates speak up for children and make recommendations directly to a judge to ensure their emotional, physical and educational needs are met during their time in the foster care system."

Each volunteer receives 33 hours of training, which is put to good use assisting the more than 80 kids in San Benito County who are placed in the foster care system. The program was launched in 2007.

Besides raising money for charity,

Carmel Home Collection is hosting a display of Thompson's art at its two downtown locations through the end of next month. Owner Mark Lupo opened his first store on Sixth between Lincoln and Dolores in May 2020 and opened his second site a few weeks ago on Ocean between Dolores and Lincoln.

His dad was a car aficionado, and the young Thierry Thompson "embraced anything with wheels," he says. He raced bikes and go-karts with great enthusiasm and eventually pursued a career engineering, building and maintaining sophisticated open-wheeled race cars.

He studied art in college and later started his own advertising and graphic design business. As a commercial and technical illustrator, he worked on ad campaigns for car and plane manufacturers.

Ten years ago, the painter opened Light + Shadow Fine Art.



# Inside many a Pininfarina body, there beats the heart of a Ferrari

HEN WE admire an automobile, we often associate the appeal with the manufacturer. It might be Alfa Romeo, Bentley, Ferrari, Lancia, Mercedes, or maybe Cadillac or Chevrolet. Yet, apart from other aspects of the vehicle, we may actually be admiring the work of the designers.

Almost every year, the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance celebrates one of the legendary coachbuilders from around the world. Last year, the great carrozziere, or Italian coachbuilder, Pininfarina, was to be honored for its 90th anniversary, but the pandemic put everything on hold. A year later, Pininfarina will be present on the show field, with prewar and postwar vehicles, as well as Pininfarina Ferraris.

The company was established in Turin, Italy, in 1930 by Battista Pininfarina, who left a different design house to establish his own company catering to buyers who wanted custom bodies for their vehicles. His goal and his legacy have been an unprecedented standard of beauty, design, and craftsmanship.

"The company name, Battista's name, actually was two separate words — Pinin and Farina," but he petitioned the Italian government to join them, according to Miles Morris, a Concours Selection Committee member whose knowledge of automotive history seems secondary only to his love of the classic car industry. Morris is a third-generation collector who is head of Christie's International Motor Cars Division, and judges many events, including the Concours d'Elegance.

#### **Changing Dynamics**

Pininfarina's most famous and prolific collaboration was with Ferrari. In fact, during the 1970s, said Morris, Pininfarina was the only coachbuilder designing and building for the company. Today, the relationship no longer exists.

"The last pure Ferrari designed and built by Pininfarina was in 2017, before Ferrari went in house with its own styling," Morris said. "Despite a strong and longstanding relationship, the company realized it needed



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

programs that make learning fun and applicable to real-world applications, such as Engineering Everywhere, which has kids perform six to 10 engineering activities, each taking 45-60 minutes to complete, and Read Naturally, a program that individualizes reading proficiency, using audio support to improve fluency, vocabulary and comprehension.



Thanks to the Boys & Girls Clubs of Monterey County, this boy, and many other county young people, have a place to go for a variety of programs.

"Our staff and volunteers serve as mentors and advocates for our youth, offering every child opportunities, expectations, recognition and guidance in a safe and fun environment," the boys and girls clubs say. "Coupled with a focus on measurable outcomes, our formula for impact puts our mission into action."

Besides literacy and math, the clubs also offer their young members creative outlets, such as the art club, which allows kids of all ages to practice styles of different artistic eras. The club recently worked on pieces celebrating the surrealist and pop art movements.

Their completed artwork is later displayed in the Seaside and Salinas clubhouses and in the Marti Mulford Art Exhibit. Youth members and staff can vote on pieces to submit to the organization's National Fine Arts Exhibit.

The Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance helps the Boys & Girls Clubs with an annual automobile drawing, with all the proceeds from the \$100 tickets benefiting the nonprofit. The annual automobile event has also led to several scholarship opportunities for young people, and this year there is a new one.


In memory of famed automotive journalist John Lamm, who died in October 2020, the Concours announced last December that it had established the John Lamm Scholarships to support students in the field of automotive communications.

The scholarships complement the Phil Hill Scholarships and the Jules "J." & Sally Heumann Scholarships, which the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance established to support students in the fields of automotive restoration and design.

And like those, the John Lamm scholarships will go to students attending McPherson College in Kansas, which has a program emphasizing automotive communications, in addition to programs focused on automotive restoration design, technology and management. The Pebble Beach Company Foundation will act as the administrator for the scholarship.

"In addition to creating and caring for great cars, we need people who can capture their stories and convey them to future generations," Concours Chairman Sandra Button said. "That's what John did so well for decades, with camera and pen and computer. Lamm photographed and wrote about great cars — as well as the people who made history with them. He also did all he could to connect car people. He was both a communicator and a community builder."

Lamm's career spanned nearly five decades, and he covered everything from new cars to classics, mainly for Road & Track magazine. He served a stint in the Army and graduated with a journalism degree from the University of Wisconsin before beginning his career with MotorTrend magazine in the late 1960s, moving to Road & Track in 1975. He later contributed to Car and Driver and Automobile, and he wrote columns for Car Graphic in Japan and Wheels in Australia.

Lucero said the local club's activities usually have a charitable bent, too. "One of the things we're excited about and proud of is pretty much every one of our events has proceeds going to local charities, and we vary the charities to spread them around," he said. "We're not just full-of-ourselves exotic-car guys" who don't care about their community.

Otto said that during the past year, the new chapter has grown from 13 members to more than 40 and has donated \$3,000 to local charities. "I know there are a lot of Ferraris that are local that I see on the roads," he said, but they're not members. "I want to let people know we're around. We're a happy group that enjoys doing fun drives and weekend getaways."

#### It's about the people, too

Lucero, who had a "very modest upbringing" in El Paso, Texas, and lived in the Southwest for years before he ever saw a Ferrari in the flesh as an adult, said he got interested in cars as a pre-teen, though he doesn't really know why.

"For some reason, I just started borrowing copies of car magazines to read the articles and started building models, and my little bedroom was full of all these models that I had built over time," he said. "And I never imagined I would ever have such a thing."

A successful career in tech and executive-level management — including years with Lockheed Martin, program director for Radix Technologies and managing director of wireless systems for Boeing — allowed him to eventually fulfill his dreams of owning a Ferrari and other collectible cars.

"I've had a number of fun cars over the years, but Ferrari is particularly exciting to me because it's a relatively small company compared to other manufacturers, but they have a really rich racing history," he said. "I have always been impressed by how such a small company has risen to the top of the sport. They are the winningest team in Formula 1 history since the 1940s."

Lucero is the proud owner of a red 2013 458 Spider that he describes as "just awesome." The Spider is his fourth Ferrari. His first was a 308 — best known for being the car Magnum P.I. drove on screen.

"I've been involved with vintage and exotic cars for 20 years, now, and somehow, Ferraris always seem to get better," he said. Lucero also acknowledged that with the push toward hybrid technology — witnessed by the fact that Formula 1 cars are now all 6-cylinder hybrids rather than the big V12s of the past — the Spider will probably be "the last naturally aspirated mid-engine car Ferrari will ever produce."

Lucero said he appreciates the passion of those who own and drive Ferraris, and he noted longtime former Pebble Beach Concours Chief Judge Ed Gilbertson, who, like Lucero, is a past president of the FCA Pacific Region, worked to in-

still in the club the philosophy that "Ferraris are meant to be driven."

"We don't promote guys who just hide them in the garage and stare at them," Lucero said. "They're intended to get on the road — that's the reason for their existence."

But another former president, Bill Schworer, also observed that "It's the cars that brought us together, but it's the people and lifelong friendships that keep us in the club," Lucero said.

#### Driving at age 5

Otto said a major drive behind the new chapter is cultivating such friendships and opening the door to more Ferrari owners.

"We mainly bring fun people together to enjoy the camaraderie of Ferrari sportscars and life, along with the component of helping others out when we can through charity," he said.

Otto said he's "always been a car person," having grown up on a farm in Nebraska.

"I have been driving since I was 5," he said. "My dad was a car person, too."

His first Ferrari experience was at the hands of a friend who gave him a ride in



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

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

# This vintage ride comes with views, music and lots of attention

URE, YOU can see fancy cars at the 18th Hole. You can gaze upon them in action on the Tour d'Elegance. But unless you're lucky enough to own a vintage vehicle — or know a generous soul who does — looking is about as far as you're going to get.

That's OK. Those Duesenbergs and Rolls-Royces are a little fussy, and awfully grown up. Secretly, your inner child is screaming for a ride on a firetruck.

That's what Trevor Page, Raul Pantoja and Corey McVeigh of Red Engine Rides are counting on, at least. Their newly opened business offers tours to groups of as many as 10 people on the back of a restored, shiny red 1970 American LaFrance fire engine.

Pantoja and McVeigh are Monterey firefighters who have been working for four years as a team to drive a "tiller truck," which is a long fire engine, sometimes called a hook-and-ladder, with a tall ladder on a turntable at the rear. One driver — in this case, Pantoja — operates the front end, while the tiller driver, McVeigh, turns the rear wheels, which work independently. As you can imagine, it requires a lot of practice and teamwork to become proficient at maneuvering. They had a wonderful time and learned that a lot of people wanted to inquire about hiring the truck for birthday parties, group rides and the like. That, Pantoja said, was what sparked the idea for a business.

Page couldn't get the notion out of his head, so he joined forces with Pantoja and McVeigh, and the three of them did what any normal person would do. They went firetruck shopping.

"It took a while," Pantoja said.

#### Pandemic project

Through McVeigh, they found a truck that once belonged to the Boulder Creek Fire Department. McVeigh lives in the Santa Cruz County town along Highway 9, and in addition to his Monterey duties, serves as a volunteer firefighter there.

The decommissioned truck belonged to a retired fire chief in Boulder Creek. He'd been using it to take his children, and later his grandchildren and their friends on rides to celebrate birthdays and other special occasions.

The youngsters eventually outgrew it, and Page said that the owner wanted the truck to continue bringing joy to children. When he learned of the partners' business idea, he agreed to sell the vehicle to them in April 2020.





"We crush a lot of orange traffic cones" in training, joked Pantoja.

#### Holiday inspiration

The idea for Red Engine Rides came about two years ago. Page, who works as the special events coordinator for the City of Monterey, had met Pantoja, who sometimes applied for permits on behalf of the Monterey Firefighters union for events like their 4th of July pancake breakfast.

In December 2019, Pantoja was driving the union's firetruck in Pacific Grove's annual holiday Parade of Lights. He had some extra room on the rig and invited Page to bring his wife and two children, who were 4 and 6, to ride along. Although it had only 27,000 miles on it, the rig had seen better days. "On a scale of 1 to 10, it was a 4 1/2, maybe a 5," Pantoja recalled. But, he continued, "we're all mechanically minded."

McVeigh "was the mastermind" of the restoration, Page said.

All three have spent many of their off hours since spring of 2020 lovingly modifying and restoring the 50-year-old firetruck,

They removed the pumping gear but left the dials and levers for kids to play with. Two open-air, bench-style seats were installed (along with seatbelts) on the back, and the vehicle was completely repainted and restored. Page document-

#### ed everything on social media.

"It was an awesome pandemic project," he said. "It took almost a full year, working eight to 10 hours at a time," in a rented barn in Boulder Creek, where work was interrupted last August by the Lightning Complex Fire.

Page said McVeigh took time off from the Monterey Fire Department "to save his town." For several days, Page and Pantoja didn't know if the truck would survive and couldn't even get in touch with McVeigh to find out if he was OK. While McVeigh was trying to save his neighbors' Boulder Creek homes, the fire hit his own property, where others stopped it just short of the house, after a boat and tree in the yard were destroyed.


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

to take ownership of its style. But even today, we can see that Ferrari remains heavily influenced by what Pininfarina produced."

Manufacturers were always very pleased to be associated with the company because of its reputation for beautiful designs, according to Morris.

Consider the Ferrari 365P, Pininfarina's three-seat Berlinetta Speciale, which world-renowned automotive artist Tim Layzell shows in this year's Tour d'Elegance poster.

"The Ferrari 365P likely would not have been built had Sergio Pininfarina, Battista's son, and racing legend Luigi Chinetti not lobbied Enzo Ferrari for the chance to build this exceptional

mid-engine car on a racing chassis," Morris said.

Sergio Pininfarina ran the company throughout most of its heyday. He was succeeded by his son, Andrea, who died in a car accident in 2008, leaving the helm to his brother, Paolo Pininfarina, who runs the company.

"Ownership has been handed down through the generations," said Morris, "continually going through changes and consistently designing beautiful cars."

Today, a new marque, Automobili Pininfarina, is building entire cars, rather than solely designing and sometimes building bodies for them. A brand-new auto will be unveiled by the company in a public debut on the Concours d'Elegance awards ramp at The Lodge on Thursday afternoon, Aug. 12.

The headliner this year is the car that offered fierce competition to Porsche and Ferrari in endurance racing, including the fabled 24-hour race in Le Mans, in the late 1960s — the iconic 1967 Ford GT40MK IV — which is expected to fetch as much as \$3.5 million.

Other notable lots include a 1964 AC Cobra 289, a fully restored 1928 Bentley 4.5-liter Le Mans-style Tourer, a beloved 1955 Mercedes 300SL Gullwing that could go for \$1.5 million — and Tom Hanks' 33-foot 1992 Airstream travel trailer. Hanks used the Airstream, along with the special 2010 Ford F-450 Super Duty truck he bought to tow it, when he was filming on location over the course of 30 years. He decided to sell it, according to Bonhams, because movie production moves much more quickly these days (and filming on location is less and less common).





And, although Pantoja said, "The fire came really close to the barn," their truck remained unscathed.

Now, it's dressed in just the right shade of red, and the faded Boulder Creek logo has been replaced with one that says "Red Engine Rides" in large, white letters.

#### Inaugural ride

Its first paying customers took their trip on July 4. As Page related, Mitch Massey of Monterey saw the truck at the Alvarado Street Farmers Market on June 29, the Tuesday before Independence Day. He eyed it up for a while, then approached Page and asked if he could rent it for the holiday, when his girlfriend, Nancy Whitaker, would be in town. "Can you pick us up right outside my house?" he asked, and the answer was yes.

On Friday, he texted Page to confirm the sweet ride was going to be there and to mention that he was going to propose. Page rounded up some Champagne flutes and a bottle of bubbly, and loaded the man's custom playlist into the truck's sound system.

"She said, 'Yes,'" Page reported.

Rides are scheduled around Pantoja's and McVeigh's availability. Although it can be booked for special occasions and routes (like marriage proposals), there's a standard tour that begins at Dust Bowl Brewing Company on Del Monte Avenue and goes along Alvarado Street and Cannery Row, then follows the coastline to Lovers Point and Asilomar. It returns along part of the same section of Ocean View, so that people on both sides of the truck can enjoy the views. Riders can borrow used and restored firefighters' jackets to ward off the cold.

The engine noise is loud, but the music is lively and upbeat. Two recent passengers, Richard Ryan of Pacific Grove and Judy Burdick of Salinas, said they had a wonderful time. Burdick called her ride "joyous and exciting," adding, "I appreciated wearing the fireman's jacket, as the wind was very cold up there." Ryan said it was a "unique, fun experience" and that he "loved waving to everyone as we rode through Monterey."

#### **Business community**

Page believes the tour would be an ideal first outing for visitors to orient themselves to the area, with sound local advice from drivers who have patronized the businesses they're touting.

"It's all about being a team," Pantoja said. "It's being part of the business community, so we can promote each other."

The minimum age to ride is 3 - all passengers must be able to sit in their seats and wear seatbelts - and prices start at \$75. For more information, visit redenginerides.com.

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
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


