

## Pastor loses fight over 'historic' concrete wall

HE CARMEL City Council ruled Tuesday that property owner Patrice Pastor cannot move a section of decorative wall on the southern edge of the historic former bank complex at Seventh and Dolores and will have to redesign the project he is proposing next to it. Council members unanimously voted to overturn a 3-1 decision by the historic resources board in July that Pastor could relocate part of the pebble and concrete wall.

After a consultant chosen by the city concluded moving a section of the wall would comply with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties and the historic resources board agreed, allowing Pastor to proceed with his plans to build a mixed-use complex and underground garage, councilwomen Karen Ferlito and Alissandra Dramov objected.

#### 'Care deeply'

"As you know, I care deeply about historic preservation in our village," Dramov said at the Sept. 12 meeting. "That's why I feel the HRB decision of July 17 to allow movement of the decorative concrete wall at the complex should be overturned."

The wall was designed and crafted by Carmel Valley artist Brad Bowman when the bank complex was built in 1972 and features swirling, wave-like patterns made with pebbles of various sizes. Although it was altered in 2014 when someone lowered the height on Dolores Street and removed a chunk on the south side, relocating any part of it would "destroy the integrity of the complex" and would "set a bad precedent for the future," according to

## Work on busy highway won't be done until late this year

MOTORISTS WHO use Highway 68 between Highway 1 and Pacific Grove will have to endure several more months of lane closures and slowdowns due to Caltrans' latest construction project.

Crews with contractor Granite Rock Construction are working to "correct the slope" of two curves on the serpentine road, which has also seen two other major improvement projects in the last two years.

#### Again?

Even though crews recently repaved Highway 68, the state transportation agency says that the curves — one not far from the S.F.B. Morse Pebble Beach gate and the other near Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula — were banked too steeply and do not comply with modern design safety standards. The construction also includes a widening of the road's shoulder and new paving.

The work started on Aug. 22 and is expected to be completed sometime in the winter, Caltrans said.

"The traveling public can expect one-way traffic control each week on Sunday nights from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. and

# Fairgrounds in line for long-overdue upgrades

Monday night through Friday morning from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m.," the agency said. "Delays are not expected to exceed 10 minutes."

As part of the new construction — which required workers to tear up two sections on 68 that had recently been repaved — Caltrans has narrowed the road with concrete barriers west of the hospital and erected "share the road" signs and other warnings that drivers are in a "double fine zone," meaning the cost of traffic violation tickets will be doubled.

The speed limit has also changed to 30 mph from 40 mph in the areas when work is not underway.

This week, Caltrans said it was using one-way traffic controls between the entrance to the hospital and the S.F.B.

## Crime skyrocketed during homeless housing effort

■ Hundreds of emergency calls, several deaths at Marina hotel

HE NUMBER of police calls to a hotel in Marina used to house homeless people rose 900 percent before the roughly two-and-a-half-year program, called "Project Roomkey," ended in April, officials said this week.

THE MONTEREY Peninsula Water Management District announced Wednesday that its board of directors will decide in just a few weeks whether to use eminent domain to acquire Cal Am Water's Monterey system, which the company has said is worth more than \$1 billion and is not for sale.

On Wednesday, the water district said it will hold a public hearing on Oct. 10 at 5:30 p.m. at Middlebury Institute of International Studies in Monterey to consider adopting what's called a "resolution

of necessity," which would authorize the government agency to move forward with the forced acquisition of the Cal Am system and convert it to government ownership.

Cal Am says it's not for sale, but the water district may try to take it

#### **'Lower cost'** "The goal is to operate

the system at a lower cost, with better quality of service and with greater transparency and local control," according to the water district.

Water district general manager Dave Stoldt recommended in a report to his board that it proceed with an acquisition of the system. The district's announcement comes a week after directors met in closed session to consider scheduling the October public hearing.

Under state law, if the water district board adopts the resolution, it must contain several findings, including:

■ The public interest and necessity require the acquisition to happen.

■ The acquisition is planned in a manner that will be the most compatible with the greatest public good and the

The Marina Police Department sometimes only has three officers on duty, and the increased calls at the hotel required the department at times to ask for help

See page 15A. the council and brian brecarting total rife rife Conte that the council and most city officials had been unaware that homeless people were staying at the Country Inn & Suites in Marina as part of Project Roomkey. The state-directed, countywide plan most recently operated by the City of Salinas temporarily sheltered homeless people in hotels.

#### Fatalities

But police and fire officials said during a Tuesday Marina City Council meeting that while Project Roomkey was in effect, the number of service calls to the hotel just off Highway 1 spiked, which strained the departments.

"At a general hotel, we respond to 30 to 40 [calls] in a year's time," Marina acting Police Chief Steve Russo said. But at the Country Inn & Suites, "we went to 300 to 400 calls per year. The call volume in a place like that is significant on a small police department."

Officers responded to a variety of crimes at the hotel, including theft and drug sales, according to Russo, who told The Pine Cone Wednesday that several people died

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## **Council OKs new telecom law**

WITH BUY-IN from many of the residents who have engaged in the discussion since Verizon unsuccessfully petitioned to install five cell towers in their neighborhoods in 2019, the city council voted unanimously Tuesday night to approve "the strongest wireless ordinance possible to protect the special and unique characteristics of Carmel-by-the-Sea while remaining consistent with relevant state and federal telecommunication laws."

That was the assignment the city council gave to planning director Brandon Swanson and the city's legal counsel when the battles with Verizon began and the telecom giant accused the city of having outdated codes that don't meet federal and state guidelines for wireless facilities. During the past two years, tens of thousands of tax dollars have been spent on lawyers and city staff working on the new law, which has gone through several iterations. Early drafts received sharp criticism from the Stop Cell Towers in Carmel Neighborhoods Group that was formed to fight Verizon's subsequent effort to install a wireless antenna near La Playa hotel, and the group's lawyer, Andrew Campanelli.

But over the course of several meetings, the proposed ordinance was strengthened and refined and ultimately received approval, with some minor changes, from the planning commission last month.

#### The basics

Generally, the ordinance requires wireless carriers to propose locations for their facilities "that will be the least intrusive to community character and values," and it identifies the central and service commercial districts and the "community and cultural" district as the most compatible areas for such installations, followed by parks and theaters. All the residential districts are in the "least compatible" category.

It also calls for locating towers and

equipment on public and private property rather than in the public right of way — especially any spots that are "highly incompatible," such as streets in single-family-residential districts and near historic resources, and along Scenic Road.

The ordinance describes numerous design standards for wireless equipment, including height limits and other dimensions, shrouding and "stealth" concealment, noise, fire risk mitigation, finishes, lights, trees and landscaping, and security measures.

Most of the 11 speakers who commented at the Sept. 12 meeting urged the council to adopt the proposed law, including Tasha Witt and Christy Hollenbeck, both active in the Stop Cell Towers in Carmel Neighborhoods group. Much of the commentary carried with it an air of victory, with speakers thanking Swanson and other city officials, special counsel Gail Karish and others for their efforts to craft an ordinance strong enough to stand up to telecom companies seeking to install more technology here.

#### Not a landline society

"Our group recommends approving this draft ordinance," Hollenbeck said. "I know you've received letters from telecom companies and hope you will not weaken or compromise."

"Thumbs up," said Carmel Residents Association board member Nancy Twomey. "Let's make it happen."

Representing T-Mobile, Hannah Borris said her company, as well as AT&T and Verizon, still have concerns and asked that the draft be subjected to further review before the council votes on it.

"We were a landline society for over 100 years, and we've effectively gone wireless over the past 15 years," she said, adding that 97 percent of Americans have cell phones and 72 percent of California

## Traffic report needs a diagram

## The gavel falls

Verdicts, pleas and sentencings announced by Monterey County District Attorney Jeannine Pacioni

Aug. 18 — A jury convicted Miguel Angel Medina, 26, of Salinas, of robbery and conspiracy to commit robbery. Monterey Superior Court Judge Jennifer J. O'Keefe presided over this trial.

Just 10 days after Medina was released from prison, he ran into John Doe, a childhood acquaintance, in Oldtown Salinas. Doe and Medina walked to Bankers Casino where Medina noticed Doe had a large amount of cash from a recently cashed paycheck. Following a brief period at Bankers Casino, John Doe informed Medina he was going home in an Uber. Medina insisted that he would get Doe a free ride home and convinced Doe to go with him to a nearby bar where this promised ride awaited.

At the bar, Medina introduced Doe to his ride home, Sasshay Brooks. But Medina and Brooks planned to use this ride home for an opportunity to rob Doe. Brooks and Medina departed the bar with Doe and drove Doe home, where Doe expected to part ways with Medina and Brooks. But, as an excuse to get inside Doe's apartment, Medina and Brooks received Doe's permission to use his bathroom. After a short period in Doe's apartment, Brooks repeatedly pistol-whipped Doe

in his head, then Brooks and Medina stole Doe's cash, phone, and PlayStation 5. They fled together in Brooks' car. Doe suffered a concussion and received 17 staples to seal his head wounds from these pistol strikes.

On the date of the offense, as a condition of his parole, Medina was outfitted with a GPS ankle monitor. GPS records from this ankle monitor confirmed Doe's account of Medina's whereabouts throughout their time together on the night of the offense.

Medina, a longtime Norteño gang member, has two prior strike convictions from 2015 and 2018, both involving gang-related offenses. His present conviction marks his third strike conviction mandating a 25-yearsto-life prison sentence for the latest offenses.

After an 18-month search, the United States Marshals Service arrested Brooks in Alameda County this year. She faces trial in 2024.

Monterey County District Attorney investigator Jennifer Mendoza investigated this case along with Salinas P.D. Officer Devon Castaneda.

RED CROSS HQ COULD BECOME HOME

T'S BEEN awhile since the local chapter of the American Red Cross made the news. Pine Cone readers might recall the Carmel branch merging with a larger regional chapter in 2007. Or they may remember its battle with the city over replacing the windows in its modest office building in 2008. And of course they know about the services, classes and rescue missions the nonprofit supports.

Now, the Red Cross is seeking to sell its downtown chapter house for \$3.5 million.

Designed and built by Hugh Comstock Associates in 1955 on a single lot and then expanded to include parking and landscaping in 1966 after the nonprofit purchased the property to the south, the post adobe structure has seen minor alterations and updates over the years.

The 2,767-square-foot building contains one full bathroom and a half bath and is located on an 8,438-square-foot corner lot. While its use has been quasi-public, it's zoned for single-family-residential. The American Legion Post 512 is located next door to the south, and a large new home is under construction to the east.

Realtor Michelle Spataro-Russell of EXP Realty has the listing and describes it as an "extraordinary investment opportunity to acquire a unique property located in the vibrant heart of downtown Carmelby-the-Sea," considering its proximity to downtown shops, galleries and restaurants.

#### 'Endless possibilities'

She urges potential buyers to consider transforming the office building "into a spectacular new luxury residence" or a "thriving business," and said the property has "endless possibilities."

"With its prime location and ample space, converting it into a lavish living space would create an exclusive and opulent residence," she said in the listing's narrative. "Elevate the building's aesthetic, functionality and amenities to create a truly remarkable luxury home."

The property has also been identified in the draft housing element — which outlines how the city could accommodate a state-mandated 349 new housing units over the next eight years — as a potential site for high-density development.

The Red Cross chapter house at Dolores and Eighth is for sale for \$3.5 million. The buyer could turn it into an expansive luxury home, according to a realtor.


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## Pine Inn parking lot plan gets wait-and-see reception from council

m A}$  PROPOSAL to rezone the Pine Inn lot at Monte Verde and Sixth so it can accommodate eight relocated hotel suites — one of which would be used for employee housing — and covered parking received lukewarm support from the city

council Tuesday, with some open to the idea and others stridently opposed.

"I'm very supportive of moving forward," councilwoman Karen Ferlito said, since the project could include an employee housing unit and might inspire other innkeepers to make similar changes. "They're covering an eyesore. I think this could be a great improvement."

"I am not supportive of this," countered councilwoman Alissandra Dramov. "I'm concerned about the loss of open space." She also worried the zoning change could lead to high-density

housing and noted some nearby residents object and that development there could interfere with views from the First Murphy House and park behind it.

The lot is a bit of an anomaly, because it's close to the central commercial district but is zoned for single-family residences. It's surrounded by the Christian Science Church, the Tally Ho Inn, the Pine Inn and which would allow him to move eight of

the hotel's 49 rooms to the 8,000-squarefoot lot so he could remodel and enlarge some of the units in the main hotel building. The parking would remain but would be hidden by the new structure. The number of Pine Inn hotel rooms would not increase and the number of parking spaces would not decrease.

> Principal planner Marnie Waffle explained that hotels and motels are prohibited in the single-family-residential district unless they existed before Jan. 1, 1967, or have a use permit approved between 1967 and 1990. Multi-family-residential zoning can accommodate hotels and motels, and can also be developed with up to 33 housing units per acre (44 if some are affordable).

> Architect Erik Dyar described Gunner's vision for the lot, the Pine Inn Cottage Suites and Garage, and argued that a change in zoning "is the only way to solve a currently highly unsatisfactory situation

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## P.B. Co. signs contract for Spanish Bay golf course 'refresh'

THE LINKS at Spanish Bay have remained fairly untouched since the trio of Robert Trent Jones Jr., former USGA President Sandy Tatum and Tom Watson designed the course. But after 36 years, Pebble Beach Co. executives have decided it's time for an update and this week announced the hiring of Hanse Golf Course Design to oversee the course's transformation.

Gil Hanse started the Pennsylvania-based firm in 1993 and brought Jim Wagner in as a partner two years later. They share the philosophy that "golf courses are designed, restored and renovated in the field, as opposed to solely on the drawing board," and say they have kept their company "intentionally small" and have "patiently nurtured its reputation."

Hanse, Wagner and their associates have had a hand in designing notable courses all over the world, including North Carolina's Pinehurst No. 4, TPC Boston in

collaboration with pro golfer Brad Faxon, and the storied Colonial Country Club in Texas, as well as Australia's Royal Sydney Golf Club, Gavea Golf Club in Rio de Janeiro, and the Narin & Portnoo Links in Donegal, Ireland.

"We're thrilled to partner with Gil Hanse and Jim Wagner to redesign The Links at Spanish Bay," Pebble Beach Co. President David Stivers told The Pine Cone this week. "They have a great track record, and we look forward to working with them to help maximize Spanish Bay's potential."

## A bit of Scotland

In the 1930s, the Pebble Beach Company's sand plant at Spanish Bay was its only profitable enterprise. Nearly a half-century later, in November 1987, the Spanish Bay Golf Links opened on the former mining site, realizing a plan that had been envisioned since the 1970s. The late Marvin Davis, who had made his fortune in the petroleum industry and owned 20th Cen-

tury Fox, had by then added the P.B. Co. to his portfolio, too.

Jones was already in Del Monte Forest working on the new Poppy Hills Golf Course when he was hired alongside Tatum and Watson to design a links-style layout reminiscent of the old Scottish courses laid out on sandy seaside wasteland with bristly grasses and stiff prevailing winds. The Pebble Beach coastline is reminiscent of the rugged beauty of the country that's considered golf's spiritual

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## Caltrans changes plan to reopen highway

TO REPAIR repair damage from last winter's storms in southern Monterey County at a location known as Paul's Slide, Caltrans has come up with a new plan that it says will create safer conditions for crews trying to clear the slide — and those who travel along the road.

To accomplish this, the state roads agency has altered the alignment of the highway.

"Engineering teams have developed a repair design which will bring the roadway slightly inland as it passes in front of the Paul's Slide complex," Caltrans spokesman Kevin Drabinsky said.

Drabinski said workers are putting in long hours to clear the slide and fix the road, but it's uncertain when the job will

"Crews are working seven days a week during all daylight hours," he said. "Because of uncertainty regarding continued slide activity at the repair site — as well as weather conditions over the coming months — there is no current estimated time for a full reopening."

The revised plan comes about five weeks after work was halted due to "continued movement of the hillside," which caused "unsafe work conditions." The area has been plagued with instability since repairs began earlier this year.

Located just south of Lucia and the New Camaldoli Hermitage, Paul's Slide poses a daunting challenge for Caltrans and contract work crews. More than 500,000 yards of dirt, rock and debris have fallen on the highway since a series of storms hit the coast early this year.

Most of Big Sur's parks and businesses are open, except Limekiln State Park, which is closed for repairs. About 2 miles of the highway remain closed.

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## Is Scenic Road facing another threat?

WITH THE memory of last winter's collapse of Scenic Road still fresh in their minds — and the possibility of a wet winter on the horizon — residents who live on Carmel Point are asking Monterey County officials to give the go-ahead to use sand to fill in a channel in the Carmel River Lagoon sandbar that they fear could trigger a repeat of the recent disaster.

"You may have noticed that during the summer, the river exit migrated to the north, creating a large channel in the middle of the beach," Lorin Letendre wrote Wednesday to county official Randy Ishii and others. "That channel, if not filled in with sand, could easily migrate against the Scenic Road bluffs when the next rain season begins. What is your plan to prevent this bluff erosion from occurring this winter?"

Letendre told The Pine Cone the channel is less than 100 feet from the bluffs. County spokesman Nicholas Pasculli said the county is investigating the situation.

"The county is aware of these new concerns raised by constituents, as the county prepares for this season of Carmel River Lagoon interim sandbar management," he said. "The permits for this seasonal activity are being applied for, and these concerns will be discussed with the state and federal regulatory agencies."

A 250-foot section of Scenic Road was closed in January for three months after high surf and heavy rains battered the sandy bluff that supports it. The incident was a reminder of the threat the road has long faced from erosion. In 2010, county public works cut the channel through the sandbar in a "slight" northerly direction to relieve the threat of flooding and satisfy concerns about steelhead by state and federal agencies. But, just as it has this summer, the river moved, undermining the beach's parking lot and a restroom.

**O**VERTURNING A previous decision by the Monterey County Planning Commission not to approve it, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors voted 3-2 Tuesday to OK an application by Patrick Whisler to operate short-term rentals on his property near Point Lobos — despite opposition from 5th District Supervisor Mary Adams, who represents the neighborhood.

Whisler's 1-acre property, which is zoned for "low-density residential," was once owned by A.M. Allan, whose family sold 348 acres to the State of California to establish Point Lobos State Reserve.

Whisler is Allan's great-grandson and asked the county for permission to rent out three cottages on the property, including one that was built in 1870. He proposed allowing up to 14 guests at a time to stay on the land.

"Each rental be limited to no more than 29 consecutive nights in a 30-day period, and no more than 60 days in a one-year period," according to his application. The proposal was denied by the county planning commission June 28 by a 7-2 vote.

#### \$300,000 in TOT taxes

At Tuesday's hearing, Whisler told the supervisors that his family began renting out the cottages in 1985, and since then, they've paid nearly \$300,000 in hotel taxes. He also noted that they've never received any complaints from neighbors.

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


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## City seeks feedback on Car Week

THE CITY of Carmel is conducting a survey on this year's automotive events, and community activities director Ashlee Wright said Tuesday she and acting Police Chief Jeff Watkins will present a report "on all aspects of Car Week, including events, traffic control, traffic impacts, parking stall rentals, etc." to the city council next month.

"Car Week is huge, and it encompasses the entire Monterey Peninsula - and that encompassing can be fun sometimes, and frustrating for those of us who work here and need to get from point A to point B," she prefaced her recap of the downtown events for the community activities commission Sept. 12. "The police chief and I will be giving a full report to the council in October after our survey closes and a few other meetings."

#### **Report card**

Downtown was the site of four small events this year: Acura in the Park Aug. 15, the new Concours for a Cause Aug. 16, and Prancing Ponies and the new Ferrari Owners Club Concours Carmel Aug. 17.

Acura is an experienced host and had set up displays in Devendorf Park for years as part of the now defunct and far larger Concours on the Avenue, which was last held in 2021.

"We didn't have any issues there," Wright told the commission.

Concours for a Cause focused on electric vehicles but included a handful of gas-powered vintage cars - some of which had been shown and even won awards at COTA - as well as art, sand sculpting and a handful of vendors and activities in Devendorf Park and along the perimeter blocks of Sixth and Mission.

Good Roots, which organizes the

downtown farmers market in the same area every Thursday, was the host.

"They do large-scale events in other places, so they have that expertise, and I think they learned this is a different type of event than what they're used to doing,' Wright said, adding that Concours for a Cause had a local emphasis that included raising money for the Carmel High School auto shop.

Regarding the Prancing Ponies show on Ocean Avenue and the new Ferrari Owners Club event, Wright said both went smoothly, as well.

"We had no issues with Ferraris getting confused about which place they should be in," she said, since the famous Italian marque was featured in both. Prancing Ponies showcases cars owned and driven by women, while the Ferrari Owned Club offers a more serious presentation of Ferraris and Italian motorcycles to be judged according to specific standards.

"This year was unique," Wright said, acknowledging the new events and their small scale. "I know the community wants to see the larger events," such as the Concours Tour d'Elegance and Concours on the Avenue.

"Events in general are challenging and so detail oriented," she continued, and they require organizers "with a level of expertise to make sure things run smoothly, and also connections with the car community."

Wright said some would-be organizers expressed interest in hosting larger-scale events but never applied.

#### Already at work

Applicants have already submitted paperwork for Car Week 2024, she said, including one for a potentially larger

households no longer have landlines. Of the 240 million 911 calls made in the United States each year, she said, in many areas, 80 percent of them come from cell phones.

"It's important that continued improvements are made, especially in the residential areas," she said. "Connectivity at home is more important than ever."

#### No give

But council members showed no inclination toward walking back any of the ordinance's restrictions. Instead, their comments focused on whether the historic resources board should review applications for cell towers and if negative impacts on property values should be considered a valid cause for denial, as recommended by the planning commission.

Some council members worried that having the HRB review applications, in addition to the planning commission, could run the city up against government-imposed deadlines for processing permits for cell towers.

"The evaluation of historic resources is not going to be particularly complicated — it's not adding a wing to a historic house — but it will be delaying the process," councilman Jeff Baron said, which would put undue pressure on the city to meet the deadlines for taking action on a telecom company's application. Councilman Bobby Richards favored streamlining the process by removing possible historic review, but that provision ultimately stayed in.

Baron also questioned including negative impacts on property values as one of the reasons to deny an application.

"Our code implicitly protects property values," he said, because of its already strict rules on views and other assets. "We're opening a nebulous can of worms. How do you quantify that?"

No other city ordinances consider property values, Swanson confirmed, and Baron said anyone who opposed an application could simply get a like-minded realtor to submit a letter stating a negative impact on the homeowner's property.

"It's tough, because how do you truly quantify loss of property values, because you can get one person to say something and another person to say something else," agreed councilwoman Karen Ferlito. "I don't want to weaken the ordinance."

But Mayor Dave Potter said he would support leaving the language in "out of respect for the planning commission."

"Part of me is saying remove the language, but if the mayor is confident it won't hinder the process, then I will go with that," Richards said.

The council unanimously OK'd the ordinance and the separate "administrative design guidelines" that will apply to all cell tower applications.

The law will come back for another vote next month, and after it's approved, it will have to be accepted by the California Coastal Commission.

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
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## Local realtors buy KW franchise

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## FUNDRAISING EFFORT TO UPGRADE FAIRGROUNDS

IT MAY be famous for hosting the Monterey Pop Festival in 1967, and as the home of the Monterey Jazz Festival since 1958, but the Monterey County Fairgrounds are badly in need of repairs and upgrades, the CEO of the Monterey County Fair, Kelly Violini, told The Pine Cone. To make those improvements, the Monterey County Fair Heritage Foundation is asking the public for financial help.

"Our goal is to raise \$1 million to convert our aging barns into a multi-use community center for local events, from barbecues and weddings to a central crisis center in times of emergency and need," Violini said. "Restoration of our public restrooms is also a priority."

Violini said the barns were removed five years ago after they were red-tagged for being a safety hazard. She said the restrooms are in poor shape and low-flow toilets need to be installed, and she noted that they will be expanded to include dressing rooms — something that has long been needed to accommodate performers. "Most of our events would benefit from having dressing rooms," she said.

Work is underway on the barns and the restrooms by contractor SSB Construction of Salinas.

#### 'So many things'

Violini said the work she described is just the beginning of a major makeover of the facility, which was built in 1936 on land owned by the State of California and hosts the annual Monterey County Fair. "There are so many things that need to be done," she said.

For instance, the Payton Stage, which hosts small out-door concerts, is "being eaten alive by termites." "I think they're actually holding it together," Violini said.

Also needing repairs is the site's Pattee Arena, where Jimi Hendrix lit his guitar on fire, Janis Joplin belted out the blues, and Otis Redding, Miles Davis, Sarah Vaughn

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
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

least private injury.

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■ An offer to acquire the property has already been made and rejected.

■ The water district's ownership and operation of the water company's assets would be a "more necessary public use" than Cal Am's.

"If the board adopts a resolution of necessity and the

district then proceeds to bring an eminent domain action to acquire Cal Am's Monterey water system" the water district said in its report to the board, "staff and counsel anticipate Cal Am will challenge the legal basis for and sufficiency of the resolution and some or all of the board's findings to support that resolution."

#### 'Zero experience'

In response to the water district's announcement of the upcoming hearing, Cal Am spokesman Josh Stratton pointed to the Local Agency Formation Commission's determination that the water district is barred from





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acquiring Cal Am, and raised other issues it claims would not make it a good water provider.

The district has "zero experience as a water retailer, LAFCO has pronounced that the district doesn't have the legal authority to acquire Cal Am, and the district has admitted that they will not reduce rates," Stratton told The Pine Cone Thursday morning. "It is clearly an infeasible endeavor which is already significantly over budget, taking years longer than they promised and is a cost burden to ratepayers."

In determining that acquiring Cal Am's system would be feasible, the water district was required to find, among other things, that it would be less costly to operate, that the district would provide better service and quality than Cal Am, and that public ownership would offer greater local control, oversight and transparency in capital planning, operations and setting rates.

The district in April offered Cal Am \$449 million for the system, but Cal Am said no.

In 2018, Monterey Peninsula voters passed Measure J, which authorized the water district to acquire Cal Am if it was feasible." The group that led the charge for the measure, Public Water Now, promised "affordable water" — presumably less expensive than that offered by Cal Am — with a government-controlled system. However, "Measure J was to determine feasibility of acquiring Cal Am and it is clearly infeasible and not 'necessary for the proposed public use,' as required in a resolution of necessity," Stratton went on to say.

#### Long game

While lower water rates for Peninsula customers was a big selling point in the 2018 election — and a reason many voters OK'd Measure J — advocates of a publicly controlled Monterey system haven't focused on that idea much lately.

In May, however, Stoldt told The Pine Cone that with his agency's operation of the system, water rates "should" decrease "for a bit, or at least hold flat, and then not grow as quickly as when under Cal Am."

Cal Am has warned that if the water district loses its eminent domain battle — which would likely cost millions of dollars and take years to resolve in court — it would seek legal fees and other costs.

Cal Am's Monterey system includes various water rights, wells, more than 90 storage facilities, more than 60 pump stations, water treatment systems, a desalination plant in Sand City, water transmission and distribution pipelines and other facilities.

Cal Am and the public will be permitted to comment at the October public hearing in Monterey.

#### Rental registry bad idea Dear Editor,

The Monterey City Council really missed the mark (except for councilmember Ed Smith) with the rental registry ordinance. This registry is nothing more than a feelgood waste of money and resources. Can the city point to any other city that has enacted this ordinance and seen availability skyrocket and rents plummet?

This ordinance does absolutely nothing towards providing more housing or increasing the affordability of housing. In fact, it will likely have the opposite effect. Landlords of multi-unit properties who respect tenure in tenancy and rent below market rate to long-term tenants may be in a position of raising rents to not appear discriminatory or arbitrary. Potential buyers of rental property will think twice before investing in a city in which they must disclose information that is typically confidential between a landlord and tenant (the tenant may disclose this information anytime they feel wronged).

Under this ill-conceived ordinance, the property owner's hands are tied. All tenant contractual agreements will become public record and scrutinized.

Every city or state (including California) that has attempted to regulate private rental property in one way or the other has seen rents increase and availability decrease. Government interference in private property or private business should be restricted to that which is absolutely necessary for health and safety.

If the city council, as it has said, is only interested in the rental stock and prices (which the exclusion of ADUs brings into doubt), the information is readily available on Craigslist and the U.S. Census. And it won't cost \$400,000 to access.

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

Morse gate from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. so crews could perform "roadway excavation."

Understandably, those who use 68 regularly are not happy with yet more construction on the roadway.

"I live in the Del Monte Forest area of P.G., so I drive that highway multiple times a day," Ashley Callau told The Pine Cone this week. "I don't

understand why they keep redoing it. The first time didn't really need it, the second time was OK, and now they are doing the same thing again but widening areas to where it was in the first place. I think that money could be spent in other areas in our community that need it more."

Caltrans previously told The Pine Cone that it had to scrape the newly paved areas on Highway 68 because it received \$2.3 million — from a separate taxpayer-funded architect Jun Sillano. The plans call for eight upstairs apartments ranging from 466 to 1,308 square feet, eight commercial units at street level and 21 underground parking spaces, storage and restrooms, and while the design itself was not up for review and has yet to go to the planning commission, council members and the public discussed its potential impacts on the bank complex.

"The spatial relationships that bring light and space to the entire complex will be forever dwarfed by the overly large and looming structure and the adjoining buildings," Ferlito said, adding that the former bank "was designed to be viewed from all sides."

As a rule during appeals, the city planning department recommends the council back its lower boards' decisions, and associate planner Evan Kort advised the council to not overrule the historic resources board's vote, despite the councilwomen's objections.

"In keeping with past practice relating to decisions of junior boards and

commissions, staff supports the decision of the historic resources board and recommends the council uphold the decision," he said, adding that he concurs with the conclusions drawn by the historic consultant that moving the small section of wall would comply with the Secretary of the Interior's standards.

Sillano and Esperanza Carmel development director Ryan Aeschliman defended the plans, saying they worked with the planning department and the city's historic consultant on the proposal that ultimately earned the board's approval.

"It is not without understanding the significance of preserving Carmel's heritage that we make this request," Aeschliman said. "Carmel's history is a testament to the stories, cultures and architectural legacies that have shaped the city's identity."

#### Little support

Several speakers sided with Ferlito and Dramov, including former planning commissioner Ian Martin, who remarked that the wall should be considered a work of art and left alone.

"To do right by the Secretary of the Interior's standards, preserve this work of art," he said. "I also hope the design will be scaled back, because it really overwhelms this."

Kristi Reimers, who has a store in her family's Stonehouse Terrace complex to the east of 7D and Pastor's property, said the JB Pastor building must "be built in a manner that protects the integrity of the historic building."

"Historic landscapes and view sheds must be

preserved," she said, citing the federal standards that also call for new construction next to historic resources to "be subordinate" to them.

'We must be very careful about what goes next to it," she said.

Several others, including Cindy Lloyd, architects Carolyn Walker Davis and Libby Barnes, and former planning commissioner Don Goodhue, similarly argued for the wall to stay put and Pastor's team to design around it.

But Neal Kruse urged the council to back the HRB's vote, just as it did on prior occasions when the board voted against Pastor and he asked the council to overrule it.

"We don't like to reverse the decisions of our commissions. You have proved that, because the developer has come in here twice with two appeals, and you have denied both appeals to support the decisions of your lower commissions," he said. "I ask that you be consistent tonight and do the same."

He also pointed out this would mark the third time the council has disregarded its historical consultant's analysis.

"You can basically hire any consultant to say anything you want," Dramov countered after public comment closed and the council began deliberating. "We have an applicant who says he supports historic preservation, but he is fighting to destroy something that is historic."

Ferlito also complained that the crew working for the developer hammered nails into the wall to hold the flagging and staking for the proposed buildings.

"If you have respect for architecture and art, would you really allow someone to do this?" she asked.

Councilman Jeff Baron said the design of the wall "is integral to that building," as it separates it from the parking lot, and he suggested Sillano and the Esperanza Carmel team rework the JB Pastor project to be more compatible with the historic resource next to it.

Dramov made the motion to overturn the decision of the historic resources board based on its violation of the Secretary of the Interior's standards, and that Pastor's team figure out how to accommodate the wall.

"I would prefer the new design be four or five feet from the wall so there's visibility as you walk up the street," Baron said.

"I'm concerned with bulk and mass as it faces Dolores," Mayor Dave Potter added.

Ferlito said the nails must be removed and the wall repaired.

#### 'Not discriminating'

"This is not discriminating against the applicant per se," Potter said before the vote. "This is a sensitive property in the heart of downtown Carmel-by-the-Sea. It's important that we preserve our resources, and based on the testimony we've heard today, I find compelling reasons to go ahead and support the motion, so I'm going to support it, but I don't want anyone to think anyone else wouldn't get the same critique and criticism."

Ferlito seconded the motion, and the rest of the council minus councilman Bobby Richards, who had to recuse himself — agreed.

City administrator Chip Rerig said the council will be asked to adopt its findings for denial at the Oct. 2 meeting to formalize the decision.

Assuming Pastor doesn't decide to sue the city over the council's decision, the next step for the Esperanza Carmel team will be to revise the plans for the JB Pastor project and submit them to the planning commission for review. While he has received planning commission approval for his project three blocks away at Dolores and Fifth, he has said he won't proceed with it until he is allowed to move forward with the JB Pastor project.

from other local law enforcement agencies.

"Any jump in calls for a police department our size is very critical," Russo said. He added that the Country Inn's management had been cooperative with officers.

McCarthy said that during a 20-minute campaign visit to the hotel last year, he witnessed a wheelchair-bound man being beaten in his room and saw another hotel guest — whose door was slightly ajar vomiting on the bed. When he asked one guest if she was a registered voter, the



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woman said, 'No, I'm a convicted felon like most of us are in this building,'" McCarthy recounted.

Though it's not yet clear how much Marina taxpayers incurred in additional expenses related to the homeless program, city manager Layne Long said Marina "potentially lost hundreds of thousands" of dollars in hotel taxes, which it would have otherwise been paid by regular paying guests of the Country Inn & Suites.

#### 'Shocking'

Councilwoman Kathy Biala said she was shocked to learn of the homeless housing program — which she characterized as a "venture that went awry" — and how it has impacted Marina.

"It just blows my mind, really," Biala said. "I had no clue about the degree to which this has morphed into a serious issue for our city."

Without naming Salinas, the councilwoman called on Monterey County cities to "cooperate and respect each other's areas, because this is sort of the best example of what not to do."

Medina asked how Marina, in the future, could find out about such homeless programs, and whether there was any requirement to notify the city about Project Roomkey.

"This is not 'Marina does not want to welcome people in need," Medina said. "It's more of, 'We need to know what is going on in our community so we can share the information and provide resources."

She also asked whether Project Roomkey operators are required to notify public officials when they're housing homeless people in cities.

Marina interim city attorney Heidi Quinn didn't know the answer because, like city officials and council members, she hadn't seen any documentation on the program.

"I think we just need a lot more information to understand what transpired, what the legal obligations were, were there any breaches of these obligations, and if there is anything else we can do to prevent this from happening and to mitigate the impacts that we are still experiencing," Quinn said.

Project Roomkey, which was first used to house homeless people with Covid-19, was operated by the nonprofit Coalition of Homeless Services Providers beginning in September 2020 until the City of Salinas took over operations of the program from October 2021 until April of this year. Five other county cities housed homeless people as part of the program.

While Mayor Bruce Delgado conceded that Marina was a "little bit blindsided" by the homeless program and is still "in the dark," he said the city itself bears some responsibility for not knowing that it was going on.

"I don't know that its other people's fault that we were out of the loop," Delgado said. "Because there were many conversations going on with our supervisor who represents us and with" a homeless service provider.

Last week, Salinas Mayor Kimbley Craig told The Pine Cone that Project Roomkey was certainly no secret and that officials with her city informed Marina officials about the scheme and that 4th District Monterey County Supervisor Wendy Root Askew — who lives in Marina was also aware of it. Craig explained that Marina, like other cities in the county, has an obligation to do its part to solve the region's homeless problem, though it is unclear how the temporary program in Marina solved anything.

Marina community development director Guido Persicone told the council Tuesday that his city tried getting more information about the Project Roomkey program, to no avail.

"We had multiple meetings set up and they would get canceled by Salinas staff at the last minute," Persicone told council members.

While The Pine Cone was informed that Askew and her staff are working on trying to get Marina reimbursed for some of its expenses related to Project Roomkey, Askew refused to address the issue.

show, though she did not provide any details. It can take months or years to work out the details of a new event, not only because of the lengthy review and approval process, but due to changes in sponsorships, vendors and other factors

"I thought the smaller events worked very well," Wright said. "I'm hoping with some time and patience, the organizers we've been working with can continue to grow their events and add in those details that we loved so much about COTA, and that we'll see that in the future.'

The community activities department also issued eight permits to downtown businesses that reserved a total of 64 parking stalls — some for several days, at a daily rate of \$200 per space — for special car displays and VIPs.

She described the practice as "a tradition going on for many years," but said part of her presentation to the city council in October will include the "impacts of renting parking stalls.'

Among those who reserved spots was Meuse Gallery owner Simon Bull, who hosted Astons on the Avenue, a display of Aston Martins that included his car, which is wrapped with one of his paintings. He called it a pop-up event.

"It was something that evolved in the week or two before Car Week," Wright said. "I think that went smoothly, but we want to reexamine how we did that for next year, and I will address that with the council.'

At the city council meeting Tuesday afternoon, city administrator Chip Rerig also mentioned Car Week and thanked the city staff who worked overtime to make everything run as smoothly as possible, including the police officers who stopped 141 drivers and issued 75 citations to people for speeding, stunting and other bad behavior in town. Two were arrested for DUI.

"The curated events went very well, but the nighttime activity didn't go so well, though everybody was safe," he said. "We'll be talking at the Oct. 2 meeting about what Car Week looks like next year."

#### **Opinions sought**

The city's online survey solicits feedback on Car Week events as well as safety issues. It begins with asking whether the taker is a resident, restaurant owner, retailer, innkeeper or worker within the city limits, or "a Car Week attendee from outside of the 93921.'

"How did you feel about Car Week in Carmel-by-the-Sea overall this year?" it asks, with possible answers being "Loved it," "It was OK," or "I did not like it at all." It then inquires, "Why do you feel that way?"

The survey covers each of the four events and asks for ratings of each, as well as, "How do you feel about the events in Carmel-by-the-Sea in general this year?"

It then seeks feedback on "the effectiveness of traffic calming measures in place for safety in the evenings in the business district," specifically, the barriers and cones installed each evening to try to prevent the reckless driving, drag racing and other antics that occurred on Ocean Avenue several years ago by creating a circuitous route through town.

Despite those efforts, people still mobbed the sidewalks, medians and streets in search of the high-end supercars and other rarely seen automobiles that tend to cruise downtown during Car Week, and business owners have complained that shutting down Ocean discourages people from visiting their stores.

The questionnaire wraps up with a general solicitation of any additional thoughts on Car Week.

As of Monday night, Wright said, 225 people had responded. The survey can be accessed by clicking on the maroon "Take our Car Week survey" banner at the top of the city's website at ci.carmel.ca.us.

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
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But Adams suggested that the business would operate like a bed and breakfast, and because it offers more than five beds, it would require ADA upgrades. She also objected to the fact that the property owner didn't live on site — and she warned approval of the application could set a bad precedent.

"I am in a real conundrum with this," she said. "I feel like we're opening Pandora's Box."

While supervisor Glenn Church also had concerns about Whisler's plan, supervisors Wendy Root Askew, Chris Lopez and Luis Alejo all supported it. Lopez observed that there wasn't "a crowd here telling us this is a terrible idea," while Alejo noted that the property has "a unique history" and Whisler has been a "good actor."

County official Craig Spencer said the supervisors' decision can't be appealed to the California Coastal Commission.

for the city." He described the lot as an eyesore.

Gunner's attorney, Mark Blum, noted that, among other things, the zoning change would facilitate "development that is compatible with design standards reflecting increased on-street parking, reduction in curb cuts, increased setbacks, preservation and improvement of public views of the ocean from community facilities, preservation of trees, and increased open space and landscaping."

#### Some support

While Dyar presented renderings and the concept for how the property could be developed if it's rezoned, the council was only asked to weigh in on the change in land use without delving into what might be built there.

Some speakers, however, couldn't resist envisioning his design.

Resident Cindy Lloyd said she likes the concept Dyar presented, including structures with green roofs that would integrate well with the park to the west and that wouldn't appear too massive from Monte Verde Street.

"I endorse the plan from my perspective and hope you give him the green light," she said.

Architect and former planning commissioner Don Goodhue was also enthusiastic. "This proposal is the best you could hope for — it's beautiful and reasonable and appropriate for the site," he said. "Carmel will be lucky to get this project."

"I think it's a good idea to rezone this parcel anyway — it's been out of whack since 1960," commented former planning commissioner Ian Martin. "The fact it paves the way for a beautiful building downtown is an added benefit."

But resident Anne Carwile, who owns a cottage across the street next to Tally Ho, opposed the proposed rezoning and said she and her neighbors would rather see homes there. She also disliked Dyar's design for its size and because the driveway would be located on Monte Verde.

Councilman Bobby Richards simply said he'd vote in favor of rezoning, and Mayor Dave Potter said it's worth investigating. He also pointed out that a green light at this point wouldn't guarantee approval of Dyar's proposal or any other design there down the road.

Councilman Jeff Baron said he was "of mixed mind" and would need to know a lot more about the project, as well as the changes proposed at the Pine Inn itself, before he could decide whether rezoning is a good idea.

The 2022 Pirates became the first team in Monterey County history to win a Central Coast Section championship in that sport, capturing the CCS Division 2 crown.

Then, for an encore, they routed Porterville and Walnut Creek Northgate in the quarterfinals and semifinals of the NorCal Division 3 tournament before losing an 11-10 heartbreaker to Woodcreek High at Roseville in the finals. (They led that one by three goals with three minutes to play.)

Their success sent skyrockets of hope soaring over other schools from the Pacific Coast Athletic League, most of which are located in Monterey County. It can be done, they realized, and maybe it can be done this year.

In fact, the team that placed second to Stevenson in last year's PCAL standings, Santa Catalina, quietly included all CCS and NorCal game dates on its schedule this year.

## Harbingers of success

Optimism abounds, and for good reason. Five of Stevenson's seven starters on that 2022 powerhouse squad were sophomores. The first player off the bench was a freshman. All are back, all are battle-tested, and they've been joined by a pair of varsity-ready ninth-graders who led Monterey Bay United, a club team, to the National Junior Olympics this summer.

Catalina enjoyed a 12-2 season (6-1 in the PCAL, runner-up to unbeaten Stevenson), but was left out of the postseason playoffs by the CCS selection committee due to a soft overall schedule.

Head coach Kendra Klein, an NCAA Division I All-American at CSU Northridge, has beefed up the quality and quantity of competition for her 2023 Cougars, who have a strong returning cast that includes her top three

scorers and the starting goalie from a year ago.

Playing hardboiled, tradition-rich opponents is a time-tested success formula for Stevenson head coach Jon Burke, who won 10 consecutive CCS championships at Sacred Heart Prep before coming to Pebble Beach. His Stevenson teams are 15-0 in PCAL play and 42-14 overall over the past two seasons.

The Pirates figure to endure some bumps, bruises and teachable moments throughout the season, playing several of California's top-ranked teams in brutally rugged tournaments, specifically the St. Francis Invitational in Mountain View, where they went 2-2 on Sept. 8-9, The Arroyo Grande Fall Classic (Oct. 5-7), and the Sacred Heart NorCal

#### Invitational (Oct. 20-24).

"It's all about getting these kids the quality repetitions they need by playing some of the best teams in Northern California," Burke said. "We're excited, we're grinding, and we've got a group of athletes totally committed to hard work. We're ready for the challenge."


#### Quality veterans at Stevenson

His returning starters — all juniors — include Emmerson Ferriera, last year's second-leading scorer (behind PCAL MVP Sofia Bozzo, now playing at UC Davis), who returned faster, stronger and more aggressive, with a greater level of finesse, thanks largely to a strong summer at the club level.

"I think Emmerson is going to have a breakthrough year and establish herself as one of the best players ever to come out of this county," he said of the PCAL's 2022 Offensive Player of the Year. "She'll be our primary

"Collette's world is expanding, and I see her getting better every day," the coach said. "She's a true student of the game — asks a lot of questions, takes notes — and we're looking for her to be a dependable ballhandler and good decision-maker for us.

"Charlotte is a center-forward — a very natural sub for

Miranda — and is a player with an amazing work ethic," Burke said. "She's also tough as nails and doesn't back down. And she can score. And she's only 14 years old."

#### **Cougars return proven scorers**

Santa Catalina returns its top scorer, All-PCAL senior Riley Barringer, who tallied 52 goals a year ago, along with two second-team all-leaguers: Quinn Connolly was the Cougars' No. 2 scorer (28 goals) as a freshman, and goalkeeper Sophie Fieber is a senior who made 95 saves in 10 games a year ago.

Other 2023 starters/key players include senior Elle Edwards, whom Klein expects to emerge as a strong scorer, sisters Violet and Eva Bradley (freshman and sophomore, respectively), and Georgia Morrison (a returning sophomore).

"We started this season pretty strong, and I think we're looking for some success this year, but we'll see - it's a long season," said Klein, whose team was 5-1 at the begin-

Connolly and Morrison are club water polo players during the summer, and Barringer, Edwards and the Brad-




Other key players figure to be lefty Jayda Sherratt, a good outside shooter, and driver, strong at both ends of the

## Understanding 'not for sale'

WHETHER YOU'RE for or against the water district's effort to take over Cal Am, you might be wondering what the water company means when it insists it's "not for sale."

Cal Am is part of a publicly traded company called American Water which, according its investor relations website, has 6,500 employees who provide "safe, clean, reliable and affordable drinking water and wastewater services to more than 14 million people with regulated operations in 14 states and on 18 military installations." Want to buy a few shares of American Water? You can, as long as you pay the price. It's listed on the New York Stock Exchange under AWK and closed at \$140.98 Thursday.

But ask yourself: If you used your hard-earned money to buy 10 shares or 10,000 shares of American Water, how would you respond if you were asked to vote on the idea of selling Cal Am's Monterey system to the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District?

For almost everybody, the answer depends on the price. Take the profit Cal Am's Monterey system makes, multiply by whatever return you expect from your investment in the company's stock, add a premium if you think the company is set for pell-mell growth, perhaps ask for job security or severance for the Monterey employees, and then, if your conditions are met, you'll say "sell it" without shedding a tear — because what kind of stockholder would be emotionally involved with owning a piece of Cal Am?

The same isn't true for personal assets. Someone may be so attached to a home that they won't consider selling, no matter the price. Same thing with businesses that are family owned. For example, in the early 1930s, when John D. Rockefeller was buying parcels in midtown Manhattan for his mega office project that became known as Rockefeller Center, the centerpiece of the project — the building called 30 Rock — was stalled because the owners of two townhouses on Sixth Avenue refused to sell, forcing Rockefeller to build his 66-story art deco masterpiece around them. Those buildings still sit there today, one on 49th Street and the other on 50th, isolated and overlooked by their gigantic neighbor.

But would those townhouses still be there if they had been owned by a publicly traded company? The answer is no. Rockefeller and the owners would have negotiated a fair price and the townhouses would have been knocked down, just like all the other buildings that were cleared to make way for Rockefeller Center.

Logic dictates that American Water would also be perfectly happy to sell Cal Am's Monterey assets, no matter what kind of profits they generate, provided they got a fair price. So why does the company's management insist that Cal Am is "not for sale"? We don't know, but whatever the reason, it's a statement that probably isn't very deeply held, and even if it is, could easily be reversed.

We have used this space many times to say that it's foolish to expect lower water prices from a government-owned utility than from a private one. The government never does anything more efficiently that a profit-motivated private company would. Buying Cal Am based on that promise is naive. On the other hand, a great many water utilities around the world are government-owned, and we don't hear much about the public demanding they be privatized.

If the people of the Monterey Peninsula want to buy Cal Am, they should be able to. But not, as we say, based on a belief that water will be cheaper.

## Hatton Canyon bike path Dear Editor,

Regarding last week's letter by Paola Berthoin, I have thought for many years about the limited (and dangerous) shoulder for bicycle use on Highway 1 between the Carpenter and Carmel Valley Road intersections. After the demise of the Hatton Canyon Freeway and transfer of the right of way to the California State Parks, it seems a no-brainer that locals would seek a pathway down the canyon to allow for safe, beautiful and efficient transportation alternatives to driving or riding on Highway 1.

I believe this idea has been around for a while and recently was identified on the TAMC 2018 Monterey County Active Transportation Plan and discussed at a Carmel Area State Parks 2012 workshop. To my knowledge, the main opposition has been by neighbors along Hatton Canyon and the environmental impacts of an 18-foot-wide paved, Class 1 bike path. Currently the only public access to the lower portion of the 2.6-mile route is either Canyon Way or Carmel Valley Road. would be to tunnel under the four lanes of the highway and connect with Carmel Hills Drive, Flanders Drive and eventually with Canyon Drive. From there, a Class 1 path could continue down the partially improved Carmel Area Wastewater District right of way to Carmel Valley Road. This alternative with the tunnel is probably cost prohibitive and would have resistance from Caltrans and others.

Nevertheless, I believe it is time that we rethink our transportation options and do the hard work to make this plan happen. Perhaps we should convene a new workshop led by regional bicycle groups, local leaders and the community.

T IS likely that no Hollywood celebrity did more for military morale through the years than comedian Bob Hope. For decades, he led an array of stars and pretty women into the living spaces of soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines on battlefields around the world. During World War II, and later in Korea and Vietnam, Hope sought to bring a little happiness to the troops who were risking it all to secure freedom for others. Hope brought hope to millions of soldiers through his lighthearted, contemporary humor.

He also shared his gift with civilians and was a frequent visitor to our Peninsula. In addition to making movies and performing on stage, Hope regularly played in the Crosby golf tournament hosted by his close friend, Bing Crosby, at Pebble Beach. Both reportedly were members of the exclusive Cypress Point Club, where membership is

hard to verify, but Hope once quipped that the club had a membership drive while he was there and "drove out 200 members."

Hope even filmed some of his 1947 movie, "My Favorite Brunette," on the Monterey Peninsula. The imposing, Byzantine-style stone mansion near Pescadero Point on 17 Mile Drive served as the lair of the bad guys who kidnapped Dorothy Lamour. They shot the local scenes in September 1946, perhaps so Hope could stay around to play in the California Amateur golf tournament that teed off on Sept. 30. There are several reports

that both Hope and Crosby played in it. Crosby was a late entry and paired with defending champion Bruce McCormick in the qualifying rounds. Hope, however, missed the tournament.

#### G.I. jester

He was in San Francisco on Sept. 30, receiving an award from the American Legion as the "friend of the veterans and personal jester to 12 million GIs.'

Hope had a syndicated column in those days. His September 1946 edition, written from Pebble Beach, was full of quips about moviemaking there. He joked about filming some scenes with Lamour "down near the ocean, but they didn't turn out so well. How can a guy act when his leading lady keeps burying him in the sand?

The movie includes car chases on 17 Mile Drive, of which Hope bragged, "I did a lot of fast, tricky driving in the outdoor shots up

at Pebble Beach, and it was really exciting when my car went off the cliff and I jumped out. I love doing those rugged scenes ... it's my double who complains."

The road trip for the movie also made gossip columnist Sheilah Graham's hit list. She noted that Hope "took along his masseur, Mr. Miron, and this made Bob unpopular with Elsa Maxwell, Douglas Fairbanks and Joan Crawford - and me. Mr. Miron happens to be our favorite masseur.'

#### Sore at the caddy

Then, in his "Behind the Camera" column, Harold Heffernan provided a golf tip from movie comedian Charles Arnt. Portraying a sanitarium patient, Arnt played a round of golf with Hope in the film using an invisible ball. Arnt said it wasn't such an insane idea, "maintaining that golf is a game for relaxation and that when he

played with a real ball and missed a shot, he'd get sore at the caddy, break his clubs and couldn't speak to his wife for days."

Heffernan suggests they filmed that fanciful round

on Pebble Beach Golf Links. That's possibly true, but if so, they shot an abbreviated version on a sound stage. The latter version appears in the film. Backstories tell that they made an exact replica of the mansion's massive front door so they could shoot some scenes with it in Hollywood.

Hope and Crosby made several movies together with Dorothy Lamour, known collectively as the "Road" pictures. There was a "Road to ..." Singapore (1940), Zanzibar (1941), Morocco (1942), Utopia

## It's just the way of this world

EVERYTHING VANESSA Cowdrey touches while shaping her chosen materials into artwork was once something else — another physical form, perpetually altered since the beginning of time by all of the forces of our universe. That's the way of the world.

That humbling notion provided meaning and inspiration for the 2008 Stevenson School graduate, who will exhibit her ceramic creations, plus photos, prints and drawings, next month in a 17-day one-

woman show at the Monterey Peninsula

The exhibit, entitled "Vesselness," launches Oct. 13 with a reception from 5 to 7 p.m., and will wrap Oct. 29 with a clos-

The artist/educator is employed this versity of Nevada Reno.

"I've made a lot of my pieces from the clay that accumulates in MPC's drainage system and is kept in holding tanks until it gets pumped out to the dump once a year,"



she said. "To me, making these forms with reclaimed materials is a way of celebrating the lifespan of that material. I'm fascinated when I wonder how many other future iterations that material might have."

A notable piece in her exhibit is a round vessel that was accidentally broken by the kiln's extreme temperature (2,400 degrees Fahrenheit, in this case), inadvertently providing a window for its contents.

"To me, those broken pieces repre-

sent a crucible for change, a metaphor for rebirth," Cowdrey said. "And the kiln, itself, might be a metaphor for a largescale geological event this immense pressure and atmosphere that's happening within.

"If you can still find beauty in that broken piece, I think it says a lot about resilience, about the story the materials in the piece have to tell about its history and lifetime," she said.

Inside the broken pot are beautiful glass-like pieces that also were bent by the heat and now resemble sharks' teeth.

"Those are spent pyrometric cones, which we use to visually check the heat inside the kiln," she explained. "They allow me to observe the effect that heat is having --- whether the ware is being underfired or overfired," she explained.

When those cones are spent, they typically are discarded. Instead, Cowdrey has repurposed them into art.

#### 'He'd want to be here'

Another metaphor — more personal is evident in the repurposed contents of a piece she titled, "What Remains" - an earthy-brown ceramic bowl whose materials include the cremains of her beloved father, Bob Cowdrey, who died one year ago this month.

"My dad wasn't artistic, but he was always a cheerleader for me and my mom, Karen, who is also an artist, although she'd probably never say that about herself," she said. "When I'd show him a piece of my work, I don't think he ever quite knew

where to put it, mentally," Cowdrey reminisced. "He'd say, 'I don't know what it is, but I love it!' I decided to put his piece is in this show in a good spot on a nice pedestal, because I know that he'd want to be here."

Cowdrey aspired to major in fine arts as she approached graduation day at Stevenson, but both parents advised her to focus instead on a path that might be more financially reliable. So she heeded additional advice from Steph Pratt, chair of Stevenson's fine arts and performing arts department, and chose to study environmental design and architecture at the University of Colorado in Boulder.

"That's probably where began developing an


"It got me thinking about the resources we're using all the time, which made me wonder where all of those materials are being sourced? It's available on the shelves, in a bag, of course, but it's so much more than that. So, I started looking at the materials themselves and exploring their own lifespan," explained Cowdrey, who repurposes spent materials that might otherwise be considered discardable waste, and gives them new life in her art.

immense curiosity about our world, both natural and manmade," she said. "I approach creating my

work through a scientific lens, questioning the results of certain processes, altering variables and documenting my findings."

As Cowdrey observed, everything in the natural world has been altered over time by pressure, heat, wind, water and any number of other factors to achieve its form.

"I like to examine the evolution of a material that's been altered by outside forces during its lifespan," she said. "To me, each piece I make seems like an artifact of process, and I see the kiln as a metaphor for transformation."

After spending two months during the Covid pandemic as a substitute teacher at Stevenson, Cowdrey decided to make a U-turn toward her original aspiration and pursue her Master of Fine Art degree. She enrolled in Nevada Reno's graduate school in the fall of 2021, recently defended her master's thesis there, and is now approaching graduation.

#### **Physical labor**

Since 2015, Cowdrey has volunteered with Worldwide Opportunities on Organic Farm. Its mission statement says it aims to link visitors with organic farmers, provide a cultural and educational exchange and build a global community conscious of ecological farming and sustainability.

Those months-long educational gigs involve performing physical labor on farms, something she thoroughly

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enjoys, in Northern California, Oregon, Washington and North Dakota.

Those experiences stimulate her fascination with the ever-changing physical world.

#### **Trash piles**

"The couple that owns the North Dakota farm have an older property with multiple buildings that have kind of collapsed on themselves over time and have basically become generational trash piles: broken furniture, tableware and so many other things that tell a story about the lives of the people who used to live there," said Cowdrey, who sees those trash piles as evidence of "a lived experience — almost like studying layers of the earth."

In addition to her job managing the ceramics studio at MPC, Cowdrey helps fellow sculptor Mark Tanous coordinate an open-air community studio at Hacienda Carmel, where she also teaches classes.

She enjoys taking workshops alongside her mom, whose artforms include ceramics and printmaking.

Beyond her exhibition at MPC, Cowdrey will participate Nov. 30 from 5 to 7:30 p.m. and Dec. 1 from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. at MPC's annual Mud People Sale, where students, faculty and staff from the college's creative and dimensional arts program will offer ceramic ware, cards, prints and jewelry.

Cowdrey's art is sold locally at HUNT, a Carmel Valley business specializing in vintage furnishings, objects, art and artisan goods.

On Oct. 31, 2022, Jane Doe informed Gonzalez-Espita that she no longer wanted to live with him due to his drug use and physical abuse. He started to argue with her and eventually blocked the room's only exit and prevented her and other family members from leaving. When one of them called 911, Gonzalez-Espita knocked Doe to the ground, grabbed a screwdriver and began stabbing her in the head and body. A separate family member tried to intervene and protect Doe by covering Doe's head. Gonzalez-Espita then stabbed the family member's hand multiple times while continuing to try to stab Doe in the head.

Eventually family members and neighbors were able to pull Gonzalez-Espita off Doe and restrain him. When Salinas police officers arrived, Gonzalez-Espita was still attempting to charge toward Doe. He then ran from the police, yelled that he had a gun and goaded the officers to shoot him. Gonzalez-Espita climbed onto the roof of the house, jumped off, broke his leg in two places and was finally arrested.

Doe was stabbed approximately 14 times in the head, neck, shoulder, arm and chest. Many of the stab wounds resulted in scarring, while some required staples. One of the stabs fractured a vertebra in her spine and damaged her spinal cord. This caused temporary paralysis in Doe's legs for multiple days, as well as long-term pain and numbness in parts of her body. The family member who protected Doe was stabbed in the hand five times.

Gonzalez-Espita will be sentenced by Judge Pamela Butler and will receive a stipulated sentence of 18 years in prison. This case was investigated by the Salinas Police Department and district attorney investigator Pablo Andrade.

## CARL CHERRY CENTER TURNS 75, CELEBRATES IN FOUNDER'S STYLE

ONCE UPON a time, Carmel-by-the-Sea was an unpainted canvas — a community with open skies and open fields, where unpaved streets meandered around cottages scattering the countryside. Yet, even before the beginning of the 20th century, the town was taking shape. Between 1892 and 1894, carpenter Delos Edward Goldsmith partnered with his niece, real estate developer Abbie Jane Hunter, to build two Queen Anne-style cottages, one for her, and one for Goldsmith's relative, Augusta Robertson.

By 1930, the Robertson house belonged to Mrs. C.W. Thatcher, who sold it for \$1 to her son, inventor and engineer Carl Cherry. The occasion was his marriage to poet, painter and patron of the arts Lena Yates, who'd taken to calling herself Jeanne D'Orge, reportedly in homage to Joan of Arc and the Orge River in France.

The tale goes like this: D'Orge wanted their home to serve as an accessible art enclave. She had the top story of the house removed after drawing a chalk line and saying to workers, "Cut here." In what remained, she established an art studio, a meditation room, a workshop and a space for entertaining. There, she drew and painted and wrote, and hosted a community of like-minded artists.


It was in this house, in 1936, that Carl Cherry invented the "blind rivet," a revolutionary development for the aircraft and shipbuilding industries. Patented as the "Cherry rivet" in 1939, and widely used throughout World War II, it yielded a substantial income for Cherry and D'Orge, which they used to establish a foundation in support of the arts and sciences.

#### Worth celebrating

In 1948, a year after her husband's passing at 46, D'Orge established The Carl Cherry Foundation to foster the development of a local arts enclave in his name and to sponsor events in the community. Later renamed The Carl Cherry Center for the Arts, the organization remains, 75 years later, a testament to the importance and impact of art in this community, and something worth celebrating.

Saturday, Sept. 2, The Cherry welcomed the community for a celebration with readings and performances by local artists, writers and musicians, as well as a silent auction.

"Our 75th anniversary provides a



chance to reflect on the numerous ways the art center's exhibitions, classes, events and school programs have made an impact on thousands of people in our community," said Robert Reese, the Cherry Center's executive director. "This landmark anniversary also provides a chance for us to look forward to our future as we continue to provide significant and meaningful arts programs to the community, working toward our vision to make art an essential part of Monterey County."

#### A little edgy

"The Carl Cherry Center making it through 75 years as an arts organization without endowment, yet able to serve as such a community contribution, is an amazing feat," said local artist and board president Robin Winfield. "Half of these years, The Cherry has been run by Robert Reese. It is quite a testament to him that we've been able to carry on and show cutting-edge art and theater, works a little edgier than what you might see downtown or on a traditional stage." Winfield, who hails from a large family of artists and has an eponymous art gallery in town, has sat on the board of The Carl Cherry Center for more than 20 years and is serving her second term as president. She considers the organization a "hidden treasure," just outside of the commercial district of Carmel, yet very much a part of the city's history and culture.

"Jeanne D'Orge's vision was to establish The Carl Cherry Center as a place where artists could come to exchange ideas about literature, science, theater, art and each other," said Winfield. "She created it, the artists and local community enjoy it, and Robert Reese is the keeper of the story, then and now."

The Carl Cherry Center for the Arts serves upward of 10,000 people each year through exhibits, events and programs. The organization is funded through grants from the Arts Council for Monterey County, the Community Foundation for Monterey County, Monterey Peninsula Foundation, the Mitchell Foundation, and private donations.

(1945) — you get the idea. Hope and Lamour made other movies, like "My Favorite Brunette," without Crosby. However, Crosby does make a cameo appearance at the end of "Brunette" as a tip of the hat to their famous co-star.

#### Just missed it

Surprisingly, Hope's schedule for completing filming in Hollywood caused him to miss the first Crosby tournament at Pebble Beach in January 1947. He had played in the early Crosby tournaments held at Rancho Santa Fe before World War II caused a hiatus in 1942. After the war, Crosby resumed his tournament at Pebble Beach in 1947. Hope, however, didn't join the fun there until 1951. The next year, paired with pro Jimmy Demaret, he nearly won. Demaret's putt for birdie on the 18th Hole stopped an inch short and left the team a stroke behind the winners.

Hope rarely missed a Crosby after that. He loved the concept so much that he began hosting a pro-am golf tournament himself in 1960 in Palm Springs. From 1965 to 2000, it was known as the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

A fact I learned in 2003 illustrates the competitive nature of Hope and Crosby — in this case, based on their ages. Hope was born on May 29, 1903. Crosby reported in his 1953 autobiography, "Call Me Lucky," that he was born May 2, 1904. This allowed him to continually egg on his friend as "the old man." When I was invited to speak in 2003 on Crosby and Pebble Beach at a Crosby centennial conference at Hofstra University in New York, I asked why it was being held in 2003 and not 2004. I was told Crosby was actually born on May 3, 1903, making him a few weeks older than Hope.

When I confessed to the Hofstra audience that I had errantly trusted Crosby's 1904 date in my 1999 Pebble Beach book, his widow, Kathryn, was in attendance. After the presentation, she let me know that Crosby's grave even includes the 1904 date, telling me that he used it throughout his life, so he might as well have it forever.

Next week I will give you the back story of how bringing Hollywood to the troops began. Hope was not even part of the early "test show" that brought the stars to Fort Ord on June 16, 1941, with comedian Jack Benny as master of ceremonies.





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## This trail leads to new homes for bunnies

WITH THOSE foofy tails and soft coats — and of course, those ears — domestic rabbits are downright adorable. They make wonderful pets, but unfortunately, the people who bring them home aren't always prepared for the work involved. As a result, many of these cute furballs end up in shelters.

That's sad, said Bethany Ambrosia — founder of The Bunny Trail rabbit rescue in the Barnyard shopping center — because in terms of care, bunnies aren't much different from any other small animal. "They're somewhere between a dog and a cat," she said.

#### **Becoming aware**

Ambrosia founded The Bunny Trail in 2021. She had moved to Pacific Grove from Fresno to live with her husband, and in 2017, she adopted her first rabbit. It wasn't her first pet, though. "I grew up loving animals — anything with four legs and fur — but I didn't have much awareness of rabbits," she explained.

When began her online search for a rescue rabbit, she noticed that there were a lot to choose from — too many, it seemed. She started volunteering with rabbit rescues and realized that even with all the animal-focused organizations around here, there still weren't enough spaces for unwanted rabbits.

"Many of the rescue sites were full. People were pleading for places to give them up, or to turn in found bunnies.

## If your cats and dogs are meant to fly, this business gives them wings

WHEN SHE was 10 years old, Kathleen Gallagher set up the Sea Shop near her home in the coastal town of Boothbay Harbor, Maine. With an outdoor card table, a small chair and some signage, she sold seashells, baskets and "found objects" to visitors returning from harbor tours. "I did it for quite a few summers," said the Pacific Grove resident, and she made money.

That entrepreneurial spirit, combined with her passion for animals, led to her "pet travel agency," Life Unleashed, along with a second business, Tails and Veils, to "help brides and grooms include wagging at their wedding." (Visit tailsandveils.com for more info.)

Gallagher said she's had animals since she was in sixth grade and met Molly, a golden retriever. This year, she cheerfully drove her two Chihuahuas (Jethro and Eli) and her German shepherd (Hemingway) cross-country on vacation to visit her family home.

#### **Domestic travel**

Gallagher earned her MBA at Northeastern University in Boston and worked in marketing and tech. She lived in Austin, Texas, for a while, and was taking a Pilates class when an acquaintance mentioned that she was relocating with her pet.

Gallagher researched the requirements for flying an animal from one place to another, which, she learned, isn't all that difficult in the United States. You need an airline-approved crate and a health certificate from a veterinarian. It's also important to make sure you pet's destination doesn't have any weather-related restrictions

She explained that airlines may prohibit pets from flying to places like Phoenix or Miami in the summer. The cargo hold where pets fly is pressurized and climate-controlled, but it's not the time in the air that's worrisome - it's those on-theground delays.

#### **Uncommon call**

If you've ever sat in a plane on a tarmac for too long, you know that temperatures inside the plane can become uncomfortable — more so for the cargo hold, which is closer to the hot pavement. It's one reason animals are usually loaded onto the plane last, as close to takeoff as possible.

Also, not all cargo facilities, where pets are usually checked in, have the same comforts as the passenger terminal - some are not air-conditioned, for example. Restrictions can also apply in weather below 32 degrees.

Of course, it's possible to arrange to bring your pets into the passenger compartment with you on many domestic flights, but that's not the sort of transport for which Gallagher's services are needed.

However, if you've been transferred to Paris for a long-term work assignment and you want to bring your cockapoo or Siamese cat along, that's where Gallagher shines. She estimates that she's one of "maybe 300 people" worldwide who relocate pets internationally for a living. Most of her clients are moving abroad for a few years or permanently, although she said there's also a niche market among people who want to take their besties along on yacht trips in the Caribbean.

She'll investigate the destination country's requirements regarding vaccines, quarantines, health certificates, etc., as well as airlines' rules and regulations. Each nation has its own list of required vaccinations and tests, but Gallagher noted that

the first step you should take — if it hasn't already been done — is to have your buddy chipped, because the veterinary records can be tied to the chip, which can be scanned to

confirm that everything's in order. Most airlines (domestic or overseas)

## From school buses to the SNIP bus, these teens came ready to help

**MELANIE SCHERER** believes there's no such thing as too many dogs and nothing wrong with being a "cat lady." As long as we take care of them. But not everybody can or does, resulting in unwanted litters that often end up wandering the streets or filling up shelters.

Scherer's devotion to dogs and cats inspired her to donate a lot of funds to animal shelters, but she realized she wasn't actively doing anything to mitigate the overpopulation that filled them. She wondered if she could make a greater contribution to animal well-being if she put her efforts into reducing the need for rescue.

"Seeing so many shelters filled with dogs broke my heart," she said. "My donations were putting a Band-Aid on the situation. I needed to figure out how to preempt the problem."

In 2016, Scherer, who had sold her executive recruiting company the year before, established SNIP, which stands for "Spay, Neuter Imperative Project," a low-cost mobile spay-and-neuter clinic housed in two 26-foot customized buses. One is in the Central Valley and the other is in Monterey County, traveling through Castroville, Seaside, East Salinas, Prunedale, Hollister, King City, Soledad, Chualar, San Lucas and San Ardo, offering low-cost spay and neuter clinics staffed by a trained veterinary team.

"Our destinations are based on areas that have the greatest need," Scherer said. "We treat 1,800 to 1,900 pets every month out of our mobile clinics, 400 to 500 of which are in Monterey County. And it feels like we're just getting started," even after seven years.

#### **Community service**

Scherer is an animal rights activist, a humanitarian, a champion of women, an entrepreneur and a Christian. She relies on her wits, her heart, her courage, her community and her faith to make a difference, but she knew she couldn't run SNIP alone. To achieve her goals, she needed to gather a diversity of folks whose skills would help her achieve her vision.

SNIP is ramping up its efforts and extending its reach. In January, Scherer heard a friend lament that trying to get

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You can only play Tetris with the cages so many ways," she said, adding that lack of space can lead to rabbits being euthanized.

One problem with rescue rabbits is that they're usually housed with dogs and cats — in separate cages, of course, but they get pretty stressed out living that close to natural predators. The rabbits sometimes become defensive, even aggressive, and are difficult to adopt out.

Ambrosia talked the situation over with a friend, and they ended up starting a specialized adoption center, where "it's just rabbits in a calm space." The Bunny Trail's representatives talk with potential adopters to make sure they have all the information necessary to make informed decisions about whether to adopt, and if so, which bunny will best match their lifestyle.

#### **Big variety**

Just as a German shepherd has a different temperament and needs than an English bulldog or a Yorkie, rabbit breeds vary by size and personality, too. For example, Ambrosia said, lionheads are prized for their fluffy coats that look a little like lions' manes around the neck, but "they're not usually that cuddly, friendly bunny." They're more like "sassy divas."

Still, Ambrosia said, the breed isn't everything. "Each bunny is individual. You can have a whole litter with very different personalities."

Some rabbits can weigh 40 pounds or more. The Guinness world record holder is a chunky 49 (and is 4 feet, 3 inches long), said Ambrosia. Most of those larger animals are found in the U.K., however. American domestic rabbits range from 2 or 3 pounds up to about 20, and they normally live for 10 to 13 years, she said.

Their reputation for speed is well earned, too. "You don't want to let them get away," Ambrosia cautioned, because catching them can be extremely difficult.

Some of the long-eared critters can jump as high as 4 feet, but Ambrosia said that a 4-foot-high X-pen (portable playpens for pets that come in a wide range of sizes) is sufficient to keep about 90 percent of rabbits inside. She add-

ed that you should try not to let your rabbit hop up onto the furniture, because their spines and legs are not that strong and your pet could hurt itself while jumping down from a table or shelf.

Because bunnies' spines are so vulnerable, collars and harnesses are not recommended, either. Children under 5 aren't usually good company for rabbits unless they've been carefully taught how to handle them.

Their hands are too small to pick the animals up properly, Ambrosia said, and doing so incorrectly — because the kids' hands are too small, or the rabbit tries hard to squirm away — can result in injuries.

her sons, students at Palma High School in Salinas, to complete their community service hours was like asking a kid to give up their iPhone. Scherer supposed the boys were not alone in their reluctance. She also knew they loved animals and imagined they weren't alone in that, either.

She wondered, "What if we create a program to help high school kids achieve their community service hours by recruiting them to volunteer at SNIP clinics and participate in a drive to collect new or gently used collars, leashes, toys and even food for pet owners in underserved communities who are bringing their animals to SNIP?"

Through this program, Scherer reasoned, students could learn about non-

profits and community investment and fundraising while gaining new skill sets. Each student would be able to contribute to a SNIP clinic by personally distributing pet-related goods and volunteering in their own community.

The official kick-off party for the program, with support from Carmel High parent Alison David and Palma High parent Christian Lilly, was held on Aug. 29. Less than 24 hours later, one high school student had collected 49 new leashes and collars.

The community service program also recruits students to place phone calls to relatives and friends, seeking monetary donations to SNIP.

"As students pool the funds they raise, once they reach \$3,750, they can host their own SNIP clinic, having voted on where it will be held," she explained. "And they can



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continue to gather and hand out donated items at their clinic." She added that the students can hold additional clinics if they raise enough money.

### Party at Pasadera

On Nov. 11, SNIP is hosting a party at Pasadera to congratulate student volunteers and the adults who are supporting their efforts. During the event, the group will present a video that shows the students and their work, and the Monterey County Sheriff's Department will hand out awards.

"It is so humbling to watch young people participate and think of new and helpful things to do to support our community through SNIP," Scherer said. "These 'volunteens,' as we call them, are learning, firsthand, how to live in community and how to become responsible pet owners. This program will continue to grow through the next group of student volunteers, and hopefully older students will serve as mentors to younger students."

don't have facilities to accept pets for shipping at every airport, so Gallagher makes sure that the animal's points of origin and destination are equipped to handle them. She said that policies vary by airline more than by airport, since airlines run their own cargo facilities. She'll also coordinate with a professional like herself in the destination country to help pick up the animal and go through customs, etc.

Gallagher recommends nonstop flights whenever possible, because once a stopover or two are introduced, things become more complicated — what if your pooch misses his connection in New York or Berlin, for example? Will someone be able to walk your dog or feed him if he's stuck somewhere overnight?

She said that lot of airlines partner with animal-boarding facilities and if your friend is stranded or needs a rest between flights, the airline will normally take care of setting that up.

What about in-flight meals? In general, pets don't get them, although a drip water bottle that attaches to the carrier and a pee pad for the floor are recommended. You'll be asked to tape a baggie with the animal's food to the top of the carrier in case of a delay, since no matter how friendly the skies are, airlines don't stock kibble or salmon paté.

The owners usually drive their pets to the airport cargo facility, but Gallagher will get directions to make it easier.

And while fearful humans might be better off with a Xanax or a stiff drink before takeoff, Gallagher said "sedation is a big no-no" for pets, as there's no one to ensure their safety and monitor their condition in flight.

She said if your animal's extremely fearful of being alone, of loud noises or spending time in a crate, it's a difficult choice, but you might want to find a friend or family member to adopt him. There's usually a minimum age requirement for pets, and older ones don't always fly well, either. Those are the sorts of conversations to have with your veterinarian. In any event, she said, crate training that starts well in advance of the trip will go a long way toward helping a pet feel secure.

In addition to dogs and cats, pet relocaters can move tropical fish, birds, and in Gallagher's case, a ferret named Mr. Pooh Bear. She noted that some of her counterparts in other areas have relocated horses and zoo animals, too.

To move an average cat or dog overseas, Gallagher's professional fees start at \$1,500, not including the veterinarian fees, crate, customs or flight charges. Not that your companion is average, of course. But you get the idea.





An X-pen can be useful for keeping rabbits out of trouble while giving them space to burn off energy. "Bunnies need about 52 inches to 6 feet of space to run around and play with toys. They're not destructive unless they're bored," she noted, but then they tend to chew on baseboards or electrical cords.

Most rabbits are happy as solo pets, unless they've already bonded with another bunny. Then, said Ambrosia, they often get depressed if they're separated. Some stop eating and drinking, and can die if they don't get help. The same thing can happen if their bestie dies - whether the friend was a rabbit, a human or even a cat. "They bond for life," she pointed out.

Some dogs can become good companions for rabbits, but generally not hunting dogs, with their instinctive predator/prey responses. Ambrosia said that cats and rabbits can often get along well, too. It's important for the rabbit to have enough space, though, because the smaller their territory, the more aggressive they'll be about defending it.

If you adopt a rabbit, you can expect it to be "social like a dog and entitled like a cat," Ambrosia said. "They're most active at dusk and dawn, and they like to be on a schedule.'

Spaying or neutering the bunnies is critical, as they can reproduce every 30 days, and many surrendered rabbits come from unexpected litters. Ambrosia said that it's extremely difficult to tell the sex of young rabbits before they become fertile when they're about 4 months old. "Even veterinarians can get it wrong.'

#### Inexperienced

Sadly, most rabbits find their way into shelters when their owners' kids lose interest or the family realizes that the pets were more work than they expected. Bunnies in shelters are much luckier than those that are released into the wild, however - a disturbingly common choice owners make, Ambrosia said.

Ambrosia likened it to dumping an adult human someone who had never even gone on a camping trip on a desert island. Domestic rabbits depend on humans to take care of everything. Unlike their wild counterparts, they don't know how to create their own burrows, forage for food (or even know what's safe to eat), and avoid predators, which include mountain lions, hawks, owls and raccoons, to name a few.

Happily, Ambrosia's efforts have saved many rabbits and helped them to find new homes with caring people who can look after them and give them the affection and love they need.







### One more sip of summer

The autumnal equinox here signals the start of summer-ish "chamber of commerce weather," which means there's still plenty of time to enjoy refreshing summer whites — those chilled, playful quaffs with scents of pear, quince, Meyer lemon and orange, and notes of floral, peach and nuts.

One great suggestion to try now is Corral Wine Co.'s 2022 sauvignon blanc from the Zabala Vineyard, in the Arroyo Seco AVA. It's rather a perfect pair with beachy warm days and cool ocean breezes.

Corral has a tasting room in Carmel Valley Village, and the owners' daughter and son-in-law also own Stationæry Restaurant (San Carlos between Fifth and Sixth).

The Zabala family has owned and farmed land in Arroyo Seco since the late 1790s and planted grapes there about the same time as other historic vineyard clans, such as the Wentes and Mirassous. The family is connected to the famous racehorse, Seabiscuit, and was even mentioned in John Steinbeck's "East of Eden" — but that's a story for another day.

The terroir of Arroyo Seco produces wines with deep flavor profiles in the both the whites and the reds, and the distinct

and pleasant notes of the Corral sauvignon blanc in the aroma and on the palate are no exception.

You'll discover Meyer lemon, orange, passionfruit and gooseberries on the nose with lemon, peach and pear on the palate. There's a slight minerality on the finish, and good acidity.

It's \$30 at the winery, and pairs well with Humboldt Fog or Cypress Grove goat cheeses, or Harley Farms Monet Chèvre from Pescadero, just up the coast in Santa Cruz County. Toss the cheese into a salad with some farmer's market beets and pour yourself a refreshing glass as you enjoy an earlier — but no less beautiful — sunset.

Proceeds from the book sales account for a substantial amount of the library's book budget, and that benefits all of us. I can walk into our comfy Harrison Memorial Library and in the quiet of the shelves I can hear a "Horse Whisperer" or "Snow Falling on Cedars," and I can almost feel the "Unbearable Lightness of Being."

#### **Impish behavior**

It still amazes me that I can leave the library with a wonderful portable information retrieval system that never needs recharging or a password, won't beep, ring, cling or clang annoyingly, and allows me to view advertisement-free content without an expensive monthly subscription plan. It is called a book. It does have a family plan, meaning anyone in my family can read it, too. Through it I can spend hours, even days, with C.S. Lewis, Elmore Leonard, Donna Leon, Leonardo, Laertes, Longfellow and Jack London, and that's just for the L of it.

I have a difficult time getting rid of books. There is an intimacy involved with books that cannot be realized with an e-reader. Books are safe with me, sustained and lovingly tended, protected from the elements so neither dampness nor mildew can infest them. Watchful bookends stand like silent sentinels, keeping the assembly orderly, lest Anne Lamott impishly

pokes Cormac McCarthy in the spine. Reluctantly I let them go. (I can always go to the donation center and buy them back.) It is not the fault of the books. I am so attached to them

that displacing even one would be like condemning my own child to some Dickensian orphanage. I often end up leaving them alone so their internal versos and rectos can face each other while spending one more day in my care.

LET'S GO FOR COFFEE: A gentle reader asks if I really hang out at coffee shops in the morning, and why. The flippant answer is because the pubs aren't open yet. Frivolous though that response may be, it carries some historical significance.

In late 17th-century England, life was pretty good, except that the water you drank contained gross stuff that made you sick. Instead, people imbibed fermented beverages. They didn't understand why. They were still generations away from the discovery that alcohol kills germs, but Londoners knew beer didn't make them sick. So they drank it all the time, which meant just about everyone in the city men and women, young and old, rich and poor — was mildly tipsy 100 percent of the time.

Enter coffee. People began drinking a



brew that stimulated them rather than beverages that dulled their senses. They became more productive and even a little smarter. Coffee houses became places people met to exchange ideas, ushering in the Age of Enlightenment. It remains true today. Coffee is a convivial beverage. "Let's go for coffee" is an easygoing invitation to sit down and connect with another person to practice the vanishing art of conversation.

### **Big questions**

This feeling of coffee's connectivity was underscored in an enchanting manner recently when I attended a memorial service for author, teacher, historian and friend, Randy Reinstedt, who passed away in July. In giving the eulogy, his son, Erick, described how his father and mother. Randy and Debbie, spent at least an hour every day over coffee, either at home or in a coffee shop, talking to and about each other. They connected as man and wife, as lifelong best friends, to discuss their family, their work, their marriage, their faith, their spiritual walk — you know, perhaps asking the big questions: Who am I? Why am I here? How shall I live? Where am I going? To them, "Let's go for coffee," was more than a break in their routine.

It was an ongoing commitment to love and honor each other until ....

In his poem "Last Fragment," Raymond Carver asks, And did you get what you wanted from this life? He answers that he did because he felt himself beloved on the earth. The outpouring of heartfelt personal messages from people who were touched by Randy's life as a writer, teacher or friend was indicative of how beloved he was. There is no doubt in my mind that when Debbie enters eternity, Randy will be her first blessing.
